Despite the backcloth of the prevailing economic gloom, people seem determined to celebrate where celebration is due. It is time to move on from a winter of some discontent and to mark an auspicious year in the ways that villages know and do best. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The Chairman reflected on the year's activities; a book exchange had been set up in the telephone box book – thanks to Mrs Zoe Firebrace. Mr Robin Sadler has been beavering away on research for a community wind turbine and we are still trying to resolve traffic calming in Boot Street; thanks were due to Mr Paul Norris for his efforts in negotiating with SCC. In addition the Parish Council has dealt with eight planning applications of which Regency House

continues to exercise our minds!

COUNTY COUNCILLOR PETER BELL-FIELD'S REPORT

County Councillor Peter Bellfield reported that it has been a tough year. SCC are on track to save £42 ½ million. 1,400 staff have left the County Council, mainly back line people, very few frontline staff; they anticipate that a further 2,660 staff will be leaving as services are taken over by the private sector etc. No decision has been made yet on mobile libraries. There continues to be a high demand for super-fast broadband – residents are asked to log onto the website *www.suffolk.gov.uk/broadband*.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR TONY FRYATT'S REPORT

Mr Tony Fryatt confirmed that the District Council had received £186K from central government due to the Council Tax freeze. The situation continues to be very tight however joint working with Waveney District Council is playing a key role in keeping costs down. LITTLE BEALINGS PARISH COUNCIL

Little Bealings Annual Parish Meeting held on 5 March 2012

The Annual Parish Meeting was held in the Angela Cobbold Memorial Hall and attended by residents and visitors. Parish Council Chairman Ferial Evans Rogers reported on the year's activities. Mrs Evans Rogers thanked all those who had carried out work on behalf of the Council, including Mrs Hopkins who had retired as a Parish Councillor last year. County Councillor Peter Bellfield reported on the change of leadership of the County Council in the last year and the budget savings being achieved. Proposals for the Library service, Country Parks and a SCC property rationalisation were intended to reduce costs. Delivering faster broadband was important and support was needed: www.suffolk.gov.uk/broadband. Mr Bellfield had some 'Quality of Life' and locality budget funding with which to support local projects. District Councillor Tony Fryatt reported on the two major issues of Neighbourhood Plans and the proposed East Anglia Offshore Windfarm project (EAOW). Neighbourhood Plans and Village Reviews were important to produce planning guidance that SCDC would be required to take into account, and could include design

and use of space policies.

There were also reports from Jenny Cook, as Tree and Footpath Warden and on behalf of the Women's Institute, and by Jenny Shaw as the Council's webmaster and as Chairman of the Bealings Village Hall Management Committee.

Sam Jennings from Strutt and Parker advised that the proposed route for the cabling for the EAOW passed between Great and Little Bealings and that he was happy to advise landowners and the parish about the implications. The working cable corridor would be about 35 metres wide and would carry three cable bundles. Installation would result in extra traffic and congestion and there would be a need for access for ongoing maintenance. Neither development nor tree planting would be permitted along the corridor, although the land would be returned for agricultural use. There was concern that the project was not 'future proofed', meaning that the land would need to be disturbed again in the future to lav a fourth cable.

The Chairman of the Parish Council thanked all those who attended the meeting.

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 5 March 2012

FOOTPATHS

Signs warning of the offence of dog fouling had been added to the Church footpath and the situation seemed to have improved. Damage to the verge footpath leading to the Playing Field had been reported to SCC as in previous years, with a request that action to prevent future damage be considered.

PLANNING

East Anglia Offshore Windfarm Cable Route: It was resolved to object very strongly to the proposal to route the cable between Great and Little Bealings and over land which was designated a Special Landscape Area (SLA). The proposed route was in the heart of the two communities and would result in significant disruption during installation. with ongoing disturbance for maintenance and future cabling. The quality of the SLA would also be diminished by the lack of trees along the route and the presence of inspection pits. There was also concern at the impact on land drainage and water supplies, and on safety grounds where the route was close to properties, including the high pressure gas main in Holly Lane. SCDC and Suffolk Preservation Society would be asked to support the Council's objection and it was agreed to combine with Great Bealings PC in publicising the proposal, as appropriate. More information is available at www.eastangliawind.com.

C11/2768: Land Adjacent to Wychwood, Martlesham Road – Erection of one dwelling and garage together with construction of new vehicular access. It was noted that SCDC had refused this application. (The applicant has subsequently appealed the refusal and an Inspector will determine the matter by an exchange of written representations. To obtain more information and view the grounds for appeal contact SCDC on 01394 444428.)

Noise at Sunfield Farm: SCDC had advised that they had visited the property and were unclear whether track use was private or competitive, and would be pursing the matter further.

Village Review/Neighbourhood Plan: Mr Fryatt advised that, subject to cooperation by SCDC, a Parish Plan and Village Design Statement could be adopted as supplementary planning policy guidance (SPG) to the LDF. For this to be achievable a Village Review would need to provide clear planning statements, which established the parish's preferences in respect of such matters as design and use of space. The Review would have to be carried out in line with SCDC requirements in order to make it likely that it would adopt it as an SPG, but would be easier to undertake than a Neighbourhood Plan. It was agreed that Mr Carr would attend a Neighbourhood Planning Training event on 14 March and further consideration would be given thereafter.

QUEENS DIAMOND JUBILEE CELEBRA-TIONS

It was agreed that Dr Rowe would look further into tree planting at Sinks Pit and that the Council, represented by Mrs Rogers and Mrs Wilson, would join with Great Bealings in arranging a joint celebration event on the Playing Field on 4 June.

FINANCE

National Savings account interest of £2.11 for 2011 had been received. Cheques were signed for hire of the Angela Cobbold Hall, the Clerk's salary and expenses, PAYE, Suffolk Preservation Society joining fee and the Information Commissioner for Data Protection Act registration. A refund of VAT for 2011/12 for \pounds 284.20 had been submitted.

CORRESPONDENCE

In view of information received about SCC's Part-Night Lighting Project it was agreed to ask for an update on reducing night time lighting at the Martlesham Park and Ride.

The next meeting of the Council will be the Annual Parish Council meeting and will be held at 7.30pm on Monday 14 May in the Village Hall Committee Room. SCDC REPORT

Mr Steven Hudson reported that Woodbridge Police Station is closing. He also reported that there is a current planning application for 3 wind turbines in Tuddenham.
