ast month I went to a wedding, unusual in that you might say. Ah! but this was a Chinese wedding! Well the wedding itself was held in Marylebone Register Office, but apart from three of us all the guests were Chinese. My husband in his capacity as a University Supervisor was in "loco parentis" for an ex student whose parents were unable to make the journey to England, witnessing the union as well as looking after the rings. I am glad to say he did the job as well as any best man I have worked with! After extensive photographs during the ceremony and afterwards on the town hall steps, we walked the short distance to a Chinese restaurant. It was an amazing establishment, a restaurant where the Chinese dine in style! The reception had a very different feel from an English one. The bride and groom were not the centre of attention, they spent time between the courses moving round the tables toasting their guests and thanking them for coming. To my surprise we were placed on the table with the bride, groom and family members and were treated like family. When the various courses arrived, they were placed on a central rotating tray and everyone helped neighbours to food. We started with the traditional suckling pig. rather like a Greek feast, followed by lobster in its shell. I must say it was a great challenge to eat the lobster with chop sticks! It was a tossup as to whether the lobster ended up out of the shell on the chopsticks or across the table on someone else's plate. You could feel the resistance, fingers ended up as the weapon of choice in the end. Dish followed traditional dish, especially those from the area of China from which the bride originated. It was wonderful to be able to experience such hospitality.

Two things struck me about the occasion. There was food and wine sufficient for everyone, but not to excess. In these financially challenging times when weddings cost many thousands of pounds often at great cost to family members, it had a good feel about it. However, the really memorable aspect was the hospitality and friendliness of everyone. I had not met any of the family and guests before, but by the end of the afternoon felt that I had made some new friends. It was a privilege to have been invited.

It was also a reminder of the hospitality that Jesus offers to us all. The invitation to share in his kingdom, of which the meal that we do in remembrance of him is the visible sign. Jesus invited everyone to join with him no matter who or what they were. The only condition was to accept the invitation. May we feel that we can offer such hospitality to each other.

HOME-START SUFFOLK COASTAL

Could you be a Home-Start Volunteer?

Home-Start Suffolk Coastal is a charity which has provided support to families locally for over 11 years. We support families who have at least one child under 5 and for whom life is an uphill struggle. Over the past year we have supported over 80 families for many different reasons including families where there is illness or disability, families experiencing mental health issues or feeling isolated and families who have twins or triplets.

Support is provided by volunteers who are parents themselves or have parenting experience. Before visiting a family volunteers attend a preparation course to look at their own experiences and cover subjects such as child protection and local facilities for young families. They are then matched one to one with a family to offer whatever help is needed, a confidential listening ear, an extra pair of hands and eyes, time to spend with the children or support through a difficult time.

Once matched with a family volunteers receive on-going support, training and expenses.

The course is OCN level 1 or 2 accredited. There are2 preparation courses starting in the near future, 1 over 1 week and another 1 day a week for 9 weeks. If you would like to find out more please ring Louise or Sarah at Home-Start Suffolk Coastal on 01394 389402

SUFFOLK ACCIDENT RESCUE SERVICE

Suffolk Accident Rescue Service (SARS) is about to complete its fortieth year of providing pre-hospital care for people in need around Suffolk and its borders. Sadly, for a charity doing such important work, we have tended to get lost in the mix of the many worthy charities competing for attention in our local communities. We often get asked, are we the air ambulance? Or part of the statutory ambulance service? We are neither of these, although we do work alongside the statutory emergency services at the scenes of serious medical incidents around Suffolk.

So who are we? Well we are a group of volunteer doctors and critical care paramedics located around Suffolk (we currently have members based in nearby Rushmere St Andrew, Ipswich and Rendlesham.) We are called out to the scenes of serious incidents such as road traffic collisions (RTCs) or when our Ambulance service requires enhanced medical support to help treat patients in urgent need of medical attention. Our members carry drugs and equipment which are not available on front-line ambulances, and the advanced medical skills they can provide can mean life-saving interventions, particularly when a patient is trapped and rapid transfer to hospital is not possible.

All this is done voluntarily and without any charge to the patient, the ambulance service or the taxpayer.

This year we are likely to attend between 250-300 serious incidents around Suffolk and its borders.

Our charity has a 'Good Samaritan' ethos and our members are all busy professionals with other important commitments. Nevertheless, they are prepared to give up their spare time to help people knowing that their skills and equipment really can save lives or reduce the chance of permanent disability.

In the middle of the night or during poor weather when the air ambulances are grounded, we are the only enhanced emergency medical resource available to the Ambulance Service in Suffolk.

But we need help too!

We rely on voluntary donations and the support of local businesses and funders to maintain our activities. Unfortunately, we have run at a deficit for four out of the last five years and our reserves are dwindling. We need to raise $\mathfrak{L}50,000$ in 2013-14 to be sustainable and continue to provide a vital service for the people of Suffolk.

PCC MEETING MARCH 6TH Major points emerging from the meeting.

Annual Report: The draft of the Annual Report was considered and the final version will be presented at our Annual Open Meeting on Wednesday April 10th. The meeting will be held in the Committee Room of the Village Hall, and will begin at 7-30.

Financial results: Our Treasurer, Adrian Melrose reported that there had been a more positive outcome to the financial year, and that we were now able to budget for a significant figure to be put aside to deal with maintenance and repairs. The September 2012 Farm Fair had played a vital role in turning things round.

An insurance assessor had visited the church, and had advised us that we are under-insured. As a consequence we shall have to pay a significantly higher premium. The insurable value was assessed at some £3 million – that gives you some idea of the weight of our responsibilities.

Building works: Charles Barrington reported that a site inspection had been arranged, bringing in Chris Chestnutt, and that this meeting would seek to prioritise maintenance work. Our architect would be involved in drawing up plans for a programme of works.

Car Parking: Appreciation was expressed to both John and Ann Nesling, and to Andy and Eunice Mayhew for their vital help in allowing us car parking space.

2012 Church Attendance: the average size of congregations had remained more or less stable. There had been five weddings and a number of funerals all of which had seen a full church. The church had similarly been full for our Special Jubilee Service in June.

I hope you will have read the note we included in the Benefice Magazine late last year telling you that the Great Bealings Parish Council want to produce a Neighbourhood Plan for the village.

As a first step in a consultation process that is designed to ensure that the Plan reflects what you, the residents of Great Bealings, are concerned about and want to see represented in the Plan, we are planning to have a meeting at the Angela Cobbold Hall in the next couple of months when we would like to have your views. We will let you know the date as soon as the Working Group has met and agreed the timetable. We do hope you will come along and share your thoughts with us in what will be a relaxed and informal session even though it has a serious purpose. Refreshments will be on offer.

REPORT BY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR TONY FRYATT

The District Council have put in a submission regarding EAOW. Regarding the Sizewell consultation they have said that the B1078/79 cannot be used for traffic. Ward members will be reduced from 55 to 44. The District Council's proportion of Council Tax is not being put up. The District Council is still heavily involved in the Core Strategy modifications.

REPORT BY COUNTY COUNCILLOR PETER BELLFIELD

Peter Bellfield reported that he had expressed his concern regarding the EAOW's cable route usage of the highways at the last cabinet meeting. The County Council will be going ahead with the completion of school re-scheduling since it has been producing better standards. Of the 7,427 applications for secondary school places 97 ½ % of these got the school of their choice. Peter Bellfield reported that the merger between Cambridge and the Suffolk Fire Service is off. He reported that the

Ipswich Borough Council's proposals for Northern Fringe developments is inadequate. An amendment was put forward in a cabinet meeting that they were very disappointed and they recommended refusal of the planning application. The adverse effect on adjoining villages may significantly affect Great Bealings. The Locality budget has been raised from £8.000 to £12.000.

CONSULTATION ON THE CORE STRATEGY - MAIN MODIFICATIONS TO DOCUMENT

The consultation runs until the 5th April and the Core Strategy is in place until 2021. An additional 7.900 houses will need to be built. Comments to note are that there is significant reference to the Eastern Ipswich Plan Area - between Martlesham and Ipswich boundaries. The requirement is for over 2.000 houses which does not include the proposed development at Adastral Park. We are not in the Eastern Ipswich Plan Area however we are adjacent to it (Little Bealings and Playford). The Core Strategy is putting extra pressure on green field sites. It was resolved to draft a response to the consultation expressing our concerns.

EAST ANGLIA ONE WINDFARM

Comments have been submitted and we will hear in due course whether we have a chance to speak at the hearing.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN - PROGRESS REPORT

The Chairman reported that we have the green light to go ahead with the Neighbourhood Plan. It was resolved to ask for an 8 week consultation period. This would be beneficial to maximise publication of our intention to carry out a Plan. Statutory consultees will also be notified and those people with an interest will be asked to register with the Clerk.

12PT REP

Colin Hedgley is the new 12PT rep for the Council.

PI ANNING

C12/2322 Bridge House, Lodge Road, Great Bealings, IP13 6NW Single Storey Rear Extension Permission has been granted by SCDC.

HIGHWAYS

Eric Barnett reported that he had had a meeting with Derek Oldham primarily to talk about raising the height of the bund at the Boot Street bridge. Mr Oldham had confirmed that they could re-instate it. The issue of water running on and down the Woodbridge Road (beyond Birds Hill) when it could be channelled into the gullies and ditch was discussed and it was agreed to consult the farmer/landowner. The residents of Hasketon Road will require a written response

from the area engineer who visited them to discuss the volume, size and speed of traffic along this road.

FINANCE

The Clerk's salary was authorised for payment as was the annual subscription to Community Action Suffolk — both these payments had been budgeted for.

WYNAUD TRUST

We have recently received a newsletter which provides an update on the Trust's work during 2012. All Saints here in Little Bealings supports this charity in Kabulemena in Zambia sending donations from various raffles and fundraising lunches which we hold during the year.

We are impressed to read of all the progress they are making in this community and I follow with a summary of some of their achievements

School Fee Programme - This provides support for children, mainly orphans to continue their education. So far 47 children are supported by this programme where the fees range from £8 to £20 per term. Individuals can also sponsor a child.

Teacher Training - This had been provided by two of the trustees from the UK for teachers in both Kabulamema and a neighbouring village Mumbeii.

Equipment Provision - With the generosity of the Trusts supporters they have been able to supply more textbooks,

educational resources, 10 laptops, a multimedia projector and generator and various learning equipment.

The Trust also encourages other initiatives, the making of craft goods. This year baskets, jewellery and clothing items were brought back to the UK for sale. Several of the scarves were bought by Little Bealings ladies who are now wearing them during this cold weather!! An agricultural initiative has been supported but this is difficult as the government controls the farming cooperatives and limit how much seed they can buy. However their Honey Business is thriving and they hope to be exporting to the UK and other countries before too long so watch out for this which may come to M&S, Waitrose and Holland & Barrett

Health Projects - Mothers are encouraged to attend clinics both for their own health during pregnancy and the delivery of their babies and to continue sessions to help the mothers to understand the importance of child development in their early years.

This is a very brief summary and the full report can be seen on the notice board in our church.

It is very encouraging to read of all the Trust's achievements and they are very grateful for our continued support. Thank you to all of you who have given so generously at our fundraising events. When Nigel and Alison were here last autumn they were telling us that the money we give goes a long way out there, and every pound we send goes straight to the charity.
