

hristmas wouldn't be Christmas without singing the Twelve days of Christmas at least once during the festivities, but did you know that the song was possibly written as a religious code? Some people believe that it was used when openly talking about Christianity and things Christian could get you killed. So the partridge was Jesus: the two turtle doves the Old Testament and Hebrew scriptures because doves were sacred birds. The three French hens represented the three virtues of faith. hope and love, hens being habitual birds in their behaviour. Then the four calling or colly birds became the story of Jesus as found in the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Colly or calling birds are blackbirds who sing through the day and night. The famous five gold rings signify here the first five books of the Bible, often known at the Pentateuch. The six geese a-laying represent the six days of creation and the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit (Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Fortitude, Knowledge, Piety and Fear of the Lord) become the beautiful swans. The eight maids a milking are the beatitudes, the sayings of Jesus as found in St Matthew's Gospel chapter five, and the nine dancing ladies represent the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit, (love, joy, peace patience, kindness, goodness faithfulness, gentleness, and self control.) The Ten leaping Lords cannot be anything other than the Ten Commandments and the eleven apostles, those followers of Jesus who faithfully spread the word are the eleven pipers of the song. Lastly the twelve drummers are those who drum out the beat of the twelve doctrines of the Apostles Creed. If you want to check out the last one then pop into any church and look up the service of Matins or Evensong in a prayer book. About halfway through you will find the Apostles Creed which starts "I believe in God". I wish you all a Holy and Blessed Christmas and a New Year that gives you time for refreshment and peace.

ACTIONS FROM THE BEALINGS AND PLAYFORD PARISH PLAN

What's Been Achieved So Far?

The Action Monitoring Group has been progressing the actions from the Parish Plan for the last 18 months or so, and I thought the end of the year would be a good time to summarise what's happened so far.

After the Parish Plan was complete, we had funding of something over £1000 remaining, which we agreed with Suffolk ACRE (the sponsoring organisation) should be spent on implementing some of the Actions from the plan. After a fair amount of investigation on what would be most appropriate, it has now been agreed that 2/3 of the money will be spent on Bealings Village Hall – probably on security lighting; and 1/3 will be spent on sandbins in Playford to help villagers get around in the winter.

ENEWS GROUP: We have set up a mailing list that covers all 3 villages and sends information of general interest to around 135 people. If you would like to be added to this list, please send an email to bealingsplayfordnews@googlemail.com.

IMPROVE COMMUNICATION: The Benefice Newsletter is now available online, linked from the local parish websites. We've also improved local knowledge of how to report problems, find bus services, find information about the villages, etc. We have tackled this with a regular entry in the benefice newsletter giving contact points for these issues. Please let us know of any other contacts that would be useful.

SCHOOL PARKING: A number of meetings have been held to discuss and improve the issue of parking provision and road safety for residents and those taking children to Bealings school.

Great Bealings has also tried to improve the footpath provision to allow parents to walk to the school without the need to walk along Boot St. At present there is no agreement with the land owner, but discussions are continuing.

GOOD NEIGHBOURS: We have set up a Good Neighbour scheme, where people with mobility problems who are unable to do things like collect prescriptions or make minor domestic repairs (changing a light bulb, for example) can leave a message and request help. If you need help the number to call is 01473 857796

FILM CLUB: Two residents of Little Bealings have run a film club in the autumn half term and were very pleased with the enthusiasm shown by local children. Playford will be having a film show just before Christmas.

ROAD SAFETY: There have been a number of meetings concerning road safety, especially in Great Bealings.

NOISE FROM HELICOPTERS: We contacted the Army at Wattisham. In response they offered a visit to the station, and on November 2, 17 residents took the opportunity to see what goes on there so they could understand better the need for the aircraft.

That's a brief overview of some of the things we have done, working with the Parish Councils and others. I hope it's of interest and you've found some of what we've done useful. ACTION MONITORING GROUP

Follow up to Parish Plan Actions

One of the actions from the Parish Plan was to contact the local airfield about helicopter noise. This was duly done and an invitation received for interested people to make a visit to Wattisham Airfield on 2nd November.

A group of 18 people from Bealings and Playford went along. Wattisham Airfield is now under the control of the Army for the service and maintenance of all Apache Attack helicopters in the UK. Personnel and aircraft from Wattisham are currently on active duty in Afghanistan or training in the desert areas of the USA.

The airfield also hosts the local Police helicopter and the Sea King helicopter which is used for air sea rescue.

First of all we spent time in the museum which houses a huge collection of memorabilia depicting the history of the station from construction in 1937, through the RAF and USAAF involvement in the 2nd World War, right up to the present day.

We were then escorted to a hanger where we were given a talk by the Station Commander followed by a look at several different aspects of airfield activities. Most interesting were the two Apache Attack helicopters. We had a pilot and several engineers to give us their different viewpoints of operation and were encouraged to investigate by climbing into and over the aircraft.

Other exhibits included an enormous refuelling truck called OshKosh; survival equipment as used by pilots who have to ditch at sea; the fire engine for the airfield; and a communications truck and tent.

All exhibits were manned by knowledgeable army personnel who explained usage of the equipment and were happy to answer any questions.

Visitor days are organised on a regular basis, so contact the airfield if you fancy going along.

MEMORIAL SERVICE – Peggy Honore – Tuesday 9 November

This took place in a full church, testimony to the full and active role that Peggy had played in village life, before declining health meant an enforced move down to Dorset. Peggy's son, Anthony, paid a moving tribute to his mother, painting a picture of her in all shades and tones of colours. She had married in 1936 but had been condemned to early widowhood. However, being of a feisty spirit, she had remarried and set out for Kenya where she had spent many good years with her late husband, Ted. Before that she had nursed severely handicapped children, worked in the control tower at Croydon airport, and been a PA/Secretary, despite the fact that she couldn't type! In

her Bealings years she had filled 60 pages with her life story, and enjoyed travel, fishing and painting. Indeed she had sold some of her pictures. She and Ted are now at peace in the churchyard, but the Cedar of Lebanon in the centre of the churchyard will remind us of them for many years to come. Our thanks to all who provided such a splendid array of flowers for a lady who, herself, featured for many years on the flower roster.

CONCERTS

Our autumn concert season included two contrasting concerts, catering for elastic tastes which could stretch from a brass band to a string quartet. Over £550 was raised for the church organ fund and the PCC are immensely grateful to those who supported the concerts in such heartening numbers. The Woodbridge Excelsior Band played for us on Saturday 6th November, bringing along some two dozen performers with an age range of about 70 years! Resplendent in their red uniforms the members of the band squeezed into the chancel and choir stalls and played a full range of brass band music, as well as giving some insight into the traditions of this form of music. True to the northern traditions of brass bands, we had an authentic Yorkshire accent to quide us through the proceedings. There was, unsurprisingly, no lack of volume, and one or two people found that their hearing aids were somewhat challenged.

The second concert was given by The Kertesz String Quartet on Saturday 20th November in Annesley, thanks to the kindness and congenial hosting of Chris and Judy Chestnutt. This was the inaugural appearance of the guartet, conprofessional musicians. sistina of brought together by Farran Scott (Douse). They gave a capacity audience a musical treat, performing pieces by Haydn and Mozart on period instruments. It was not difficult to imagine that one was enjoying the privilege of hearing the music in an 18th century royal court

Our concerts are becoming well established, and this creates a level of expectation, both in and beyond our villages. We would be very grateful to receive ideas and suggestions for future concerts. Perhaps some of our supporters have contacts whom they might press into service, knowing that performers will enjoy the warmth and musical intimacy of a village occasion. Hopefully we showed our gratitude to this year's performers by supporting them in numerical strength and by providing a good range of refreshments for them as well as for the audience. The benefits of these occasions are, of course, musical and financial, but also, and unquantifiablv. social.

Notes from the Little Bealings Parish Council Meeting held on 15 November 2010

BEALINGS SCHOOL PARKING

The school had advised that it would try

to update the Travel Plan. In addition a parent at the school, Alasdair McEwan. was keen to take a lead in improving road safety and parking, working with the Village Hall, Governors and parents. A member of FOBs had joined the Village Hall Management Committee and it was planned to mark out the car park. Other proposals would be investigated and a newsletter issued to parents. A meeting of the Bealings Road Safety Group would take place when proposals were ready. If you have ideas for improving School Parking and Road Safety in the area please contact Alasdair McEwan by email: bradfords@fastmail.co.uk or via the Parish Council.

SIGNS FOR VILLAGE HALL PLAYING FIELD AND SCHOOL

The Village Hall had been advised during a RoSPA inspection that 'children playing' signs should be installed on the road. Costings for two signs had been obtained from SCC, but there was no budget provision. It was agreed to ask SCC to consider combining the new signs with improved School signing, and that the costs would then be met by the Village Hall and Parish Council. Mr Bellfield would also be asked to contribute from his SCC Locality Budget.

HIGHWAYS

Further damage to the bollards by the verge path to the playing field had been repaired. A missing 'Holly Lane' sign had been reported. Repairs to the church footpath had been carried out by SCC, but those to the footpath at the bottom of the playing field were not considered satisfactory. SCC would be contacted again. The poor quality of the resurfacing work in Playford Road had been drawn to SCC's attention. provements were planned, but could not take place until the spring. A resident in Playford Road had raised concerns about the speed and volume of traffic. PCSO Justin Moss agreed to visit and see if a speed check could be carried

out. SCC had been asked to pass the results of the current traffic monitoring to the parish council. White lining and other traffic calming methods would be investigated again.SCC had been advised that there were three grit/sand bins in the parish and one volunteer to spread sand.

PARISH PLAN ACTIONS

The Parish Council decided the remaining funds should be spent on extra security lighting for the Village Hall.

PLANNING

SCDC's Town and Parish Planning Forum had been attended by Mr Beaumont and Mr Carr. There were to be various changes to improve communication with parishes over applications. Major issues were proposed, housing at Martlesham (for which there was no application), a further nuclear reactor at Sizewell and sea defences.

Ipswich Borough Council had published proposed changes to its LDF Core Strategy and Policies, as a result of the removing of regional house building targets, and which included changes to the Northern Fringe area. See www.ipswich.gov.uk/

NETWORK BAIL MAST

Network Rail had been asked about the mast it had installed near the station, as it was visible from Sandy Lane. It had replied that the mast was part of a new railway radio communication system to improve safety, punctuality and efficiency. Consultations had been carried out, but these had not included the Parish Council. It was agreed to ask Network Rail if the mast could be painted to blend in more and, as local mobile phone signals were poor, if it could be used by phone companies. Rail would also be asked if they had any community budget to contribute to parish initiatives.

APPLICATIONS

C10/2781: Leawood House, Sandy Lane: Insertion of roof lanterns and solar panels on flat roof and raised terrace There was

no objection to this application.

POLICE

PCSO Justin Moss reported that there had been two reported crimes in the parish since the last meeting: theft of copper from a garden and an injury from a dangerous dog. The next Police Community Engagement Meeting would be on 9th December in Rushmere Village Hall at 6.30pm. The possibility of a police meeting preceding the Annual Parish Meeting next year would be explored.

FINANCE

Mrs Hopkins and Mrs Wilson reported on the SCDC Budget Review Meeting. Savings of 28% over four years were being sought, across SCC, SCDC and the Police. Services would be reduced. considerable. It was likely that it would be up to individual parishes to decide upon and pay for the services they required in many cases - such as verge cutting. The second half of the precept for 2010/11 had been received from SCDC, together with funds from SCC for footpath cutting, the Open Weekend Grant for the Bealings Challenge Cup and a share of the insurance premium for the wooden village sign from Gt Bealings Parish Council. Cheques were signed for the Open Weekend Grant and the Clerk's salary and expenses. The Budget for 2011/12 was approved. There would be nil increase in the precept. In the event that SCC did not fund footpath cutting in 2012, this would be met from Parish Council reserves. SCDC had advised that around £500 should be allowed to cover expenses in the event of a contested Parish Council Election being necessary on 5 May 2011

Notes from the meeting held on 3rd November 2010.

MATTERS ARISING FROM MINUTES:-BT PHONE BOX

The phone box has been cleaned and the pane of glass replaced.

SANDBOXES

Two sandboxes have been positioned and filled with sand by the probation team. A third one is to be positioned on the corner of Hill Farm Road and Church Road where sand is deposited anyway. The probation team have also cleared the culverts on Hill Farm Road. The Chairman reported that they have done a good job.

REPORT BY CLLR PETER BELLFIELD

Mr Peter Bellfield informed Councillors that they cannot cut their budget by 28% or £110 million and leave things as they stand. He went some way as to explain "Divestment" but it is at the conceptual stage at the moment – the only

one decision they have made is to close the Bury Road Park and Ride which will save them £1/4 million a year. He reassured Councillors (on shutting care homes as had been reported in the EADT) that no one is ever likely to be turned out of a care home. Mr Peter Bellfield reported that they can't cut costs in education which is the single largest expenditure they have. The next largest expenditure is Adult care followed by Highways. Council tax is unlikely to go up by more than 2.5% thus ensuring that County Council a grant from the government.

HIGHWAYS

Footpath 20 is an on-going problem. The dyke on the corner of Church Lane and Butts Road is still full of mud and needs cleaning out. Steve Aldous from Highways is dealing with this.

The drain opposite Copyhold in Church Lane is still completely blocked and needs seeing to. Again Steve Aldous is dealing with this.

SCDC have cut back the brambles and an ivy bust down Dr Watson's Lane.

The dead tree overhanging the road in Spring Meadow has been cut back.

The road paving outside "High Meadows" is unsatisfactory. The kerbing stones have narrowed the road. Mr Peter Bellfield is dealing with this.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

In light of this Councillors felt they could not support the application.
