You may have heard the story of the man who won £1,000,000 on the lottery. The next day his wife was at the front door, picking up the huge amount of post. She called out to her husband, "What shall I do with all the begging letters?" "Oh, for heavens' sake, we're not made of money! Keep sending them out, of course!"

I know Christmas is coming because (even before November 1st!) I've already had several appeals and unrequested Christmas cards from charities. Crisis at Christmas, Salvation Army, St Martin's-in-the-fields, The Ebola Crisis. And why shouldn't they tap into the seasonal spirit of goodwill? Many of them see even greater need in December, especially in contrast to the "extras" many of us look forward to at this time of year. (One response is to beat them to it – to decide (perhaps prayerfully) on a generous amount and send it off, before we brave the supermarkets or buy presents for the kids.)

But where did this tradition of giving at Christmas come from? (And some other religions have a similar custom, of course.) For Christians it comes from God taking the initiative in "giving" us Jesus-unrequested and undeserved — to show us a better way of living, to die for us, and to give us the hope of life beyond death. (Don't let these "religious beliefs" put us off exploring further. Many of us find it difficult to get our heads round them!) And so, in response to God's generosity, we give to others – family, friends, people in need.

I had a relation who we found it impossible to think of presents for. So we used to send a cheque. Years later he hadn't got round to paying the cheques in, so he hadn't enjoyed what we'd given him. I know someone from one of my past parishes a bit like that. Sue had heard the Christmas story many times. But after one particular carol service she decided to make it personal. She asked God to become real to her. The "lovely nativity story for children" became the wonderful focus for the whole of her life, and years later, for her husband too.

We have the opportunity to make a difference to others at Christmas. Perhaps Christmas will also make a difference to us.

After the interviews a recommendation is sent to the Bishop, who then makes the appointment. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we know the outcome before Christmas, and so can be looking forward to the installation of a new priest some time in the New Year!

CHURCH MAINTENANCE PROJECT

As you will see from the item published

under FOGBC, we are making good progress. The works are in full swing, which has meant that the church has not been available for normal use. We regret that the Stir Up Sunday Workshop had to be moved to Playford, and apologise for any inconvenience. Once the old plaster had been removed, it became clear that the underlying dampness was worse than anticipated, so the bare walls had to be given extra time to dry out, before application of the fresh plaster.

We will have to monitor progress carefully, as any further delay might affect services on 30th November (8.00 Holy Communion) and 7th December (Songs of Praise). Please be alert to

notices which may refer to these two services. We have every hope and expectation that there will be no problem with the programme from 14th onwards: the Carol Service, the Concert, and the Christmas Day Service, as these requirements were all fully factored in to the schedule of work.

FRIENDS OF GREAT BEALINGS CHURCH

Last month we were pleased to report that we have raised sufficient funds to start the substantial works programme required to take St Mary's securely into the future. The contractors have now been on site for about a month, and visitors to the church will have noticed the impact of these works. The contractors have been at great pains to cover everything up, in order to reduce the possible effects of dust and debris. All the rotten plaster has now been removed, and fresh plaster is about to be applied. That will need to dry out, before re-decoration can commence, so

the hope is that the pews can be returned to normal positions in time for the Christmas period and then removed again after Christmas to allow for the redecoration. The external works will also take place once the risk of severe frost has receded.

Significant work is also being carried out on the Seckford Memorial.

Readers will recall that the £15,000 grant from Viridor was conditional on our being able to support this with 10% of that sum, raised as independent local third party contributions. We are delighted to say that, at the time of writing, we are close to our target certainly sufficiently close to apply for payment of the grant. If you still intend to support us in this respect, please don't think that that the need is now fulfilled - we are still, at the time of writing, just short of our £1500 target. and we are also very much hoping to erect a new flagpole, by way of celebrating the completion of these works, and further sums of money can help us achieve that objective.

LITTLE BEALINGS PARISH COUNCIL

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 3 November 2014

PARISH COUNCIL VACANCY

Mrs Toni Cornish had resigned from the Council, due to pressure of other commitments. SCDC had advised that no election had been requested. Co-option of a new Councillor could therefore take place at the next meeting.

Mrs Rogers was appointed the Council's replacement representative on the Village Hall Management Committee, but a new representative on the 12PT and SAVID Groups would wait until after the co-option. Mr Hunter undertake would the quarterly reconciliation of the Council's accounts.

PLANNING

DC/14/3114/FUL: BLEWBURY, PLAYFORD ROAD: PROPOSED REPLACEMENT DWELLING

It was agreed to support this application.

FINCHES HILL, THE STREET: CERTIFICATE OF LAWFUL USE EXISTING FOR A SWIMMING POOL ENCLOSURE

SCDC had advised that a further application had been submitted for a Certificate of Lawful Use

EAOW3

The applicant had advised that only one access was likely, from Holly Lane at the point where the corridor crossed the road, but submission of the application would not take place until 2015.

DC/14/1125/OUT: VALCOT AND ACACIA COTTAGES, THE STREET: DEMOLITION **EXISTING** TWO DWELLINGS, WORKSHOP UNIT AND ASSOCIATED OUTBUILDINGS ERECTION OF FOUR DWELLINGS WITH **GARAGES** AND CREATION OF NEW CENTRALISED VEHICULAR ACCESS

SCDC had granted outline permission and the reserved matters included a contaminated land assessment and remediation plan, a sewerage treatment plant and a surface water strategy. SCDC also had significant concerns about the submitted indicative layout, form and scale of the dwellings, which were considered to be suburban in character and inappropriate for the location. It had advised that a terrace of modest dwellings set on a similar arrangement to the existing pair of cottages may be appropriate.

DC/13/0393: STABLES OPPOSITE BRIMAR, THE STREET: CHANGE OF USE TO RIDING ESTABLISHMENT

SCDC had advised the applicant that they did not have planning permission, and of the outstanding information which was still required to resolve the matter.

SINKS PIT

SCC had contacted SCDC about the operating hours of an aggregate business at the site.

IPSWICH POLICY AREA GROUP

The Chairman of the Group had advised that, although Little Bealings was included in the area, the purpose of the Group was to discuss such issues as socio-economic trends and traffic infrastructure and it was not intended to allocate housing from the Borough to District parishes.

SCDC SITE SPECIFIC POLICY REVIEW

The sites put forward for housing development in the parish (the former Grove Farm buildings and the Manor Farm site) had both been rejected by SCC due to the lack of footways.

HIGHWAYS

HALL ROAD CROSSROADS

SCC was contacting BT about the positions of the green boxes.

FLOODING IN THE STREET

It was considered that this was much worse than in previous years and the Environment Agency would be asked to consider if it was a result of a lack of dredging of the river.

TREES IN THE STREET

Two leaning trees would be reported to SCC.

FOOTPATHS

FP3 had suffered subsidence, which had been reported to SCC.

20 mph SPEED LIMIT FOR THE STREET County Councillor Peter Bellfield had advised that SCC Cabinet was soon to consider a new 20pmh policy as a result of a new impetus to lower the speed of rural traffic.

POLICE

PCSO Moss was unavailable to attend the meeting. There had been no recorded crime in the parish during September or October.

FINANCE

The budget for 2015/16 was approved, with no increase in the precept. There was a requirement to show a contingency sum of £641 in case of a Parish Council election next May. £100 had been included as a 'Locality Charity Budget' for those charities able to show that they are active in parish. Please advise the Clerk if you are aware of a charity which meets this criteria. Cheques were signed for the Clerk's salary and expenses and PAYE.

PARISH AND DISTRICT COUNCILLORS
SCDC was urging Parish Councils to

encourage a diversity of backgrounds and talents and promote Parish Council elections to be held in 2015.

District Councillor Tony Fryatt had advised that one of the three District Councillors who would represent the new SCDC Woodbridge ward would be specifically responsible for the rural parishes included in it.

NEXT MEETING

The next scheduled meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday 5 January 2015. During the first 15 minutes of all Council meetings the public are welcome to raise any matters of concern with Councillors. The public may also speak for a maximum of 3 minutes on any item on the Agenda at the beginning of that item.

PLAYFORD

PLAYFORD CHURCH NEWS

As winter approaches any work on the outside of the church becomes problematical. Even the simple task of keeping the grass cut and the grounds neat and tidy are jobs that are very weather dependent. Even so, some things still have to be done. Two weeks ago we arranged for a building firm to inspect the church roof, especially the capping stones that had been highlighted in the guinguennial report. So on a breezy Tuesday morning our intrepid church surveyor found himself with a builder atop a "cherry picker" tapping, banging and generally giving a 'good looking at' the church roof. I had hoped that it would be generally good news. But it was not to be and work needs to be done. However it will have to wait until the spring when more favourable conditions will exist. A précis of the interim report is produced here so that everyone is aware of what is involved.

- 1: West gable wall: the flint work is in good order, but the capping's are very loose, especially on the north side, and the gable cross is both loose and broken (shattered). One stone on the top of the North West buttress is also in poor condition.
- 2: East Gable (limited access): this all seems to be fairly tight, but the flint facing on the north end of the east wall is hollow, probably due to previous water penetration, but does not need urgent repair.
- 3: Crossing wall between nave and chancel: inspected both sides from the platform and ladders. There is an old dated repair (1897) on the south side which has become detached. A structural stitch needs to be incorporated here and some flint core and face work rebuilt. North side

appears to be in better condition. The wall is out of plumb and is irregularly level at the midpoint but it appears to have been built/repaired like this.

4: Vestry north upstand gable: the York stone capping's sound, although they appear to be poorly bedded from ground level. The gable cross is a little loose and recommend rebidding.

It is anticipated that the building work will cost between £6000 and £8000.

On another note, as we draw ever nearer to Christmas, may I remind you of the opportunities to sponsor the floodlighting of the church during the Christmas period? For those of you that have never experienced the magic of going up to the church when it is floodlit at night I strongly recommend it. Especially if it is raining, it is glorious. Additionally, many thanks to all those who have supported the scheme over the past twelve months, without you there would be no lights. ACTION POINT REVIEW

We are still awaiting new grit bins for Butts Road to replace the smashed ones – they have been promised by this winter. Also still awaiting repairs to Byway19 and a report from Highways on it. Blocked drain in Church Lane has been fixed. Build-up of silt in road near Clematis Cottage has now been cleared. Safety issue reported re ponies & riders entering Butts Road from FP halfway up hill to the north - alternative routes suggested as an interim measure. FP no 8 to Lt Bealings school needs clearing again - this has been reported twice. The general state of the footpaths is giving rise for concern and Peter Bellfield's assistance will be sought to try to resolve this matter.

See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details of these items.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

County Councillor, Peter Bellfield unable to attend due to illness but reported via clerk that Education in Suffolk is now back on track and that an extra £10m has been allocated to better Broadband coverage.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

District Councillor, Steven Hudson reported that SCDC had successfully passed the annual audit and that plans were afoot to move premises in the near future although the precise location was as yet undisclosed until contracts had been signed.

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Sally Thomas sent apologies for absence. There were no crimes reported in the last two months but one report of harassment was received

FINANCE

Cheques were authorised to SCS for an extra wheelie bin, to HMRC for tax on clerk's salary, Old Parsonage for grass cutting services, Joan Metcalfe was reimbursed for signs for the field gates at the village hall & an engraved plaque for the new bench on the Green, Clerk's expenses were paid and a cheque issued for the new grit bin.

This year's budget is on track and 2015's budget will be agreed at the next meeting in January.

Online banking is now being used and a change to the Financial Standing Orders was sanctioned to enable the clerk to set up payments to herself if necessary or to another authorised signatory as long as these had been previously agreed at a meeting and were recorded in the minutes. It was unanimously agreed to add Tim Llewellyn as an additional signatory to the Bank account.

RISK ASSESSMENT

A table of items to be considered on a regular basis has been drawn up and these will be reviewed by councillors. They include the state of the playing field, car park, glass recycling area,

footpaths and trees.

LAIS1367 - CHANGES TO RIGHTS OF WAY

The pathway from C330 across the field to C3311 is as yet unregistered. The clerk will enquire as to the procedure involved.

OTHER MATTERS

We have now received funds from the Enabling Communities budget for refurbishment of the notice board, the new bench and new grit bin on the village triangle. It is hoped that a favourable reply will soon be given from the Outdoor Playspace Scheme with regard to the basket ball net & post for the playing field.

Quotes have been received for repainting white railings on the river bridge but satisfactory results of an analysis of paint samples must first be processed before a go ahead can be given.

A plan of parking places at the village hall has been drawn up to indicate the bays so that parking in front of the field gates does not occur again — it was agreed to purchase a Brake/Glass kit for the key to the gates for emergency use.

Dates for 2015 meetings have been agreed and will be published on the village website soon.

Thanks go to Sam Webber for offering to remove the rotting logs from the playing field.

The village sign is still undergoing renovation – it is taking longer than anticipated due to extensive rot, but we hope to have it reinstalled soon.
