HAVE YOUR SAY ON NEW 'SUPER DISTRICT' COUNCIL

Following a recent independent survey of 1,000 local residents which showed that a clear majority of people are in favour of a new council for east Suffolk, we are now asking all residents for their views.

A decision to combine the Wavenev and Suffolk Coastal District Councils, and create a brand new 'super district', delivering services to communities in east Suffolk, will be taken in January; however both councils are determined to hear the views of as many local people as possible before a final decision.

With this in mind, an independent telephone survey by leading research consultancy ComRes was conducted in October. One thousand local people, representing the different backgrounds of people who live in east Suffolk, were asked a number of questions about the proposals. Of these, four out of five respondents (78%) expressed a favourable or neutral view about the proposals and of those who "don't know" (20%), the majority then expressed a favourable view when provided with more information about the plans.

Now, we are asking EVERYONE in the two districts to tell us what they think, as part of an engagement campaign which is running until December 12th. Residents are invited to read the proposal summary and email their views about the plans to

It is the view of both Council Leaders that a new, larger organisation would be better placed to address a range of challenges and better serve our local communities by ensuring that crucial services are protected and sustained. Both are determined to do so while maintaining a low council tax base and a new council would be better able to deliver this.

- 2016 retrospective and preview of 2017. A budget meeting was held on November 15th 2016, with Peter Carr, Tim Llewellyn and Norman Porter present. It was agreed that a summary of conclusions should be shared with all who had attended the meeting that re-launched the Magazine earlier in the year and that, subject to their approval, everything should be shared with our readers. We are now pleased to report on the current situation. Those present agreed on the following:
- 1. The revamped Magazine has been broadly welcomed.
- 2. We should always aim to have enough money in the kitty to secure one year's worth of Magazines, and that, subject to sufficient funds being available, we should consider ways in which we might improve the magazine.
- 3. The minimum sum needed for the next year's Magazines: 10 issues x approx £200 = £2000. Income from advertising, donations, standing orders, PCCs and PCs and advertising should at least match that figure. The financial situation is now viable and we should be well placed to get through 2017 without financial difficulties. Parish Councils and PCCs will be formally notified of the situation and invited to kindly continue to give financial support.
- 4. The account with The Yorkshire Building Society is now set up. So far two dozen people have set up 2017 Standing Orders or made donations and we are very grateful to them all. It gives us confidence to proceed as planned.
- 5. Adverts and pricing; advertisers living outside the villages will be sent copies of the re-vamped magazine with the renewal notice. In order to recoup costs per page we are considering advertising rates of: Sixth of a page: £35; quarter page: £50. Half page: £80; Full Page £150 all per annum. Colour advertisements would be 20% extra dependent on discussions with the printer. We can continue to take one-off adverts pro rata.
 - 6. Editorials of 500 750 words will con-

- tinue to be shared amongst the villages, plus 2 for Philip and Celia at Christmas and Easter. More reviews and profiles are needed.
- 7. We remain disappointed that there is no regular input from Bealings School. The school is at the heart of our community and people are very interested in hearing of its achievements and plans.
- 8. Photographs. We welcome them, from whatever source, either for the front cover, or as memories of events. They can be filed away for use as appropriate. Please submit before deadlines.
 - 9. To be further developed:
- I. Monthly diary page. What's On to enable people to plan ahead and avoid clashes
- II. Young people's page young editor sought.
- III. Thought for the month welcome from any source. To compensate for what is perceived as too great a reduction of religious material.
- IV. General news to follow the editorial. Much news seems to be restricted to individual parishes.
- V. Obituaries. We are happy to receive these – contributed by family members or friends.
- VI. Nature notes these valleys are rich in wildlife and many residents have an interest in the natural world around them.
- VII. History on your doorstep. Contributions concerning local history very welcome. We know of potential editors! Example given: History of the village signs, as displayed on the back cover!

It was finally agreed that we should have an annual meeting, to complement the small November budget meeting. This main meeting should be held mid-year around May, to confirm that all involved with the Magazine are happy with progress, and to discuss possible improvements.

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DECEMBER PROFILE ERIC RICHARDSON

Eric and his stands of beautifully crafted walking sticks have been a regular feature at



recent Plant Sales and other local events. Such has been his reputation that he has even had sticks put into the hands of our local bishops who use them as ceremonial crooks. Eric makes his sticks in his small workshop in Lower Street, Great Bealings, and takes enormous pride in what has been a very creative retirement.

That retirement came after a life-time of teaching. Eric hails from South Wales – home of many sheep and crooks - but

moved to these parts for a career which took him to Kesgrave and Thorpeness, before he embarked on a final career move to a post in Ipswich Museum.

The material used is usually local hazel, ideal because of its qualities of straightness and strength, but blackthorn, holly and ash can also be used. Eric's favourite wood is yew. The sticks are normally kept for a year before they are topped and tailed with ornamental heads and brass ferrules – this allows the shape of the stick to settle first. The craftsman in him loves enhancing the natural lines of the grain through oiling and varnishing. Bone and horn is also used.

Eric takes great pride not only in producing his sticks, but the teacher in him still combines with the craftsman and he is more than happy to explain how he does it all, and to pass on his knowledge to others. The following review is of a book. We welcome others, on whatever you may have seen or heard or read - books, films, plays, concerts –anything that may hold some sort of local interest.

MIDWINTER by Fiona Melrose

This first novel by Fiona, the sister of Adrian Melrose, Playford Hall, was launched by Waterstones, both in London and Ipswich. Our review aims to bring it to the attention of readers, rather than presume to judge it on its literary merits. Suffice it to say that it is difficult enough to find publishers for novels in this day and age, and its promotion by Waterstones speaks for itself.

What makes it of particular interest to readers of the Fynn-Lark News it that is was precisely this part of Suffolk which was part inspiration for the novel. The title itself calls to mind residents of Lower Street, Great Bealings — even though you can be assured that it is only the name which has been recycled. There are also references to the Admiral (if only....!), Playford (Manor), a long peninsula, second world war bunkers, the Sandlings, even Norfolk and Norwich, as well as much about pigs, foxes, lots of rabbits, including "rabbit hill", with echoes of Rosery Farm. And crucial action around



rivers and boats. An important part of the novel is also set in Zambia, so it is far from parochial. But don't go away with the idea that the novel is all about place. Much of the action is based on psychological turmoil and revelation – and that powerfully complements the fully drawn background of landscape.

Fiona spent some time living with her brother at Rosery Farm, Great Bealings, and the influences of that time are strongly reflected in this novel. So over to you. Certainly there were many familiar faces at the Ipswich launch, and several copies already scattered around homes in these Fynn-Lark valleys.

The book is published by Littlebrown. ISBN is 9 78172 151780.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Plan completed has now the Independent Examination Inspector has recommended that it may now go forward to a referendum. This is great news and a tribute to all the members of the working group who have put so much time into the process over the last three years. The Inspector was most complimentary about the Plan, its structure and objectives, but has made a few recommendations which affect the wording of the proposed policies so as to make them more effective for the purposes of determining future planning applications. The recommendations do not change either the basic structure or objectives of the policies and they have been approved by the Parish Council. The next step is for Suffolk Coastal to formally approve the Plan which can be done by the cabinet member for planning. Tony Fryatt. Work can then commence on the referendum itself, which is conducted by Suffolk Coastal. The intention is to hold the referendum in February. This notice is to keep you up to date with developments, and the Parish Council will be writing to all residents in due course ahead of the referendum when the actual date has been set. KESGRAVE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN AREA DESIGNATION APPLICATION

SCDC had determined the application, and amended it to only include land in the οf Kesarave. SCDC responded to the Council's letter of complaint and, although the response was considered inadequate. it was resolved not to take the matter further.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN FOR LITTLE **BEALINGS**

It was resolved that as neither the Parish Plan nor the Village Review had identified any demand for housing in the parish, there was nο remit to propose development and therefore no benefit in producing a Neighbourhood Plan for Little Bealings.

SINKS PIT

Planning Application:

Variation of Condition 3 of planning permission SCC\0086\16C to allow an additional 8 months for the removal of all aggregates/waste and materials from the temporary aggregate material stockpile area

The Council was aware that local residents had recently met with the owner of the site and were supportive of the extra time to be allowed, subject to there not being noise during the summer. was therefore resolved to support the application, subject to the stipulation about noise during the summer, and comment that the material could be used for new bunding.

SCC had advised Update from SCC: that the gas flare was being relocated, after which bunding profiling and a planting scheme would be progressed. The acoustic survey was understood to be imminent.



Great Bealings

The season of Advent, which began on the 27th November this year, is the time when we wait and prepare ourselves to greet the Lord Jesus as we celebrate His coming into this world at Christmas. Many of us do not really like new beginnings because they take us into areas of uncertainty and we are reluctant to let go of the things we know and understand, all those things of which we have become most comfortable. And yet this next stage of our journey is not all unknown for we have a familiar story to take with us, the story of a man who looked on outcasts with affection, who spoke words of forgiveness to those who could not find it anywhere else and who died for His friends.

At this time of year there is always a great sense of anticipation and of hope. As we make our plans for Christmas, we can anticipate the variety of services which help us to celebrate the birth of Jesus; school Christmas services, carol services, crib services and the uniquely special service of midnight Mass. We anticipate the celebration of Jesus' birth, not only because it is a great excuse for a bit of a party, but also because His birth gives us hope. Hope for the future. Hope in the midst of much that seems to be changing all around us.

Our Christmas celebrations lead into celebrations of the new year, with a heightened sense of anticipation for all that 2017 might bring. Many will be praying that the next year will be better than the last, others will be going into the new year with a deep sense of anxiety and uncertainty. Yet however we approach the future, it is to do so accompanied by the promise of Jesus to always be with us in whatever it is that life brings; in the happy times and in the sad times, in the pain and also in the joy.

On that first Christmas there was no room at the Inn for the baby Christ, but all will be warmly welcomed to the variety of different services which our churches have to offer this Christmas as we join together in celebrating the birth of Jesus. There literally is 'room for all' because God welcomes each and every one of us, He does not want anyone to be turned away. For Christians we have an important part to play in making the Christmas story a reality both in our own lives and in the lives of other people. Worshipping, serving, growing, sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ is our story as we begin a new year in the life of the Christian Church.

At Christmas, God welcomes us all to celebrate the birth of His Son. May you know the rich blessing of the Christ-child in your life this Christmas.
