Lockdown has somehow made many of us even more aware of how precious and fragile the natural world around us is. We value the beauty and opportunities for enjoyment of the great outdoors in these parts and have enjoyed them during lockdown. But nature does not always look after itself, and sometimes needs a helping hand.



Tree-planting is something we are now encouraged to do on a planetary scale, but it is also something happening within our own villages, as these two pictures illustrate.

NATURE NOTES

LOCAL RAPTORS

When I was a child, a single species of raptor seemed to dominate the skies of Bealings. It was a delicate bird, no longer than a Jay, but had an enviable ability to continuously hover in one place. It was of course the Kestrel. This bird continues to be a watching presence over our landscape, perching on telegraph poles, fences and shed roofs. Its principal prev is voles and mice on to which its "slides" down steeply, pouncing with its talons. The distinct colouring of its plumage is of a blue grev head (male only) and chestnut-barred wings and torso. Watching on early summer morning walks the parent birds teaching their voung how to glide down from an electricity wire and pounce into a field was enchanting.

In less than a decade, another raptor has appeared in large numbers. Its larger presence has filled the skies and the airwaves echo to its eerie call, a high "whee -eur". This is the Buzzard which uses its large broad wings to circle over woodland. Even in the 1990s this bird was described as "very localised" in Eastern England, meaning it was rare or not present in many areas. It has spread rapidly east, along with Red Kites (which have occasionally been spotted over Bealings). Our countryside must be a good place to raise young, with the plentiful supply of rabbits as well as small mammals, worms and beetles. family I have noticed over the summer were flying around Rosery Farm often utilising the thermal uplift from the hill behind it. Buzzards are amongst the biggest birds in our area but, despite this, they do seem plaqued by rocks, crows and indeed kestrels which dive bomb them and force them to move on.

The third species which I have noticed recently on my meanders around our villages is the Sparrowhawk. I cannot comment on the relative numbers which anecdotally seem to have increased, but perhaps I am more attuned to their presence. Many times, I have been

FIFTY YEARS ON anniversary worth noting

With all the restrictions and changes we were subject to in 2020, it was inevitable that many anniversaries and celebrations would be cancelled or pass virtually unnoticed. One particular anniversary of local significance occurred during 2020 and passed without fanfare, which nevertheless deserves some recognition.

A little over 50 years ago now, September 1970 saw the creation of a new and valuable facility in Bealings, namely the village playing field, now known as the John Belstead Playing field. After grass seeding was completed, play equipment was delivered in March 1971 and so the playing field probably came into use in the spring of 1971.

an the pitch. We soon discovered that the goal standing in front of the field which borders Holly Lane was a better option than the one by the road at the other end, where a poorly directed shot on goal would often result in the ball flying over the fence and landing in the road below, often to the consternation of passing motorists and cyclists.

Our games therefore tended to be concentrated around the goal at what became known as the 'Holly Lane end' and we devised our own peculiar form of the game where two teams would play each other, both attacking the same goal, with one 'neutral' goalkeeper attempting to stop whatever came his way. A frequent feature of these games was that of the ball rolling away down the slope into the hedge and nettles at the bottom. 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
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
