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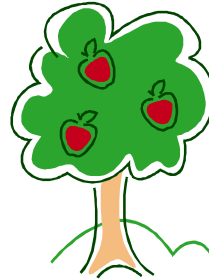
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The King James Bible, also known as the Authorised Bible was published on 2nd May 1611 in England. It was the result of a split between the Catholic Church and the Church of England of the day. King James gave strict instructions that the bible was to conform to the Church of England's doctrine. The bible uses what appears to be Shakespearean English. There was a good reason for this because Shakespeare was very much alive when it was being written. The bible's language is the language of the day and the way English was spoken at that time. The new translation of the Bible was first proposed at the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland at Burntisland in Fife, attended by King James VI, in 1601. The translation was commissioned following the Hampton Court Conference in 1604, by which time James had become James I of England, and it was published in 1611. Known as the Authorised Version, it went on to become the dominant edition in the English-speaking world and remains in widespread use.

In a New Year address, recorded for the BBC the Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, said that a 400-year-old Bible translation could help people see the "big picture" at a time of financial or job pressures. He called on people of all faiths, or even none, to rediscover the King James Bible and said that the edition still had the power to surprise and shock its readers, and provided a context for their lives. This would be vital to a "big society", as envisaged by government ministers, he added. However four hundred years on, its version of "the story of the whole universe" could feel "quite remote", Rowan Williams acknowledged. "You may be the sort of person who feels you can make sense of your own story in

your own terms," he said. "Or you may feel there's only one big story and that's about money and whether I have got a job tomorrow and whether my children can afford higher education." Nevertheless, for people to make sense of their lives, the archbishop said it helps to have a strongly defined story in the background that tells us that we all matter. "Whether you're a Christian or belong to another religion, or whether you have nothing you'd want to call a religion at all, some sort of big picture matters," he says. "If we are going to talk about a 'big society', that will need a big picture, of what human beings are really like and why they're so unique and precious. This year's anniversary is a chance to stop and think about the big picture, and to celebrate the astonishing contribution made by that book 400 years ago."

There are many events planned to mark the occasion, these range from an exhibition at St. John's College in Cambridge including seminars and concerts, a special commemoration stamp issued by the Royal Mail to an hour documentary by the BBC. In our own benefice I propose to use the authorised bible for some of the Gospel readings at our services from the Book of Common Prayer on Sunday at 8am and on Wednesday at Culpho Church at 10.30am. The Book of Common Prayer as we know it is just a little younger than the Authorised Bible being published in 1662! Do come and share with us, you will be most welcome.

After the snow and ice of December we now reach you from the depths of a dark, damp January. There are few signs of spring in the churchyard or around the lanes and meadows. The fields are soggy. Not even the snow-drops have dared show their face as yet. But that is a sight now eagerly anticipated, along with all the other signs of Spring. By way of encouragement there was a slightly sunny weekend in mid-January when the birds could be heard tentatively sending out muted mating calls. So we're almost there. Stick it out –and may you be spared the seasonal ailments.

LOOKING BACK.....OVER TWO MONTHS Christmas

Our own church was the scene of our annual Carol Service, on December 19th, and of the Benefice Midnight Mass on December 24th. Both services were well supported, and it was good to see new faces, as well as many of the regular members of our congregation. Despite the winter chill, we did our best to ensure that the church was well heated and that it offered a warm welcome. It is a time of year when the church becomes a natural focal point of Christmas sentiments so it is good to welcome a wide range of villagers and visitors. The welcome was so much enhanced by the display of beautiful flowers arranged by our team of flower ladies. The stony chill within the building, when it was not in use, ensured that the displays enjoyed an extended life well into January.

Our thanks to Pat Keep for organising carol singing around the village on a very cold December 22nd, and to the Haywood Smith family for warming up the participants with mulled wine at the end of it all The singing - in the immodest opinion of the singers at least - seemed to compensate for relatively low

numbers by high enthusiasm and impressive volume, with occasional harmonies – all echoing beyond doorsteps and around the village. Our thanks to all who braved the cold to take part, and to those who shared their doorsteps with the singers and contributed generously to a sum close on £100, which was passed on to the EACH Tree House Appeal.

Many of the residents of the area around Lower Street will wish to extend their thanks to Diana and Gerry Lawler for their very generous and neighbourly party held immediately after the Carol Service and dovetailing with it.

Despite the very inclement weather, and the difficulties of travelling, only one service had to be cancelled and we pay tribute to our priest, Pauline, for her fortitude and determination to brave the persistent ice and snow and to ensure that our services took place over this period.

Evelyn Dobree

The funeral took place, privately, on 16th December, in St Mary's Church of Evelyn Dobree, until quite recently living in The Rosary. She had once been well known and involved in the life of the village, indeed she had lived in the village before the war (see anecdote below), and had been part of it for some 70 years. Sadly she became afflicted by blindness, an affliction that she bore with great fortitude, even though it effectively cut her off from external activity. She had been living with her family at The Rosary, until she came to need full-time care.

During the war Evelyn worked as a Physiotherapist in Bury St Edmunds. At weekends she would often come home to stay with her aunt, Annie Moor. This involved catching a train to Little Bealings and then being taken by pony and trap to The Rosary. The Moors did, in

fact, own a Rolls Royce Silver Ghost, but because of petrol restrictions were unable to use it. The chauffeur, Ted Jarvis, had to resort to the pony and trap. Unfortunately he hated horses, and Evelyn used to say that she was placed in far greater peril during her short pony-ride back to see her aunt than she ever was by the efforts of the Luftwaffe.

Keith Shepherd

The funeral took place on Friday January 21st of Keith Shepherd, formerly of The Homestead, off Boot Street. Keith had purchased land in the late 1940s – one of the few plots in the village not owned by the Cranworth Estate at the time – and built The Homestead on part of it, later selling on some of the land, previously smallholdings, to Howard Construction. Both Keith and his wife Rachel, who survives him, had lived there until very recently, when poor health meant they had to move into a Nursing Home. They had two children, Jan and Anthony, both of whom were brought up in the village. Jan describes her parents as “Chapel people”, leading relatively private lives. Keith was himself in the building and maintenance business.

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes from the Great Bealings Parish Council Meeting held on 11 January 2011

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES:-

Coffee Caravan – This will be visiting Great Bealings on Wednesday, 30th March between 11 am and 1 pm at the village hall. Come and enjoy a free cup of tea/coffee and cake.

Re: Scrutiny of the District Council's Planning Service. Anyone wanting to comment on any planning issues should let the Clerk know by end of May 2011.

REPORT BY COUNTY COUNCILLOR PETER BELLFIELD

Mr Peter Bellfield reported that no savings are expected to come from the New Strategic Direction and "Divestment" until 2013 so the current budget has been set accordingly. There are two separate aspects at present: - What to do for the coming year; and the subsequent two years when the New Strategic Direction should save between £110 million and £120 million. Mr Peter Bellfield reported that the number 70 bus service will be reduced with the evening service being entirely withdrawn. Other services will be cut and he said that he hoped volunteers would come forward. He reported that there is a freeze on recruitment except in exceptional circumstances and as people leave their positions they are not being replaced. The County Council has saved £70 million in the last 5 years.

REPORT BY MR LUKE BARBER ON TRAFFIC CALMING IN BOOT STREET

Mr Luke Barber talked about the possibilities outlined in two plans for traffic calming in Boot Street. The first plan is a consultation drawing which shows proposals afforded by the Quality of Life Scheme. The second plan shows further measures obtainable in the future subject to additional funding. He confirmed that the first plan provides white

lining, the painting of gateways, an extra 30 mph sign and roundels. This could possibly be done for around £1,500, our budget of £3,500 approx would more than cover these costs. Scenario 2 on the other hand exceeds our budget and could possibly be done for somewhere in the region of £5,000. This plan comes up with "off the peg" solutions in the shape of flashing signs at the beginning and at the end of the village. These would cost somewhere in the region of £6,000 - £8,000 each therefore we would only be able to afford one. Plan 2 was most popular with Councillors. The Chairman suggested holding a public meeting on 15th March 2011 to seek the view of residents and whether further funding could be obtained/raised.

On a different topic the bid for a speed limit on Hall Farm Road is still being investigated by the Highways Department.

Rosery Farm Mr Eric Barnett had received an email from Ms Katherine Scott of the Planning Department saying that she would try and make some progress on this case.

LOCAL DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK

Previous comments (February 2009) had been that Great Bealings should be classified as "Other village". The new document shows that this has now been accepted which means next to no development

FINANCE

A cheque for the Clerk's salary was signed. A new grit bin has been pur-

chased at a cost of £154.71. £333 has been received and banked from Parish Plan funds - this money is earmarked for the Village Hall security lighting.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

- The notice board on Boot Street needs fixing.
- More pot holes have appeared, in particular a very large one on the Hasketon Road and a tree root on the same road. These and others will be logged and reported to the Highways Department.
- The corner of Grundisburgh Road / Boot Street is unkempt and needs tidying.

Another says Thanks for your presented, thanks for your gift, thanks for your care, thanks for your love.

The money will be used not only for the children in the Refuge Centre but also for the creation of businesses – hairdressing and sewing- for those who can find no means of employment other than prostitution.

We also collected games and books. Some of these have been posted and some Mrs Smith hopes to take when she visits the refuge in the Spring.

Once again a very big thank you to you all for supporting the desperate need that Stephen is trying to help in Indonesia.

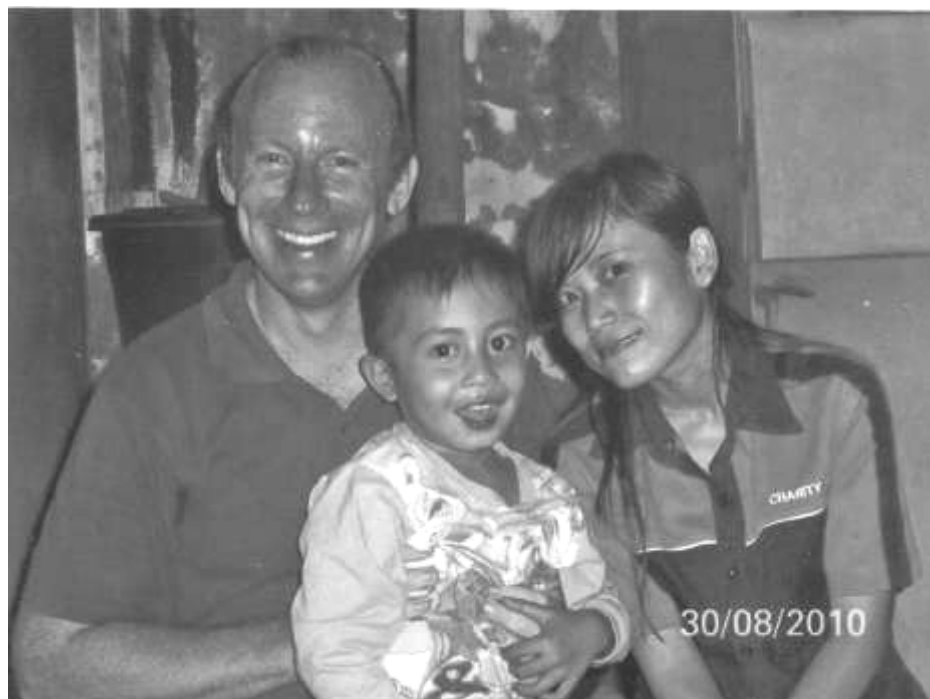

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes from the Playford Parish Council meeting held on 5th January 2011

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES:-

SANDBOXES

REH reported that the lid for the sand-box on the triangle of grass with the telephone box has been replaced.

REPORT BY PCSO JACKIE BYDE

There were no crimes to report. PCSO Jackie Byde did say that now that the

weather has improved the police will be back out with their speed guns. The Chairman asked about white lining and other possible methods for traffic calming in the village. This is to be explored.

REPORT BY CLLR PETER BELLFIELD

The budget for the coming year has gone in front of the Scrutiny Committee. No savings are expected to come in from the New Strategic Direction and "Divestment" until 2013. Cut backs mean that bus routes are being curtailed. The Route 70 and 70a service will be reduced which will affect Playford residents. Subsidised buses are costing the County Council £2 ¼ million a year however and they are proposing to half that.

HIGHWAYS

Footpath 20 – it is likely that some sort of "surface" will be put down.

The dyke on the corner of Church Lane and Butts Road has been cleared.

The clerk has heard back from Mr David Fawcett regarding the road paving outside "High Meadows". He reported that some road sign re-positioning will be carried out. The Chairman agreed to write to Mr Fawcett saying that the work is unsatisfactory.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

C10/1650 Part of garden south east of, Sevenoaks, Butts Road

REH had attended the sub committee meeting and that the planning application has been approved with some conditions. Seven people were in favour with one abstention. Miss Rosie Dinnen, Case Officer informs the clerk that no formal decision has been made yet.

C10/2693 Pantiles, Spring Meadow

Erection of single storey pool room extension.

Permission has been granted by SDCD.

LOCAL DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK

The proposals don't seem to have differed very much from those we had before in the consultation in January 2009. It has changed slightly in that less houses are to be built however it has to be remembered that it is re-

sponding to an increasing population. Playford is classified as "Other village" which means next to no development.

FINANCE

Thank you letters from the Playford Parish Hall, the Benefice Newsletter, East Anglian Air Ambulance, Suffolk Accident Rescue and the Unpaid Works Team have been received for donations made to them this year.

£333 has been received and banked from Parish Plan funds. This money has been used to purchase two grit bins for the village.
