FEBRUARY 2013

February, often described by the poet as the "month of despair." Yet within its 4 weeks, manages to give all of us the opportunity to celebrate a variety of wondrous occasions. February 2nd is the festival of Candlemass, one which traces its roots back to the 5th century, when processions took place with lighted candles in honour of Christ the light of the world.

On the 12th of the month this year we have Shrove Tuesday, or Fat Tuesday, dating back to the middle ages, set aside as a feast day (literally), to end the season of Epiphany, preceding Ash Wednesday, which by contrast heralded the season of fasting and penitence known as Lent. Whilst this period may well be seen as one of deep spirituality, its very existence may have been one of a practical nature; with an absence of food at this time of the year in centuries gone by, such abstinence may have been born out of necessity.

Then on the 14th of every February we celebrate St Valentine. We are told of a Roman Bishop, Valentine, martyred for conducting the marriage ceremonies of young soldiers, banned in those days from wedlock, and now today how such love has spawned a whole new industry.

As we move through the dark days of February, towards the lighter ones of Spring, whether as Christians or otherwise, it is to tread alongside an enduring thread of sacrifice and love, whether that of Jesus Himself as our light, or that for which the Saint was so cruelly martyred. Lent is a period of "giving something up," but paradoxically can also be a time of taking something on board, even something mundane as quiet reflection. Whatever our aims or objectives this Lent, we could do worse than echo the sentiments of St Valentine, "love is not just something we feel, but what we do no matter how we feel."

It only seems five minutes since we were singing carols and writing our Christmas cards, but time moves on apace and February sees the start of Lent. Ash Wednesday is on February 13th, when there will be a service of Holy Communion with the Imposition of ashes at 10.30am in Culpho Church. The weekend before, Playford Church celebrates National Marriage Week with its own Marriage Festival over the weekend of 8-10th February, please do come and share with Playford . Details of the Lent Course to which everyone is welcome whether you attend church or not are also in this magazine.

HOME-START SUFFOLK COASTAL IS COMING TO EAST IPSWICH!

We will be working in Ipswich as part of an initial 1year pilot. Home-Start is a charity providing support to families for whom life can be difficult. Families we support must reside in the East Ipswich area or the Suffolk Coastal District, and have at least 1 child under 5 living at home.

Over the Past year we have provided support to over 100 families who live in the coastal area, helping out families with twins, triplets, Mental Health problems, medical difficulties, Bereavement and families who are Isolated to name a few.

Support is provided by volunteers who are parents themselves or have some experience of parenting. One mum said of our support:

"I can't begin to tell you what this organisation has done for me and my children. I don't even know where to start. I just know I wouldn't be the person I am today if I hadn't had Home-Start in my life."

Volunteers visit as a professional friend, bringing whatever is needed, a confidential listening ear, help with entertaining and playing with children, an extra pair of hands and eyes, and support to help a family through a difficult time.

We are looking to recruit and train up to 30 new volunteers from the Ipswich area. Volunteers can gain accredited level 1 and 2 training, and ongoing support, training and supervision.

Our next training course starts in January 18th 2013 and will run once a week over 9 weeks between 9.30-2.30, and the following course will run from the 25th Feb- 1st of March 9.30-3.00pm.

An awareness of dementia is desirable as you will need to approach tasks in a person-centred manner and respond sensitively to individuals

Mr Colin Hedgley was elected a Councillor of the Parish Council.

REPORT BY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR TONY FRYATT

Tony Fryatt reported that the Boundary Commissioner was reviewing the Electoral Arrangements at SCDC. This includes the overall number of Councillors and ward boundaries.

Flagship Housing Association hopes to improve their performance now their budget has been doubled.

Planning - The LDF Core Strategy has not been accepted.

REPORT BY COUNTY COUNCILLOR PE-TER BELLFIELD

The County Council has been shortlisted for most improved council in the country!

Education – Suffolk is the third worst county in the country for Key Stage 2 and it is pretty bad at GCSE levels too. This is being addressed by SCC. Bealings School came 19th out of 130 schools in the county.

EAST ANGLIA ONE WINDFARM

The next round of consultation runs from the 25th January until the 6th March. It was resolved that Great Bealings Parish Council will register as an interested party. Julian Haywood Smith and Eric Barnett will represent the Parish Council at any further joint discussions with Little Bealings and Playford.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN – PROGRESS REPORT

Sunila Osborne, the Rural Housing Advisor from Suffolk Acre will be attending the next Neighbourhood Plan working group meeting on the 15th January. SCDC will be working together with Planning Aid to support Neighbourhood Plans and they would be consulting for more than the minimum 6 week period so perhaps we should get a decision sometime in the spring.

PLANNING

C12/2214. 1 and 2 Wood Barn Cottages, Seckford Hall Road, Great Bealings, IP13 6NX.

Demolition of Nos. 1 & 2 Woodbarn Cottages and a redundant agricultural building together with the erection of two replacement dwellings and cartlodges and associated private drainage system.

This planning application has been granted approval by SCDC.

HIGHWAYS

Boot Street– Mr Colin Hedgley reports that the Solargen sign and pole for Boot

Street would be going up in 2-3 weeks' time.

Speeding statistics received from the Police for Boot Street were discussed.

It was reported that the "lowering" of the hump backed bridge was due to the shaving down of the tarmac layers that had been deposited over time and resurfacing of the bridge.

Hasketon Boad – Mr Mervin Decker reported that residents of Hasketon Road (or Bealings Lane as it is sometimes known) had met with Mr Tony Buckingham. Highways Area Technician. SCC on site. Mr Decker reported that large farm vehicles and lorries from Tesco's. Morrison's etc. are causing the road to deteriorate dramatically. The overrunning of the edges leave the road 1 - 2foot wider in places and deep, large potholes and rutting has occurred. When the water in these cracks freeze the road will crumble. Mr Decker thought it was only a matter of time before a motorcyclist rides over one of these pot holes and is killed. Flooding is bad and quite often the poor condition of the road is not visible. There are too few passing points and "backing up" of cars is frequent. County Councillor Mr Peter Bellfield sympathised with him however said there was very little they can do - speed restrictions are not possible as the road doesn't meet the relevant criteria. Eventually they will have to repair the road which will inevitably become wider. The Parish Council will report the pot holes.

On other highway concerns sugar beet is being harvested which could have implications for Grundisburgh Road. Flooding near Birds Hill had occurred – the drainage pipes discharge straight out on to the road. Also flooding outside Rosery Cottages and down Lower Street (coming down Kiln Farm Lane) was reported. The soakaway in Grundisburgh Road had been replaced but flooding was still occurring - this had been reported. **Leaking BT box** – This has been logged. SCC informs us that photos have been sent to BT Open Reach and that they will be working together to stem the flow from the underground spring.

Bund – Boot Street

Eric Barnett asked Councillors if they remembered approximately 10 years ago it was agreed to raise the roadside bank near the hump backed bridge so as to improve flood defences. Over time the bank has been eroded and needs raising again in order to hold back the water from the road when the river rises. It was resolved to write to the County Council and advise the landowner and Environment Agency.

FINANCE

Cheques were written for the clerk's salary and web hosting. It was resolved to increase the precept by 10% (£400). With the additional grant of £115.23 by Government the total precept will be raised to £4,515 for 2013/14. The draft Budget for 2013/14 was approved.

It was agreed to object to this application in view of the visual impact of the panels on a flat roof.

C12/2391: 10 Holly Close

Erection of first floor rear extension (resubmission of planning application C12/1806)

It was agreed to support this application.

LIGHTING FROM KESGRAVE SCHOOL MULTI USE GAMES AREA

The School had responded that it understood the lighting complied with the planning permission. A further letter had requested the School to consider whether mitigation was possible anyway to reduce light spillage. SCDC was also investigating whether the lighting did comply with the permission granted.

EAST ANGLIAN OFFSHORE WINDFARM CABLING ROUTE AND CONSTRUCTION DEPOT

A further joint meeting of representatives from Lt Bealings, Gt Bealings, Playford and Grundisburgh & Culpho Parish Councils, with District Councillor Tony Fryatt and County Councillor Peter Bellfield, had taken place, also attended by officers from SCDC and SCC. А joint letter from the parishes had been sent to the applicant, objecting to the route of the cabling and the location of the construction depot at Playford. formal objection would be made to the National Planning Infrastructure authority by the Parish Council when public consultation started on 25 January. The Council would register as an 'interested Full details are available at party'. http://

IPSWICH BOROUGH COUNCIL: NORTHERN FRINGE DEVELOPMENT CONSULTATION

IBC was consulting on the development of land on its northern fringe for urban expansion between Henley Road and Tuddenham Road. The plans and details of consultation events are available at http://www.ipswich.gov.uk

POLICE

PCSO Justin Moss had intended to attend but was unable to do so. During December police had investigated an attempted burglary at a shed although nothing was taken, a theft from a motor vehicle where the back window of a car parked in some stables was smashed and Christmas presents taken from the back seat, and had charged a driver with driving whilst under the influence of drink/drugs.

CLOSURE OF THE ADMIRAL'S HEAD PUBLIC HOUSE

The Council would contact SCDC about the condition of the site, and nominate the building as a Community Asset. This would enable the community to bid for the property if it was put on the market.

HIGHWAYS

There was concern about a raised kerb/ drain in The Street, and about parking, some of which was damaging the verge. These issues would be pursued with SCC/ the police.

PLANTING AT SINKS PIT

SCC had not agreed to extend the area of tree planting at Sinks Pit beyond the strip adjoining Hall Road. It was therefore decided not to pursue a licence for tree planting at the site any further.

FINANCE

The second half of the precept, $\pounds 3,000$, had been received from SCDC and $\pounds 172$ from SCC for footpath cutting. A

cheque was signed for the external auditor's fee of $\pounds144$. The budget for 2013/14 was agreed, with no increase in the precept.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING AND VILLAGE REVIEW

Gillian Benjamin from Suffolk ACRE advised that a Village Review evening would enable the Parish Council to update the Parish Plan and obtain up to date information from residents on local issues. Suffolk ACRE would produce an Action Plan after the event. It was agreed that the Review would follow the Annual Parish Meeting, which would take place at 7pm on Monday 15 April in Bealings Village Hall. Refreshments would be served.

ACTION POINT REVIEW

A working party is to be arranged to clear wood from the village playing field.

Potholes in Brook Lane have been reported; weed clearing at the bridge in Brook Lane still to be attended to. Clearing moss etc from slippery footpath from Church Lane to Spring Meadow is to be hastened.

FINANCE

Cheques were signed for website costs, petrol for hedge trimming, annual grass cutting costs, tax on clerk's salary, clerk's storage costs for filing cabinets, use of computer & electricity and expenses for stationery & postages, flowers for sick councillor and hedge maintenance & tree stump removal.

Budget Review: Annual costs were looked at with a view to reducing expenditure for 2013-2014. It was resolved not to give donations to the Air Ambulance or to SARS and to revisit the situation later in the year regarding the donation to the Village Hall. It was decided to engage a new private contractor this year for grass cutting and hedge trimming and it was agreed not to proceed with luminous backed signs for the Playford Road.

Precept: It was unanimously decided to increase the precept by £500 for the coming year and to apply for the government grant in addition.

SCC REPORT

Mr Peter Bellfield reported that SCC had been shortlisted to be voted the most improved council in the country. Money has been saved on libraries without resulting in any closures. £11million has been spent on improving Broadband in the area. Education in Suffolk is to be a high priority in coming years.

Two councillors attended the meeting at Little Bealings on 12th December 2012 to discuss whether parish councils had been properly consulted about the siting of the proposed EAOW depot at Playford and the resultant traffic issues. Concerns have also been raised over drainage of the site; the council would like clarification of plans. A letter is to be submitted to the Planning Inspectorate via Peter Bellfield, voicing our concerns which he will then raise at a cabinet meeting at SCC on 29th January 2013.
