This is very much her special occasion, as well as ours. While we need to make sure we have sufficient seating for these visitors, the service is of course open to all and we will do everything we can to accommodate as many parishioners from the four parishes as possible.

As you will understand, it will be impossible to set up overflow facilities

on a cold, dark February evening. It would therefore be very helpful if you could *let your churchwarden know if you intend to come to the service*. This will enable us to plan ahead, not only to make acceptable seating arrangements, but also to ensure that we have sufficient refreshments at Playford Parish Hall after the service.

If numbers look like getting out of hand, way beyond the comfortable maximum capacity of the church, it may be necessary to warn you of the difficulties and run a reserve list.

Suffolk Family Carers is a local charity that provides information, support and guidance to Family Carers around Suffolk. We have been offering our services for over 25 years and one of the things we have learnt during that time is that people caring for another person at home, perhaps a family member or friend don't usually see themselves as a Family Carer, they just see it as part of being husband, wife, father, mother, daughter, son, friend etc. Because of this, it becomes so easy to forget the importance of your own health and well-being as all of your physical and emotional effort and energy is spent on looking after that person, and others who may be involved such as siblings. You may feel that your own needs do not matter at this time, but in order to provide care and support you do need to keep your own batteries charged.

In 2015 Suffolk Family Carers will be working with our hospice colleagues in Suffolk to offer an information and support programme for those people caring for someone nearing the end of their life. There will be a series of five informal sessions that offer information and an opportunity to reflect and gain support from others in a similar situation. The programme will run around the County with the first ones starting end of January. Its aim is to improve the Family Carers' own situation and that of the person they care for.

GRAHAM LEWIS 1934 - 2014

It was with great sadness that the choir Benefice and congregation received the news of Graham's sudden death. Graham had been singing tenor with the Benefice choir since the early 1990's and was a very committed member and would be found singing in the choir stalls of Great & Little Bealings and Playford churches on Sundays. At the time of his death, he was preparing to sing with the choir, all the Christmas music.

Graham grew up in the Ipswich area and was a boy chorister at St

Augustine's Church. In 1948 when he was 14 years old he sang in a Cantata by Britten called Saint Nicholas in which he played one of the three Pickled Boys. This was the first performance of the work by Britten and was used to open the first Aldeburgh Festival and was conducted by Britten himself. At the time Graham did not realise what an honour this was. but after commemorations in 2013 of Britten's birth it really brought it home to him what an achievement and honour this had been.

After moving away from this area during his working years, he returned with Jean and their family to his childhood eventually haunts and settled Martlesham Road, Little Bealings to enjoy his retirement. With his love for music and his now rich baritone voice he was soon welcomed into a number of choirs. He sang with the Gipperswyke Singers, the Strolling Singers (where he often sang solos), the Woodbridge Choral Society and our own Benefice choir as well as with a number of smaller groups of singers. After Jean's death he found great comfort in his love of singing with others.

In the summer of 2013 he was to meet up again with Helen, who with their respective spouses had been friends and neighbours during their early married lives. Love flourished and they were married just last spring when many of his choir friends sang at their wedding service. We were all so happy for them both and hoped they would have many years of happiness and companionship together. However this was not to be and they only had one year together.

Graham was a real gentleman, very thoughtful and caring and a fund of all knowledge. It has been an absolute pleasure to have had him amongst us in the village, always willing to join in the help activities and to with organisation involved with running choir events. It could be selling raffle tickets or washing up, Graham was always there smiling and adding his bit of magic. He made time to talk to everyone and to get to know them. He is greatly missed by us all.

He died on November 22^{nd,} which ironically is Saint Cecelia's Day, the patron saint of music. We hope he is up there singing with the angels.

ST MARY'S

Welcome back to the first contribution of the New Year, and, most importantly, to the news of the imminent licensing service for our new Priest, Rev Celia Cook. We have a list of planned services stretching well into 2015, but it may well be that Celia will wish to bring in some amendments.

LICENSING SERVICE FEBRUARY 24TH AT 7.30 PM

Although this is a Benefice Service, it is being held in Great Bealings Church, primarily because it is the largest church in the Benefice, and because a large congregation is expected. Not only do we have to accommodate members of all 4 PCCs, and parishioners of all 4 parishes, but we also welcome on this occasion the family, friends and supporters of Celia herself, whose special occasion this is. There will also be a full representation of clergy from across the Benefice – plus, of course, the Bishop and the Archdeacon and our Patron.

We are doing our best to maximise capacity, and will do all we can to accommodate comfortably as many parishioners from the four parishes as possible. As we are sure you understand, overflow facilities are not really an option at this time of year. DC14/3185 - Land near Woodbarn Cottages, Seckford Hall Road - Change of use of land from agriculture to land for the grazing of horses and erection of stables

It was resolved that the Council objects to this application.

HIGHWAYS

The response received from SCC about outstanding items has been circulated to Councillors. There is one large pothole on Hasketon Road which has not been repaired and the two drainage culverts either side of the humpback bridge on Boot Street are full and need emptying. SCC will be contacted about these matters.

The footpath leading from Boot Street to Park Farm, Grundisburgh was damaged on 5th November, but this work was attended to very promptly. A letter of thanks will be sent.

Seckford Hall Road

It was resolved to object to this proposal as it adds an additional 76 sq. metres to the consent already granted by SCDC,

which the Parish Council had originally objected to.

DC/14/3355/FUL — Change of use of Former Pig Building to two Holiday Lets — Cherry Tree Farm

It was resolved to support this application, whilst imposing a condition limiting the time of occupancy, and receiving assurances from SCDC regarding the adequacy of the water supply and the maintenance of the access track.

Notes of the Parish Council meeting held on 13th January WAR MEMORIAL

The Clerk reported some insurance figures received from CAS. Charles Barrington will ask the contractors who are currently working on the church to provide a quotation for a complete rebuild of the war memorial next time they are working in the area. Paul Norris will provide an estimate for the work on the plinth next week, together with some other names that can also be asked.

REPORT BY DISTRICT COUNCILOR TONY FRYATT

Cllr Fryatt reported that he is chairing a major exercise concerning Site Allocations and Area Specific Policies, the consultation is in progress and ends on 27th February. Parishes that have, or are preparing Neighbourhood Plans will be treated separately.

REPORT BY COUNTY COUNCILLOR PETER BELLFIELD

Cllr Bellfield reported on new gritters acquired by SCC, the Energy for Waste Plant, a new Youth Employment Office in Ipswich, high speed broadband, mobile phone coverage. He has proposed to SCC a maximum 40mph speed limit in the villages around the outside of Ipswich. Cost is the major obstacle to speed limits on individual roads.

POLICE REPORT

The police reports showed one crime in November and two in December.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The next meeting of the Sub-Committee is on 26th January and an updated timeline has been developed. The next step is bringing together the drafting of the various sections. As yet, he has not been able to clarify whether we lose the balance of funding if we do not spend it by the end of the financial year, he will check on this.

It was resolved that the Council has no objection to this application, but it was stipulated that the materials used must match the existing.

DC/14/1941/PN3 – Appeal against refusal of planning permission for conversion of existing former agricultural barn to one residential dwelling and change of use of adjacent curtilage to garden area

It was **RESOLVED** that the Council still objects to this application and maintains the views expressed previously.

HIGHWAYS

The Clerk will write to the SCC Saxmundham office about the lack of adequate drainage at the junction of the B1079 with the Bealings/Tuddenham Road, and also the problem of flooding on the road near Rosery Farm. Martin Cripps reported that the two drainage

culverts either side of the humpback bridge on Boot St have still not been emptied.

FINANCE

Six cheques were authorized for payment, the budget for 2015/16 was approved and it was resolved that the precept for 2015/16 remains unchanged at £4,400.

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 5 January 2015 POLICE

PCSOs Krista Robertson and Jeanette Pither attended. Concerns about parking by parents for Bealings School between the Village Hall and the entrance to the Church were discussed. PCSO Sally Thomas would be visiting the School shortly to advise on road safety and parking.

HIGHWAYS

FLOODING IN THE STREET

Neither SCC nor the Environment Agency was aware of any change of policy or lack of works which had caused recent flooding, or the need for any river dredging. SCC asked that records be kept of any flooding: dates, times, time taken to drain away, depth of water and the extent of the area flooded.

TREES IN THE STREET

SCC had undertaken works to leaning trees.

FOOTPATHS

Subsidence along FP3 had been repaired by SCC.

20 mph SPEED LIMIT FOR THE STREET SCC had not yet finished its data gathering to establish whether The Street met the criteria for a 20mph limit. County Councillor Peter Bellfield had requested that SCC consider a 40mph policy over a rural area — where a lower limit did not already apply.

PLANNING

POLICY

SCDC was consulting on 'Site Allocations and Area Specific Policies'. It was noted that, as previously advised, no new land outside the physical limits boundary had been allocated for new housing and no demand for new housing had been identified. The

boundary was proposed to be amended to designate the area around the junction of Holly Lane and The Street as an Area to be Protected from Development. It was also noted that the parish was included in the 'Indicative Housing Provision Eastern Ipswich Housing Market Sub-Area 2010-2017' but no new housing was proposed to be allocated to the parish in this context. Retail centre development at Martlesham was also noted. The public are invited to respond to the consultation by 27 February. documents can be viewed at the SCDC offices in Woodbridge or at: www.suffolkcoastal.gov/yourdistrict/ plannina

SINKS PIT

There was still some concern that an aggregate business at the site was operating outside the permitted hours. Residents are asked to collect details of any dates and times when this is considered to be happening. This should include the nature of the noise and the length of time it continues. Permitted working hours for the aggregate business are 7am – 6pm Monday to Friday (excluding national and bank holidays) and 7am to 1pm on Saturdays.

FIRECREST NURSERY, HALL ROAD Erection of a tractor and implement store SCDC had advised of this agricultural/forestry development.

WORKS TO TREES PROTECTED BY PRESERVATION ORDERS

It was noted that SCDC had received applications for works at three properties: Suncroft and The Oak Walk in Martlesham Road and Finches Hill in The Street.

PARISH COUNCIL

These are condensed notes of the proceedings of Playford Parish Council meeting held 14th Jan 2015. A full version of the minutes appears on the website: www.playford.org.uk

ACTION POINT REVIEW

We have been promised two new vellow grit bins to be installed very soon (hopefully before they are needed) to replace the smashed ones in Butts Road. Repairs to Byway19 have been hampered by further damage being done by a large tractor -Highways dept. Saxmundham is currently liaising with the necessary parties to resolve this. We are still awaiting repair of the bridle path sign on C324 opp. Church Road and the clearance of undergrowth on FP no. 20. The clerk is liaising with SCC over an unregistered FP between C330 and U3311 to the north of the village. FP no 8 to Lt Bealings school has been cleared of nettles but a fallen tree is now blocking the path- this has been reported.

See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details of these items.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

County Councilllor, Peter Bellfield reported that there are currently 39 gritters serving the area and that main priority roads can be gritted in 2½hrs. The new Energy from Waste Recycling plant at Great Blakenham is in action and should power itself plus 30,000 homes, also providing two large greenhouses with its excess heat. SCC has proposals to extend speed limits on roads in the area. The £10m allocated to better Broadband recently should result in 95% coverage by 2017 and mobile phone networks are also being encouraged to improve their coverage.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

District Councillor, Steven Hudson stated that the annual governance report was currently being worked on.

He also assured us that Playford is designated for zero development in the Local Development Framework. Funds are still available in the Enabling Communities Budget for improvement projects up until the end of the financial year.

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Sally Thomas sent apologies for her absence. There are reports of thefts from motor vehicles in Kesgrave, one assault reported in Playford in November and two people charged with 'going equipped to steal' in Playford in December.

FINANCE

Cheques were authorised to HMRC for tax on clerk's salary, Old Parsonage Garden Services for grass & hedge cutting, Joan Metcalfe was reimbursed for a Break Glass kit for the field gate key at the village hall and the clerk's expenses were paid. The budget for 2015/2016 budget was agreed and it was decided to keep the Precept as the same level as last year and to transfer £1500 to the NS&I savings account as contingency for any emergencies. The clerk has received a small increase in line with SALC salarv i n recommendations. Changes to audit procedures from April 2017 have been announced - small parishes will be exempt from the external audit but will be obliged to publish certain information regarding the accounts on a freely accessible website.

RISK ASSESSMENT

The list was amended to include checking the village sign, notice board and benches and to ensure that the dog litter bin was emptied regularly. Also the financial risks are currently being assessed. Funds will be earmarked for emergency repairs or specialist treatment of any eventuality which may arise. A reminder has been circulated to people using the glass recycling facilities in the village hall car park, asking them to use this responsibly and

not to leave broken glass on the tops of bins etc.

OTHER MATTERS

It was decided to re-think the location of the proposed basketball facilities on the playing field and additional funds will be required for extra hard-standing to be provided - this may come from the Enabling Communities Budget. Paint samples taken from the river bridge railings have been found to contain lead and expensive precautionary measures are required to deal with safely removing the paint and refurbishing it -a fund may be set up to raise money for this. There is currently a consultation on the government's intention to modernise regulations regarding Parish Polls, more details can be found at: https:// www.gov.uk/government/ consultations/parish-polls and the deadline for comments is 30th Jan 2015. There is also a public consultation on two planning documents at Ipswich Borough Council regarding the proposed development to the north of Ipswich for more details please visit: www.ipswich.gov.uk/consultations
