We can linger a while for a chat with fellow dog-walkers. We can spare a smile and a brief word with a stranger we may meet on a walk, or even a delivery man having difficulties. We could sign up for local events, support local initiatives. We could clear up items of litter, or, even better, discourage those who might carelessly defile our local spaces. It's not just charity that begins at home; it's our very well-being and happiness.

Voltaire's 18th century *Candide* roamed the world, coming across and enduring from all sorts of evil, horror, war, corruption, cruelty, slavery and natural disasters. A modern-day, resurrected *Candide* could follow precisely the same route – and might be even more horrified by what his travels revealed to him across the planet. The original 18th century *Candide* concluded that, in the face of all these challenges, the only solution was to "cultiver notre jardin" - in other words, concentrate on one's own locality and community. A LINK WITH THE SOMME

Many will remember that Ivan Jowers* was our District Councillor* from 1991 -2007, having previously worked as an accountant with ICI. Last year we commemorated the 100th anniversary of start of the Battle of the Somme, but the battle continued into 2017, and it was in these latter weeks, specifically on 7th February 1917, that Ivan's grandfather, John Jowers, serving in the Bedfordshire Regiment, was killed on the Somme. He was just 36 years old. Even more poignantly, Ivan's father, again called John, similarly died at the age of 36, in 1942, while serving as a war-time policeman in Ipswich. He left behind him his widow. Elsie, and three young sons aged just 8 (Ivan), 10 and 12. Little wonder that Ivan recalls his father and grandfather with some emotion at this time, even though, as was often the case, he knows so very little about his grandfather and the circumstances of his death. It is time to reflect, and to rescue him from that anonymity, a fate sadly shared by so many others. The Jowers family marked the special year by all spending Christmas in the Cotswolds. Meeting up together with Ivan were: Meryl and family, an Architect, who lives in Sydney, Australia, Susan and Pip (twins) who live with their families in Hertfordshire. Interestingly Susan has two sets of twins (all girls). What a great deal to be thankful for. May Grandfather John and Father John rest in peace. February 7th 2017 is

HISTORY CORNER THE VILLAGE SIGNS

Firstly, by way of justifying our back-page motif, a reminder as to what those Village Signs actually represent. Just take a moment to check out the detail - and do have a closer to look at the signs themselves. They tell you something about our villages.

The Bealings sign, situated by the bridge on Lodge Road over the River Lark (often thought to be the Fynn) is two-sided, with one side devoted to each village. Both villages have roots which stretch back to Anglo-Saxon times and both featured in the 1066 Doomsday Book as Bealings Magna and Bealings Parva. The respective churches are central to each carved design. For Great Bealings, St. Mary's Church is supplemented by the nearby Hump-Back Bridge over the River Fynn/ Lark, two Red Poll cattle, a Moorhen and a Lime Tree. The image of All Saint's Church in Little Bealings is flanked by some Bronze Age Cinerary Urns, fragments of which were found in 1938, coins from a 4th Century Roman Treasure Hoard found in July 1934 at the new Village Hall site, a 10th Century Scramasax (single sided sword) found in the old ford in 1883 and now in the British Museum. and two Suffolk Sheep, which were seen regularly in the valley and reflected the past importance of the wool trade.

This sign, beautifully created by local woodcarver, Maureen Midwinter,

The design for the Playford sign was conceived and drawn by George Ditton, Parish Council chairman 1955 - 1980. It depicts a man ploughing with a pair of horses, a reflection on the association that the village once had with the Suffolk Punch. The Suf-

officially unveiled in 1990, with Rev Frank folk Horse Society was founded in 1877 and is the oldest heavy horse society in Britain. Its first Secretary until 1889 was Herman Biddell and its first Treasurer was his elder brother Manfred. Herman farmed at Hill Farm from the time of his father's death in 1860 until his retirement in 1892 and has been described as 'the historian of the Suffolk horse' being responsible for compiling the first volume of the stud book. 'A History and Register of the County Breed of Cart Horses'. The Suffolk Stud Book. 1880, Volume I. Manfred, who farmed for 52 years at Lux Farm from 1842 until his death in 1894 was a well-known breeder. exhibitor and exporter of the Suffolk horse, winning many awards notably first prize at the Royal Agricultural Society of England show at Chelmsford in 1856. Following his death, his famous stud of 46 horses was dispersed. Carved by Titchmarsh and

Playford's Village Sign was designed by my father. George Ditton. Chairman of Playford Parish Council from 1952- 1977. He was a commercial artist, well known in the 1940s and 1950s for designing the covers of magazines as well as for the illustrations. I did have the original design papers, but no longer have them.

LOOKING AHEAD

SERVICES ON THE SECOND SUNDAY OF THE MONTH.

Last year our service on this Sunday was an 8.00 Communion Service. While this service has been, over the years, much loved by devotees of the Communion Service in the Book of Common Prayer and by those who enjoy combining that with the exhilaration of seeing the early morning sun streaming in (occasionally) through the stained glass east window, numbers have dwindled to the point where the PCC and Celia had to consider laying on a service which would have a wider appeal. In the event, and for a trial period, it was agreed that we would hold 10.00 family communion service, revolving around various themes. These could be: outdoor services, with a nature theme, a pet service, a toys service, a special Mothering Sunday Service, and rather more imminently a St Valentine's Day Service. This is a worshipping space which challenges our creativity, and which gives us the opportunity to bring people together in a way that embraces evolving spiritual attitudes.

Sunday February 12th is just a couple a days before St Valentine's Day, so we invite you to bring along someone or something that you love. It could be a special person, a friend who does not normally attend church, or it could be a favourite teddy bear – for young and old. Something special. Let's celebrate those special bonds of love.

Just for the record – or according to Wikipedia: English 18th-century antiquarians, noting the obscurity of Saint Valentine's identity, suggested that Valentine's Day was created as an

attempt to supersede the pagan holiday of Lupercalia (mid-February in Rome). Many of the current legends that characterize Saint Valentine were invented in the fourteenth century in England, notably by Geoffrey Chaucer and his circle, when the feast day of February 14 first became associated with romantic love. During the Middle Ages, it was believed that birds paired in mid-February. This was then associated with the romance of Valentine. Although

all these legends may differ in ways, Valentine's Day is widely recognized as a

PCC NEWS

Our Treasurer, Charles Barrington has been busy putting together applications for grants to help us carry out repairs highlighted in our 2015 Quinguennial Report. As people know, we are the beneficiaries of a significant grant from the Government's Listed Places of Work scheme, and a further application for a grant has been lodged with Viridor, who gave us significant help last time. Charles is working closely with our architects. KLH. to settle the timetable and schedule of work and to ensure that it is completed within the required time scale. We are also submitting the application for a faculty to enable us to carry out the work. Previous PCC discussions about our survival strategy have been followed up at an informal gathering in the church in mid-January of friends and supporters. A very constructive discussion ensued and we hope to firm up our survival plans, which, as should by now be known, revolve around the 4 themes of a/ Wildlife, b/ Local History, c/ Pastoral involvement, and d/ Concerts/talks.

We are fortunate that Charles has a particularly good overview of what is needed in the village, because of his dual membership of the Parish Council and of the PCC. Assuming, as we hope, that you support it and that a majority of those who vote are in favour, the Plan is then formally 'made', which means it becomes an adjunct to SCDC's own Local Plan and will have the same statutory force in terms of future planning decisions. While the planning authority remains SCDC. they required to follow the policies in the Plan in the same way that they are required to follow the policies in their own Local Plan. This is the culmination of four years' work by the Parish Council and in particular by the Working Group. We are immensely grateful to all those who have given so much time and effort to get us to this stage. We should be proud of the fact that we are the first rural village in Suffolk to get to this point, and that our Plan is a pathfinder for small villages who would like to see the importance of landscape and the environment balanced against development proposals in their community. It has been very encouraging to see the recent publicity about the value of the landscape to the County of Suffolk - of which the Lark Valley is an example not just because it encourages tourism but also because it directly contributes to the health and wellbeing of those of us lucky enough to live here.

It is of course your Plan: the responses we got at the public meetings and to the questionnaire we circulated have all shown not only a high level of interest, but a clear desire to see these matters properly considered in the context of

CAFÉ HUB UPDATE 1

Dear Benefice Neighbour,

I am writing to initiate the first of what will be regular updates about the progress of our CafeHub project. I have offered to serve as the Committee Co-ordinator but are many members of Committee throughout the Benefice and in future updates I will provide profiles of willing members so you get to know all of us better. I realise that there have been many theories and ideas about what is going on, without a lot of confirmation of the current status of our project and I apologise that there has been so little information forthcoming until However, we did not have informal approval from the Diocese for the overall scope of the project until December 21st. so it would have been irresponsible to brief you on a project that had no initial input from the controlling authority and might not even have been "green light"!

As we move forward, I am always available to answer questions or concerns via telephone at 078899 07615 or email hellionese@yahoo.com or over a nice cup of coffee! I recognise that sometimes providing information raises more auestions than it answers! also encourage you to join our CafeHub Committee, which is open to anyone who wants to contribute her/his skills and talents to the success of our community resource!

So here are a few answers to key questions you might have at this point, and please contact me for more information and/or to provide your input:

Q: Why has the CafeHub project been

initiated?

A: There are two major reasons for the project. The first is the need for a community resource –we have no staffed gathering place for the village residents within the Benefice – no shop, no café, no pub. The second major reason is that we need to ensure we have enough funds to maintain the Church going forward. It is a beautiful landmark in our Benefice, but is at risk unless we can generate sustainable funding.

Q: What will the Church look like in the future?

A: The Church is a Grade II listed building and the exterior of the Church will largely look the same. There may be a new glass door, to help conserve energy and to allow the facade to be more inviting, but all changes, both inside and out, will be approved by the Diocese in concert with many other governing bodies, including, but not limited to, Historic England, the National Church Buildings Council, and the Victorian Society. The proposal for the interior of the Church provides for alteration to allow flexible use of the space and the plans will be displayed in the Church shortly after they are submitted to the Diocese, along with an Open Meeting to be held before any plans are finalized and submitted for planning approval.

Q: What will be in the Church after it is altered?

A: The proposal, which is still in development and has not yet been approved by the Parochial Church Council (PCC) or the Diocese, includes a quiet place for prayer, an open area for community use, such as school

gatherings, wedding receptions, cinema PARISH COUNCIL nights, social events, toddler groups, and a Café with a flexible seating area.

Q: How will the project be funded?

A: The initial funds that were required to submit the proposal to the Diocese were paid for by the PCC, however, all funding moving forward for all aspects of the project will be covered by donations and grants. No proceeds from the sale of the Angela Cobbold Hall are going towards the CafeHub project.

I look forward to sharing more information as the project develops and, while I know that change is not always easy, I hope you will be encouraged that we are sensitive to the concerns of all members of the community and hope that as you learn more about the CafeHub, you will become as enthusiastic as we are about having a place to meet and enjoy each company. whilst ensuring beautiful part of our Benefice is preserved for the future.

EXTENT OF PROPOSED 20 MPH SPEED LIMIT FOR THE STREET. LITTLE BEALINGS

As you may be aware, Little Bealings Parish Council has obtained funding for the provision of a 20mph speed limit along a part of The Street. The County Council will be consulting on the extent of the speed limit and so will contact various properties and organisations in Little Bealings in the near future.


Unfortunately it was not possible to print the plan showing the proposed extent of the limit because the format of the News is too small.—Ed

However, please note that in respect of the location of the signs, the County Council has advised that the "start and end points need to be able to accommodate new 600mm wide [20mph] signs on both sides of the carriageway. In addition to the physical size of the sign there needs to be 450mm sideway clearance from the edge of the sign to the edge of the carriageway to prevent vehicles striking the sign. Therefore verges need to be at least 1.05m wide."

KAGERA LENT APPEAL

BACKGROUND

Correspondence has been received from Bishop's Martin and Mike who are asking us to consider joining in a diocesan Lent appeal on behalf of the diocese of Kagera, in Tanzania.

For the last twenty-three years, the Diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich has been in partnership with Kagera, helping them support people within their Diocese and the 1.5 million displaced persons they welcomed from Rwanda. Sadly, Kagera is once more in crisis, due to the gradual erosion of their ability to support themselves due to climate change and the consequent loss of reliable rains for their crops. This is having a devastating effect with people going without food, the Church income has fallen, funding is being withdrawn from the Church which provides support for education, agriculture and developing self-sufficiency. In addition, a recent earthquake destroyed some homes and churches in the north of the diocese.

HOW CAN WE HELP?

We are being encouraged to join in the Diocese Lent Appeal by praying for them and giving generously to support them in their needs. Initiatives are included in the correspondence, but it is perhaps easier and more productive if we keep to an uncomplicated means of raising money. The following is suggested throughout the Benefice and most grateful if you could offer your support.

'The 5p Lent Appeal', in aid of the Diocese of Kagera in Tanzania Throughout Lent, (1st March to 16th April) if, at the end of each day, you have any five pence pieces, in purses or pockets, please keep them on one side until the Easter Service, when they can be brought into Church and deposited in a collection Jar/box situated at the back of the Church.

To raise the amount necessary to support Kagera for a year, each Benefice would need to raise in the region of £100 and Secretaries are kindly asked to facilitate this initiative. With grateful thanks.
