But the longer you look after a church, the more you become aware of its historical roots, and of the value of the legacy that has come down to you over the centuries. What increasingly strikes you is not necessarily concern about the weakening of faith in the religiously-challenged here-and-now, compared with that our predecessors – even though it could be – it's more about the extraordinary faith of the people, over many generations, who passed on these churches to us, with the treasures and extraordinary craftsmanship that they display. Such extraordinary faith – and faith in something or someone called God that modern secular society seems so often to dismiss out of hand, and in so doing, allows our

What, in this age of tawdry, trivial, ephemeral convenience, can our generation, in its turn, pass down to generations- to-come, something which can possibly compare with these beautiful places? The unique characteristic of the English landscape is the towers and spires of its churches, seen on so many horizons or nestling in the smallest villages. Can we really just let them go? That is why, as churchwarden, once again, I feel humbled by what I am responsible for, and try so desperately to persuade others to share that commitment to preserve the very best of our past, whether they believe in something/someone called God, or not.

NATURE NOTES

- WHITE PHEASANTS

The picture above depicts the first ever white pheasant to have ventured into the Editor's garden. Confidently, brazenly almost. There seems to have been a proliferation of these variants in the last couple of years. It is not as if, like mountain hares, ptarmigans, arctic foxes etc. that they need to have white plumage

to fade into wintry backgrounds. With global warming, it is quite the opposite. These creatures have become far more conspicuous than their more traditional cousins — themselves imported from



China some time ago.

The sighting led to a bit of research, and the finding of the following information: "There are white or leucistic pheasants, and there are also albino pheasants. The albino has no dark pigment at all, so has the characteristic pink eyes. The white pheasant is often put out deliberately and a "fine" is placed on any hapless gun careless enough to shoot it."

In this country at least it seems to be considered bad form to shoot them — thoroughly sporting British behaviour since what chance does a white pheasant have of finding any decent natural camouflage. Maybe that explains the recent expansion of numbers. Perhaps a properly qualified country sportsman could elaborate on all this.

CHURCHWARDEN'S NOTES

Things have quietened down after all the excitement and activity associated with the Platinum Jubilee. The usual pre-occupations of summer are gradually creeping back on to the agenda: not enough rain, too hot for some, occasional storms, sorting out summer holidays against a backdrop of travel challenges. It can be quite calming to settle back into familiar routines. And that, after a busy June and July, is what we can expect for the next couple of months. But – for the historical record, there is much to look back on, so let us concentrate on that.

PEALATHON

Our Platinum Jubilee project was to refurbish our five splendid bells, in time for the celebration weekend in June. This we managed, and over the two days of 4th/5th June almost 100 people from within the parish and beyond, had a go at ringing the bells. Many were ready learners and quickly picked up the chiming techniques and sequences, with pictures to prove that they had indeed been part of this event, and to show posterity that they had played a part in sending out joyful peals across the water meadows. In many cases the visit was enhanced by a visit up the tower, just occasionally right to the top. Our thanks to tower escorts for their services. Otherwise, there was some four hours of bellringing in total, so the refurbished setup was really put to the test - and survived intact.

SPECIAL JUBILEE SERVICE

Our regular services are held on the first

Sunday of each month, so this fitted in nicely with the Platinum Jubilee weekend. The weekend also coincided Pentecost, so the two elements were celebrated within the service. Our preacher. specially invited for the occasion, was Archdeacon, Jeanette Gosney and we managed to persuade her to form a bell-ringing duo with Father Nigel after the service. You can see the special red, white and blue rope-ends in the picture – alongside our officiants.



Works

The bells have been refurbished, as our Platinum Jubilee project, happily with outside funding, but more work remains to be done. Our wonderful stained-glass windows, particularly the grilles that protect them, need repair, and that is yet another project that needs to be undertaken and paid for, hopefully by grants.

A resident queried the introduction of this item on the agenda and asked if this is worth keeping a look-out for what is on the only space where the public can speak. Colin Hedgley explained that this is a meeting of the PC for Cllrs which is held in public – it is not a public meeting. SP said that any additional contribution from the public would be at the discretion of the Chairman.

REPORTS

County Councillor Elaine Bryce - EB summarised some achievements by SCC and said that she works very closely with the District Councillors. Highways is the dominant item, and she has enjoyed witnessing a Speedwatch session. She now has a new budget for the financial vear, and she thanked the PC for their support since her election and SP thanked her for her commitment.

District Councillor Colin Hedgley (CH)

The report had been circulated to Cllrs and the full copy is attached to the minutes on the website. CH reported verbally on ESC's 'Clean for the Queen' campaign and the clampdown on empty homes. The 'Wild Spaces' scheme is returning again this year and PCs can still apply with any suggestions of suitable areas. The Melton Hill site has now been sold to a local builder and ESC has taken in house the work of Norse

CELEBRATING THE PLATINUM JUBILEE IN THE FYNN/LARK VALLEYS

The first weekend of June 2022 was an historical landmark. At the risk of overprolonging the coverage of the Platinum Jubilee, but aware that this Magazine needs to serve as a record of historical events, we will do our best to preserve for posterity an account of how our local communities celebrated the Queen's unique Platinum Jubilee. A Bank Holiday had been called for 2nd and 3rd of June, and events nationally and locally were spread across the weekend, with significant TV coverage of national events, such as the special Trooping of the Colour, the service in St Paul's Cathedral, the Concert at the end of the Mall, and the Historical Pageant on the Sunday. None of these events took up more than two or three hours so there was plenty of opportunity for local communities to do their own thing at other times.

HAPPY AND GLORIOUS - - THE ANGELA COBBOLD HALL

Over 70 people attended the ACH for the "Happy & Glorious" event, illustrating the 70 years of our Queen's reign. Starting at 6 p.m. on Friday 3rd, celebrations began with a Champagne Bar, and smoked salmon plates, as well as blinis, clearly designed to accelerate liquid approval to the performances on stage and screen that followed at 7.30 p.m. Then followed an hour of entertainment with astute use of filming,

There was a BBQ, music and a souvenir gift for children attending. A proper village commemoration of a unique event, engaging people across the generations and creating abiding memories.

LITTLE AND GREAT BEALINGS

Little and Great Bealings came together in a Village Hall Event on the Sunday afternoon. Your editor was honoured to be asked to open the event, given his dubious qualifications as local historian, and he rooted the event in history, remembering how Suffolk villages over the years had celebrated such occasions. Happily, he had arranged with the Palace for her Majesty herself to send a special telegram to be delivered, asking him to declare the event open on her behalf and to thank all those involved in setting it up. The telegram, marked OHMS, was, in the absence of a royal dispatch rider, specially delivered by a special envoy on a motorised mower.



The opening was followed by an afternoon dedicated to consuming refreshments, including BBQ, drinks bar, a range of delicious cakes, games, petanque, face-painting, a well-supported and mostly well-behaved dog show, all culminating in an inter-village Tug-of-War. Little Bealings ran out/puffed their way to a third consecutive victory, to dejected calls for some sort of handicapping process. Overall both villages were winners on an

afternoon which was much drier – sunnier even – than forecast.

We note, with pride, that the Village Jubilee Fete raised a total of £1037 for charity. In a reflection of events in the wider world at the time of the Jubilee, the money was donated to two causes - £200 went to the Blue Cross Ukraine Pet Welfare Fund, while the sum of £837 was donated to the local Kesgrave Ukraine Hub, which was set up by All Saints Church, Kesgrave.



ST MARY'S, GREAT BEALINGS

The village fete was preceded by a service in St Mary's, Great Bealings, with Archdeacon Jeanette Gosney preaching, The weekend was dedicated to a pealathon: the bells, specially refurbished bells for the occasion, were rung by almost 100 people, chiming out celebrations across the valley. 




