NATURE NOTES - RESPLENDENT VERGES

The relatively damp spring has meant that roadside verges have grown up rather higher than usual. Ecologists approve. Some motorists are less sure. But whatever your take on those verges, they have been eye-catching. Alongside the fresh greenness at the roadside, the vigorous growth of, firstly, blackthorn, then alexander and sheeps parsley, and hawthorn. dominated the now has hedgerows, making them gleaming white, and lightening up the dark green avenues of foliage, so prevalent around these parts. Alexanders and sheeps parsley have been particularly prolific, the first, like its cultivated species, a herb, edible, for foraging by livestock and other mammals such as rabbits.

This is where village recorders come in. Maybe not everyone knows about them. In fact, there is a network of them covering the whole of the county. organised by a dedicated team of volunteers, ensuring that the happenings and activities of communities and villages across the county are recorded for the benefit of posterity. Every year these recorders compile a report of what has gone on in their respective villages and submit it.

The organisation's website describes its activities as follows:

Suffolk Local History Council encourages and supports the study of local history and acts as an umbrella organisation for societies, small museums and individuals within the county. It publishes a twiceyearly journal and newsletter, operates a Parish Recorders' Scheme and organises networking day meetings, conferences, visits and study days.

We are a registered charity financed by our members. We are governed by an elected Executive Committee. all of whom are trustees as well as volunteers.

Norman an enthusiastic supporter of the whole Recorders operation. will certainly welcome reports on local activities which they could include in their annual compilation of activities. So - if you or vour organisation would like to go down in history, please make sure that your local Recorder is kept in the picture.

We publish this article partly to promote local history, partly because there are currently vacancies for recorders in Culpho and Grundisburgh, and these parishes will lose out if no-one can be recruited to fill those vacancies. Representatives from Parish Councils and community volunteers from Great Bealings, Little Bealings, Playford, Grundisburgh & Culpho join those from Tuddenham, Martlesham, Rushmere and Swilland, in efforts to promote



Safer Village Driving in Suffolk ('SAVID'). Working within their own villages as well as along shared routes such as Playford Road/Martlesham Road, and Grundisburgh Road/Bealings Road, the group coordinates these SID (speed indicator devices), in addition to Community Speed Watch and the annual Road Safety Week. The consortium also collects traffic data for analysis by a consultant in a bid to garner police enforcement support and interacts with SCC Highways on local concerns. Funding towards additional equipment has recently been received from the Community Partnership, Road Safety Forum.

- CHURCHWARDEN'S NOTES

Our Annual Meeting was held in the church on May 16th. This is the meeting when we hear how the year has gone, how the finances stand, what is the state of the fabric, and who will be serving on the PCC for the year to come.

The most positive outcome of this year's meeting was that the personnel involved in the runnina of the church. Churchwarden and PCC, will all be in place for the coming year, so we do have continuity, consistency and commitment. This is the opportunity to thank most warmly all members of the PCC for their unswerving loyalty to what is sometimes a difficult cause, but one worth fighting for. We do that on behalf of the whole village, not just the small band of churchgoers, firm in our belief that the church remains the embodiment of hundreds of years of history, and the focal point of so many aspects of family life, for so many, over so many years.

countered by considerations of prospects for the future of the church itself. Finances remain a real challenge. The paving of the Parish Share, plus all the necessary expenses of running and maintaining a building of this size and complexity cannot be met from current income, even though the income from events such as concerts and the Plant Sale has now recovered from Covid times. That lack of income is closely linked to the limited number of services held, and the small numbers of people them. who attend Questions legitimately be asked as to how long it can be sustainable to run an active church. with all the concomitant expenses, including those of related to having a permanent rector. There are a range of options which will have to be considered, none of which will be qualitatively comparable to the status quo. All that we can promise is that your current PCC will fight to achieve the best compatible outcome with present circumstances. To do this, they need as much local support as can be mustered. The future of St Mary's church is not something that should just be discussed within the confines of the PCC, but it should be a matter of general concern and interest to all who have a stake in the kind of village they live in.

The big screen was used to introduce this year's garden colour, magenta for energy with green for growth, renewal, and balance and white for peace, coolness and freshness. This was followed by beautiful images of the three best new plants of the year.

1st. Agapanthus Black Jack

- 6-MONTH REVIEW

Late last summer All Saints Church contacted all Little Bealings residents by including in the Fynn Lark News a leaflet outlining the financial challenge facing the church for 2022. As a result of that We have turned the corner with the releaflet, ten people committed to donate to the church using the Parish Giving Scheme. Unfortunately, one major donor is no longer with us, but we still receive £432 every month (including Gift Aid) from this scheme

Others contribute to our mission through Standing Order, and this brings in another £110/month. Will those who are making donations by this method please ensure we hold a Gift Aid form for you as this delivers a further 25%. Every penny counts!!! HMRC have said there is no need to update your form if you have already completed one, but please check with us to ensure we hold a Gift Aid form for vou. Church attendees donate at our services and all of these income streams goes towards our church and Ministry.

Parish Share. This is the amount we are expected to contribute to the diocese for the services of our vicar and benefice/ For those directly diocese support. involved with the church the additional resources available from within the benefice have been welcomed and we would certainly not want to lose Rev. Garv now. Unfortunately, we had to use some savings to help towards our payment for 2022 which was still short of the amount required. But this year we have already paid the first quarter instalment and by the time you read this we should have paid our second quarter contribution. Our Parish Share for 2023 is £9500.

The cost-of-living crisis is affecting us all. Church costs have increased, and we estimate that at least £14,000 is required to maintain the church, pay its Parish Share and deliver its mission within our community. The church has a range of

services: Wednesday morning pravers. walking group, Absolutely Divine café, Saturday morning 'drop in' 10am -12.30pm for private praver or a coffee/ chat as well as the twice monthly 10am Sunday services. See the website or church notices for all details

ordering of the church. Work is nearing completion and the output from this prolonged activity is clear to see. The Church is looking resplendent with a fresh coat of paint and a bespoke kitchen which is supporting the café. Although initially only open one day a week. takings have already repaid the start-up costs required to provide chopping boards, cleaning materials, teapots etc. and this venture is yet another regular contribution to church funds.

The community came together to support the Bealings Plant Sale with 50% of the profit coming to All Saints, with St. Mary's Great Bealings also benefitting.

However, we could always do with more.

If you would like to make a contribution, the easiest and safest way to ensure your money goes towards keeping our vicar and the church available for all to use is the Parish Giving Scheme.
