#### BENEFICE SERVICE COMMEMORATING THE CENTENARY OF THE BEGINNING OF WW1 -6.00 PM SUNDAY 3 AUGUST 2014. GREAT BEALINGS CHURCH

Advance notice has already been given of this service, and plans for the whole afternoon are now more or less stabilised, as follows:

2.00 – 4.00 pm - Inter-village Quoits challenge match – organised by Roger and Margaret Roseboom.

4.00 - 5.30 - Tea, cake and exhibition of WW1 posters, letters, artefacts, as supplied by residents of our four villages, in St Mary's Church. We also hope to have on display a collection of any books relating to WW1, so please contact Norman Porter if you can loan anything suitable, books or otherwise. Please ensure that you include a note with the item stating ownership.

6.00 - Service of commemoration. This will consist of a narrative, interspersed with readings, hymns, prayers and music. At the beginning of the service, residents of our villages will be invited to light candles corresponding in number to those from our villages who gave their lives. A special token of thanksgiving will be placed by Culpho – one of very few "grateful" villages in the country.

#### Playford

There will be a small display at the back of the church giving brief details of the nine men from Playford (and a farm student on Lux) who lost their lives in the war - their regiment, their ages, where they died and were buried, where they lived in the village and what work they and their fathers did for a living. There are photographs of six of the ten men all of which it is hoped will add meaning to the names on the memorial, names that have been read out at church services every year since the war ended.

The display will be repeated at Playford church at the Benefice Service of Remembrance on Sunday 9 November at 10.00 am.

### ARE WASPS ON THE RISE AND WHY?

If you hear the sound of buzzing and see a striped insect flying in the direction of you and your lunch, this can really get the adrenalin pumping and, in some cases, can have you running very fast in the opposite direction. For those that fear wasps, the bad news is that the warmer weather we have experienced over the last few months may mean another rise in the number of these pests this year.

Nick Collinson, managing director of Essex and Suffolk Pest Solutions, said: "The number of callouts to tackle wasps varies wildly each year, and is weather related." If it is a wet and windy spring, for example, this can affect the number of wasps and delay the development of colonies through to autumn.

"It is too early to tell at the moment whether there will be a rise in the number of wasps this year but if it is an early spring, as it has been, the queens come out of hibernation earlier. So, depending on the weather, we can expect a large number of wasp related callouts."

Wasps hit the headlines in late August last year as pest control experts

nationwide noticed a sharp rise in the number of these pests. After coming out of hibernation over the long winter, the late summer provided plenty of food. With the right habitat, and abundant food, it is estimated that there can be as many as 1,000 wasp nests per square mile.

Wasps also present a risk in urban areas where they build nests in gardens and porch ways and also at height – close to windows and in the roof voids of properties. This is not only a nuisance, it can also be very frightening for the occupants.

Mr Collinson said: "If wasps nest under tiles they can eat through the plasterboard ceilings and fly into the bedroom, which can be quite harrowing, especially as you can get thousands of wasps in a nest." The average is 2,000 to 5,000 wasps per colony, but it is possible to get up to 20,000 in a nest.

That Grundisburgh girl, Doris, survives him, together with his son Neil, to whom we are grateful for a lengthy life's story, which is now filed away as part of our village history. George passed away on May 6<sup>th</sup> at the age of 91, having spent his final months in Anglesey Heights Residential Nursing home. We offer Doris and Neil our sincere condolences.

#### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Eric Barnett reported on the activities in the year, including changes in membership, the major change of which was the appointment of a new Clerk. A major item for the report was the acceptance by SCDC of our bid to produce a Neighbourhood Plan, and a Housing Needs Survey has been completed. An objection has been registered with the Boundary Commission regarding its proposal to include Gt Bealings in a ward with Various planning Woodbridge. application proposals have been made at Wood Barn cottages which the Parish Council has objected to. The Public Examination for EAOW1 has ended and a decision is expected before the end of June.

#### VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

Eric Barnett summarised the submitted report of a very busy year, a full copy of this can be viewed on the Council's website.

BENEFICE NEWSLETTER TEAM REPORT

Norman Porter reported on the commercial aspects of the Magazine together with other items of interest.

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Charles Barrington delivered a progress report. There have been three main achievements – completion of the Housing Needs Survey, receipt of  $\pounds$ 7,000 grant funding from the DCLG and drafting of the questionnaire, the final version of which will be delivered to households in June. The structure of the draft Plan will probably take until Autumn. The Neighbourhood Plan Working Party has been formalised by making it a sub-committee of the Parish Council.

The internal audit for 2013/14 has been completed and the Annual Return and Statement of Accounts have been approved. The first half of the precept £2250.49 has been received from SCDC. Cheques were signed for annual subscriptions to Suffolk Association of Local Councils, LGR publications, and Suffolk Preservation Society, Neighbourhood Plan expenses, and for the Clerk's salary, expenses and PAYE.

## ST MARY'S CHURCH NEWS

Well what an eventful last month we have had. Firstly, we lost our secretary Melanie Brooks due to a house move. Then we lost our Churchwarden Gina Corani due to a career move. However. I am sure you will join me in thanking Melanie for all the wonderful work she has done in support of Plavford Church. its PCC and to the wider Benefice generally. Next of course, Gina, who I think you will all agree, has been an outstanding Churchwarden. Gina, you will be difficult to replace and we will miss your input. The good thing is Gina has agreed to remain Safeguarding Officer and Electoral Roll officer. I certainly wish Gina, as you all do, good fortune in her new career. Please look at our advert very carefully and think if you could help. The jobs are not as bad as people may believe and there is always someone to help and guide you. You may have noticed that the Church Path wall has now been re-instated and the bottom pillar rebuilt. New shingle has been laid and the handrail is being repaired. The South windows have been removed and are on their way to being repaired and replaced by the specialist glaziers. The grass cutting continues as per normal.

## **D-DAY COMMEMORATIONS**

The 70th anniversary commemorations in Normandy that were attended by numerous heads of state and other dignitaries, were a reminder that Playford's own Peter Wilkinson was part of the first wave that landed on the beaches in the early hours of 6 June 1944. As a 21 year old lieutenant in the Royal Marines he was attached to the Canadian 3rd Division who, a month later, were the first troops to enter Caen. Peter died ten years ago in July 2004 and his widow Averil is now living in Woodbridge.

Successful beachheads having been established, thousands of additional troops poured ashore in the days that followed. Two other Playford residents were among them. Cyril Gardiner, a third generation villager who later moved to Tuddenham, had been a tank driver at El Alamein and landed with the 44th Roval Tank Regiment on Sword Beach on D+3. And Owen Goldsmith. a veteran of Dunkirk. landed at Arromanches with the 55th Suffolk Yeomanry Anti-Tank Regiment six days later. Like Peter Wilkinson, both men were to become involved in the heavy fighting around Caen that continued into August.
