I have only ever lived under one Monarch. It is only right that, after 70 years of wonderful service, we should rejoice both locally and nationally. A special commemorative book, 'Our Faithful Queen' is now available from our church shop in Market Hill and later, in both our churches, with fantastic photos and commentary on HM Queen's historic reign and, as an exemplar of the Christian faith which she holds so dear.

I fully appreciate that services and commemorations will be held in our other parishes and that The Fynn-Lark villages have allegiance to three different Benefices. While I can only represent the United Benefice of Woodbridge with Great Bealings, the sentiments expressed below do, of course, extend way beyond our own Benefice, way beyond our local area, and will be shared by many people, across the world. I write for us all.

Our own special service in Great Bealings is on Sunday, 5th June at 9.30am (listen out for our newly restored bells calling us to worship), at which we shall welcome the Archdeacon of Suffolk as our preacher. Sparkling refreshments will be available afterwards and everyone is welcome to join us! Alternatively, come to our later service in Woodbridge at 11am. What matters most is that our public prayers 'go up' and our hymns of thanksgiving resonate - for such a loval and devoted 'vocation' for our United Kingdom and world.

However much the Royal Family may have to adapt to an uncertain future, the Queen has always shown us that gift of fortitude and tactfulness amidst such an intrusive 'media culture' in which her private views are never allowed to be heard. Perhaps the exception is her annual televised Christmas 'message' which is more personal, spiritual, and heartfelt than on any other public occasion. This has prompted the Royal School of Church Music to commission a new choir anthem 'In His Service' with sentiments from these speeches over the years.

So busy times ahead and happier ones too as, our families and communities come closer together, and take time out to reflect on what it means to serve God and neighbour in living and fruitful partnership. The young Princess Elizabeth said on her birthday in 1947:

"I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service...But I shall not have strength to carry out this resolution alone unless you join in it with me, as I now invite you to do: I know that your support will be unfailingly given. God help me to make good my vow, and God bless all of you who are willing to share in it."

Amen to that!

OBITUARY and TRIBUTE -THE HONOURABLE JILL GANZONI 1931 – 2022

Jill's life and influence spread way beyond our local community. A tribute in the EADT described her as а "philanthropist." She lived for some time in Playford, then Woodbridge, while her brother, John, similarly philanthropic, lived in Great Bealings. We, in these parts have particular reason for being grateful and for paying tribute. Jill's Hedgley goddaughter, Marian was particularly close to her, and to her brother, her mother having been nanny to the two of them for many years. Marian has composed the major part of this Obituary and contributed two of the photos. A full version of what she originally wrote can be obtained from the editor, as can copies of the eulogy given at her funeral service, given by the Venerable Peter Townley, Archdeacon of Pontefract, and formerly vicar at St Mary le Tower, Ipswich.

Mary Jill Ganzoni was born on 27th March 1931 at Stanford House in Ipswich. Her father was the Conservative MP for Ipswich for 24 years from 1914 – 1938 (apart from the coalition years 1923-24) and was very well-thought of in Ipswich.

Jill was encouraged to take up voluntary work when she left school. She joined many charities and organisations, helped out with the Red Cross, assisted in SPCK bookshops, and got involved with Church work. Jill's religion was always an important part of her life. Following the death of their parents, Jill moved to Bentley and John bought some land at Gt Bealings.

Jill settled into life at Bentley. She had been a keen member of the Guides and went on to become а Guide Commissioner and later became Vice-President of the Suffolk Division. Jill did much work with the Suffolk Historic Churches Trust, including helping to launch its annual cvcle ride which raised more than £5m over the years. She became a Lay reader, joined the General Synod in 1982 and in 2007 was awarded the Cross of St Augustine by the Archbishop of Canterbury at a ceremony at Lambeth Palace, marking her 25 years' service. Jill was also on the Diocesan Synod and in 1997 she was recorded as being on no less than 15 of their committees and she was the Deanerv Synod rep for Playford. It was through the Ganzoni Charitable Trust that Jill was able to help many charities in Suffolk and together with a similar trust set up by her brother, they were able to help a huge range of causes. Jill was also a Deputy Lieutenant of Suffolk.

From 1994- 2006 she was chairman of the school governors at Ipswich Girls' School and supported them throughout their move to Woolverstone Hall and their change of title to Ipswich High School. The new school swimming pool was named the Ganzoni Pool to recognise the significant donation she gave towards it.

Jill had moved to Playford towards the end of 1980's and lived in Spring Meadow for the next 16 or so years. During that time, she was a member of the WI and served on Playford Parish Council from 1999 - 2006. She was renowned for producing Suffolk rusks for WI teas. She dave а aenerous donation when Playford's hall needed village refurbishment and opened the newly extended hall in 2003. Her brother, John, was the major benefactor contributing to Bealings Village Hall Playing Field, so it was more than appropriate that Jill should

When John died in 2005, Jill was devastated not only had she lost the closest member of her family, but she had also lost her best friend, as they had supported each other throughout their lives. However, Jill continued with her charitable work.

Jill moved to a bungalow in Woodbridge in 2006 and enjoyed five years there until illness struck and she had to regretfully move into a care home where she spent her last eleven years. She became a spokesperson for the residents and took up many issues on their behalf, with the management, and generally sorted things out for them. She continued to enjoy visits from her many friends - indeed, one had to make an appointment to see her as she was so popular! Unhappily, lockdown during the pandemic meant she

and she would complain of being very lonely. She was really looking forward to the time when she could have unlimited visitors, but this was not to be.

Many people have been in touch with Marian, offering condolences, relating happy memories and anecdotes, and saying how much Jill had improved their lives. Philanthropist indeed. Many in these parts have good reason to mourn her passing - and to be grateful to her.

Jill died on 21st April 2022. Her funeral took place in St Mary's, Woodbridge on May 12th. A large congregation was privileged to hear more of Jill's work and philanthropy, so much of it discrete and personal. Her ashes will be interred close to those of her dear brother, in Great Bealings churchvard.

NATURE NOTES

A NIGHTINGALE

On a morning dog walk, I am often immersed in listening to birdsong. As I am sure many of you have, I have noticed the calls of the summer visitors such as the Blackcap, Whitethroat and Chiffchaff in the hedgerows. However, one call seemed to boom out at a volume no other could match. It often sounded in

the thickest of scrub. After a bit a detective work. I confirmed it was a Nightingale. The volume and variety of sounds is immense and all from a small. drab bird. It is famed for singing at dawn to defend its territory. The call can appear to have several unlinked sections often described as high-pitched whining, piping or "whistles, trills and gurgles."



As became more confident on recognising the call, I discovered two nightingales sinaina close to more another village walk. Here I used my phone to play the recorded call and it brought out the secretive nightingale to sing in the open on the bushes either side of the path, within a few metres of me. It was lovely to see the bird so clearly and confirm that the song came from this solitary, anonymous looking bird, which hunts from a perch dropping down on prev which can be caught either on the ground or on the wing.

The nightingale has inspired numerous poems and essays. Some of the most famous examples are the Ode to a Nightingale by John Keats and The Nightingale by Samuel Taylor Coleridge.

The name of this bird is derived from Olde English "Nihtegale" which means night songstress. It is also the national bird of Ukraine where according to legend, the birds come to hear Ukrainians sing.

Let us all hope that soon the people of Ukraine can return home in peace to hear them again.

national celebrations on a village scale

Nowadays we are all, across the land, drawn into the large-scale celebrations taking place in our capital, and witnessing the throngs of people participating there. In some way this can drain away some of the energy that could be channelled into more local celebrations, as we are watch the attracted to wonderful spectacles offered to us by national television. Spectacles which cannot be achieved on our own, local scale. As an octogenarian, I belong to that generation who tend to repeat, rather predictably, that the 1953 coronation was the first time they had watched television, and what better initiation into it could there have been the spectacle that than of coronation. But now, looking back, we can see that that was the beginning of the media nationalisation of celebration.

Now imagine the days before mass communications, before television, before radio, even. Newspapers would have made the population aware of those grand national events and celebrations, but all the energy had to be focused locally. Not only that, but the greater strains of everyday life meant that opportunities to celebrate were seized upon joyously by a population which very much depended on its own resources for its entertainment.

The history of our villages is punctuated by occasions of great rejoicing and celebration: coronations, ends of wars, roval weddinas. special birthdavs. anniversaries. harvest festivals even. Occasions bringing together so many people in the village. transcending classes, and showing the village as an entity, a microcosm of the nation. A Platinum Jubilee is unique in our history, and very unlikely to be repeated. All the more reason to celebrate it - not only the longevity of the reign of Queen Elizabeth, but also the fortitude, stamina and dignity with which she has played her role and symbolised the sense of historical Jonathan Keer continuity which is so important for our national identity.

We have pictures from the past of local celebrations – illustrated here. There are so many reasons for ensuring that this Platinum Jubilee celebration is up there, amongst the most memorable of them. Let's do the occasion justice, in a way that the best of our villages knows how.

The church will be visibly in celebration mode, with flags flying and bunting fluttering.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT - REVIEW OF YEAR

Sue Prentice (SP) spoke about the Community Governance Review being conducted by ESC and reported that the PC has requested that their number of Cllrs be permanently reduced from eight to seven, which is the current number in situ. During the financial year 2021/22, 9 new Planning Applications were received of which 7 were supported and permitted. 2 objections were submitted of which 1 was refused and the other is still outstanding. An appeal re the former Woodbarn Cottages was refused by the Inspector. The drafting of the revisions to the Neighbourhood Plan are under way and further consultations will occur with residents and FSC. SP talked about the tree planting programme and thanked John Carter-Jonas for his work on this initiative as Tree Warden. A donated Jubilee oak tree will be planted beside the Talking Bench in Lower Street at 4 p.m. on 2nd June and residents are invited to attend. ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

These are condensed notes of the proceedings of the Annual Parish Meeting held 4th May 2022. A full version of the minutes appears on the website: *www.playford.org.uk*

The Annual Parish Meeting was held at Playford Parish Hall and attended by councillors and residents.

Joan Metcalfe took the Chair – this was unanimously agreed. Joan's annual report was circulated prior to the meeting. Briefly, she thanked Adrian Melrose for his contribution as a councillor following his resignation during the year and welcomed Ben Evans who has completed his first year on the parish council. Joan explained the Precept had been raised again this year to meet the increased cost of parish maintenance. А second replacement WW1 memorial oak tree (funded by SCC) has been planted near the Boules Piste and is doing well. The first SIDs device was installed in May 2021 to monitor speeding traffic and a working party was organised to clean up the village green in September. During the year seven planning applications were considered by the PC who supported six of them but only four were given the goahead by ESC. The Neighbourhood Plan is now back on track after changing our planning consultant and should be completed this year. Progress is at last made with the unreaistered beina footpath from Church Road across to Butts Road, as the Secretary of State has stipulated a decision must be made within 12 months.

County Councillor Elaine Bryce was unable to attend in person but sent in her report which is appended to the full minutes on the parish website.

District Councillor Colin Hedgley's report was also circulated to councillors prior to the meeting and is appended to the full minutes on the parish website. Colin added that all council meetings had reverted to being held face-to-face now as they must all allow members of the public to attend. £250K was given by district councillors to the hardship fund during the pandemic to help residents needing it most, and that speeding through villages is still a widespread problem.

Rev Gary Jones, vicar of Playford gave a verbal report. He said that the Church is now open again and two Sunday services per month are held with an additional midweek service every 3rd Wednesday. The harvest supper held in October was very well attended and a Passover meal was held in April and attended by 30 people. A Good Friday event was held mainly for children in the village hall, they were looked after by Ben Wale who walked them up to the Church for a short service afterwards.
