NATURE NOTES - BUTTERCUPS



that draze our wonderful spring meadows, probably munching even the buttercups amidst the spring grass. The romanticism of it all is reflected in the old custom of holding up a fresh buttercup flower under the chin of a friend or family member. If a yellow reflection from the flower's shiny petals can be seen under the chin, the person is said to "like butter". This shows how well buttercup petals reflect light. Enjoy these springtime buttercups while you can.

Buttercups at this time of year are one of the visual glories of our meadows. They belong to a family of plants called ranunculus, with hundreds of different variants, many of them growing wild. They are simple little flowers, with a gloriously poetic name, which we so often fail to notice, so banal does it seem to have become. But do just think about it for a moment: a cup, to reflect the normal shape of the flower: butter, that most tasty of natural products, coming from the cows





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HISTORY CORNER – Making History

Some of the great turning points of history only come clear with the advantage of historical hindsight. Others, we live through, and do our best to make sure that the historical footprint we leave is worthy of the people we are, and of the times and the place we live in. Coronations are rare events, and living through a Coronation is a far more direct and vivid experience than checking back later through a list of the dates of kings and queens. Memories of the Coronation of King Charles with his Queen, Camilla on May 6th, together with the surrounding events and commemorations will have been etched deeply in the minds of many of those who were involved either as spectators or participants. This has been a historical moment we have lived through, and experienced.

Bealings celebrations began on the Friday evening with a colourful extravaganza put together in the ACH by Roger and Margaret Roseboom. Mike Bettell sent an email for publication, in which he pays tribute to all involved in putting on a wonderful evening's entertainment:

We had a wonderful evening on Friday 5 May to start the Coronation weekend at the Angela Cobbold Hall. It was a cabaret put on by the Rosebooms for free, for the village to enjoy. Those lucky enough to get tickets were treated to 2 hours of hilarious sketches, songs and jokes finishing with a lusty sing-song. Many villagers took part and much hitherto unknown talent emerged. It was a joy.

It was conceived and written by Margaret Roseboom who showed such creativity and energy. Husband Roger was the Master of Ceremonies and, together with the supporting cast, they put on a magnificent show. There were also some delicious salmon snacks and, of course, a bar. Our gratitude goes to the backroom helpers who ran the kitchen and the bar without whom the evening would not have been a success. Margaret, as if she hadn't done enough, also made the salmon snacks to order.

All deserve our praise and grateful thanks and are to be congratulated on the event which was so enjoyed by those privileged to see it. We are fortunate in our villages to have such people who are prepared to put in a great deal of time and effort to do much more than entertain, enjoyable though that certainly is, but also to bring our community together.

We have a selection of photographs taken on the night. We do not have space to publish them all, but they WILL appear in the historical records kept by village recorders, and eventually sent to archives to be enjoyed by posterity. The theme of the pictures is that of stars warming up for the Coronation Concert, the authentic version of which was scheduled for the Sunday evening in Windsor. We publish these pictures with stage-names/pseudonyms and invite readers to identify the real people behind the disguises. Whoever they were, they put on a highly entertaining show. We reiterate Mike's congratulations and thanks to all concerned.

Saturday was the day of the Coronation. Many will have watched events unfold from the comfort of their homes, but the ACH once again stepped up offering community facilities to enjoy the day's ceremonies in good company.

The bells of Great Bealings church rang out across the valley between 9 -10, in anticipation of the event. The operative was too busy to notice whether the bells of Little Bealings were doing the same.

Sunday was more of a getting out and about day, a time for wider community activity. Great Bealings had a special Coronation Communion Service, with guest preacher, Lay Canon, Roy Tricker, formerly a teacher at Coppleston High School, Ipswich. Roy gave an engaging, self-deprecating, and amusing sermon, with a strong core message of how every single individual is unique and special.

Cake - including a Colin the Caterpillar Coronation chocolate cake, and prosecco were served to eager consumers at the end of the service, and the mood was distinctly celebratory.

Later, the focus moved to the Village Hall and Plaving Field where a series of activities unfolded. Our pictures give glimpses of the Opening words (A privilege for vour Editor), picnics, refreshments, sports, boules, dog show and tug o' war. The weather treated us all kindly, and brought out villagers, including many families, in considerable numbers. We all owe thanks to the overall organisers. Sue Prentice and Helen Clarkson-Fieldsend (also voluntary photographer for the day), and their large team of helpers. Thanks to you all, the village was able to do what villages do. and celebrate the Coronation in good community style.

Here is a picture of the winner, alongside his/her royal counterpart ("Aggy" - the dog's name - suggests "her"), together with the richly deserved prize bottle of prosecco - awarded to the owners rather than to the dog, and hopefully consumed by same. The other classes had to be satisfied with handsome. but inedible and undrinkable rosettes.



The celebrations ended promptly, as there was a "Songs of Praise" service in All Saints Church. The day had begun with a special service in Great Bealings and ended with a similarly special service in Little Bealings, with an afternoon of fun and games in between. How very appropriate.

Throughout Bank Holiday Monday a special Coronation Lunch was provided at All Saints' "Absolutely Divine" café, organised by Helen Clarkson-Fieldsend and Churchwarden John Wittgreffe. Over 130 people attended, trying out the Coronation Quiche and the Coronation Trifle, also with favourites from past coronations including Coronation Chicken and Victoria Sponge. It was a great day. COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Elaine Bryce (EB) summarised her Annual Report which will be circulated to all Cllrs and attached to the minutes on the website. She specifically mentioned SCC funding to support the Suffolk Violence against Women and Girls Strategy, and to plant approx.200,000 trees across Suffolk. An extended mobile fundamental changes to the Plan, more to number plate recognition system (ANPR) terminology. She reported that the PC will be rolled out across Suffolk. DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

CH's report had been circulated and will be attached to the minutes on the website. He summarised the results of the recent elections at which he was successfully re-elected together with Dan Clerv of the Green Party. He reported that since the cost of living crisis, over 500 applications have been made across Suffolk for financial assistance. Council Tax for ESC has been increased by 2.8%. CH said that he would be interested to hear of any constituent's experiences and about the opinions requirement for photographic voter ID at the elections.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

SP confirmed that the number of Parish Cllrs has now been reduced to seven and all were re-appointed this month. She said that during the financial year 2022/23. 10 new Planning Applications were received of which 5 were supported and permitted. 3 were opposed of which 1 was withdrawn and 2 permitted. The other 2 are still outstanding. ESC has served an enforcement notice on the owner of the water meadow in Lower Street due to inappropriate use. SP provided an update timetable for on the the revised Neighbourhood Plan. There are no

to Water monitoring is continuing in the River I ark in coniunction with Grundisburgh PC. SP thanked the Speedwatch team for their continuing commitment. She also thanked l t Bealings PC and Nigel Rolph for their re-confirming involvement in the permissive footpath to the south of Lodge Road, and to SCC for their prompt reinstatement of the footbridge. The Coronation event on 7th May was very successful and approx. £350 was raised for the Village Hall. SP thanked the helpers and organisers. Due to the current financial constraints, the PC maintained an unchanged precept for 2023/24 which contributed to the decision not to increase any of the grant funding to the Village Hall and FLN. VILLAGE HALL REPORT

Peter Prentice presented a report for the Bealings Village Hall Trust which is on the PC's website. This was a busy year for renovation which included new guttering, downpipes, soffits and facias, new LED emergency exit liahts and а new defibrillator battery and software update. New basketball backboards were installed on the sports court and much work was done on the Playing Field, together with tree work around the car park.

ANGELA COBBOLD REMEMBERED

Angela Cobbold had a dream, to create a place of spiritual fulfillment for the people of Little Bealings and her memorial hall truly has a very friendly atmosphere. In 1924 a Trust was established with a view to build a village hut on land in *Sandy Lane*, which had been donated to the Parish by Mr Albert Howe. This was to be, "used in perpetuity as a non-sectarian and non-political place of recreation and social intercourse under the name of Little Bealings Parish Institute, for the advantage or benefit of the male and female inhabitants of Little Bealings and the surrounding district."



One of the Trustees was Angela Cobbold, daughter of a prominent local family. Worthy as the Institute was, Angela was sorry that there was no hall specifically for the church. Sadly, Angela died in 1936 aged fifty-two and unmarried, before her dream was realised.

The land where Angela Cobbold Hall now stands was once part of The Grove, until comparatively recently, a home for retired gentlefolk, but previously, the private residence of Captain Eric Hervey. After Angela's death Captain Hervey agreed to sell a small piece of land to Angela's mother so that she could have a hall erected in memory of her daughter. The land was conveyed to Francis Cobbold, Angela's brother, for the princely sum of £25 so now the hall could be built.

Angela Cobbold was remembered as part of the coronation celebrations.

PARISH COUNCIL

These are condensed notes of the proceedings of **PLAYFORD'S ANNUAL PARISH MEETING** held 10th May 2023. A full version of the minutes appears on the website: *www.playford.org.uk*

The Annual Parish Meeting was held at Playford Parish Hall and attended by councillors and residents. Joan Metcalfe was unanimously voted in as Chairman, her annual report was circulated to councillors prior to the meeting. Joan expressed the sadness at losing several valued members of the community within the last year: Brian Seward, former chairman of Playford PC and village historian, and more recent councillors Ted Herrington and Keith Carson who will be much missed at parish council meetings. The precept was raised by £500 last year to cover rising costs. Drainage explorations took place on the C324 to ascertain the problems involved and there are imminent plans for new traffic signs opposite the junction of the C324 and Church Road to alleviate the traffic priority issues on the narrow section of C324. Co Cllr Elaine Bryce has provided funds for warning signs on Church Lane to deter heavy traffic and Dist Cllr Colin Hedgley has provided funds for renovating the Bottle Bank area. The replacement memorial Oak tree survived last year's summer thanks to a watering rota carried out by councillors and volunteers. SAVID and SIDs working well at calming speeding traffic. A Modification Order was granted to reinstate unregistered footpath between Butts Road and Church Road, but this has been appealed against by the landowner - further evidence to counter this has been submitted, together with a supporting letter from our Co Cllr to the Planning Inspectorate. The Neighbourhood Plan is in its final stages and will hopefully be submitted to ES planners later this year.

County Councillor Elaine Bryce whose full report is appended to the full minutes on the parish website, gave her report in person and thanked everyone for their understanding whilst she was absent through illness last year.

District Councillor Colin Hedgley's report was circulated to councillors prior to the meeting and is appended to the full minutes on the parish website. Colin has been reelected as Dist Cllr and will be serving the 13 parishes in the ward with a new councillor, Dan Clery. Colin would like to hear whether voter ID used at the last election proved difficult for anyone and to contact him if so.

Rev Gary Jones, vicar of Playford gave a verbal report. He also regretted the loss of so many valued members of the community in the last year and remarked on the poignancy of celebrating the late Queen's Jubilee last June only to be followed by her sad death in September. The Clarkson memorial service was held in July, the Christmas carol event was a success again in December and the Good Friday event was also well-attended. A successful "All Faiths and None" coffee morning was held in the Church in April, and it is hoped this will be repeated twice a year. Finally, Gary expressed the need for everyone to work together in the community and thanked everyone who had helped to keep the Church open over the last year.
