ANNA AIRY



ST MARY'S

The process for finding our new priest is moving steadily on. We have had the first meeting (called, for what it's worth, a Section 11 meeting), and the Benefice Profile Document was agreed and accepted by those present. This will now be presented to a final (Section 12) meeting, with the Archdeacon present, on June 2nd, and will then be used by the diocese to advertise for applications for the vacant post. Thereafter it is fingers-tightly-crossed time.

LOOKING BACK

It was good to meet up again with Robert A Moor, all the way from Cornwall, and a descendant of Canon Moor, the 19th century Rector who drastically changed St Mary's. Robert comes from the Truro Diocese, and is responsible for Memorial Stability Testing – most of our memorials are fairly sturdy, to our amateur eyes and drew no professional comment from him, but he did buy a couple of copies of the History of the Church, and attended the family service in Little Bealings on May 18th.

We were also pleased to welcome Bishop John Wayne, now living in Grundisburgh, to our service on May 11th. We are lucky that all the spaces on the service roster have been filled by a range of local ministers, and are grateful to them all for their support.

LOOKING AHEAD SERVICES

Our services in June are:

Sunday 1st: Songs of Praise at 10.00 am

Sunday 8th: 8.00 Holy Communion – even if you are not a regular you may find this service, early on a summer's day, particularly uplifting.

There are no services on the middle two Sundays, but, of course, there will be services held in the other parishes in the Benefice.

Sunday 29th June: 8-00 Holy Communion – and do please note that this is the day on which Philip Merry will be ordained. The service is in the cathedral at 10-00 am, so there will be just time to make it, as long as you have had an early breakfast.

Do please also make a note of the Quoits match arranged for 2.00 - 4.00 pm on Sunday August 3^{rd} – this is an additional prelude to our WW1 service.

CHURCHYARD

Recent rains have led to a growth spurt, particularly of nettles. The paths have been cleared, and some of the nettles strimmed, so access should be fine. Do take advantage of the peacefulness of the setting. It is always surprising how often relative strangers just drop by for a moment's peace, maybe in the middle or at the end of a working day, maybe as part of a leisurely bike tour of the countryside.

Please note that the path round the East end of the church remains diverted, because of the possible risk of falling masonry from the East wall/ window. The problem is being dealt with as part of our long-term plan, expertly and energetically pursued by Charles Barrington. Our thanks too, to Peter Prentice for dealing with this problem and for ensuring a clear-up of the drainage system.

Another problem briefly occurred in the shape of a beehive close to the en-

trance gate. No need to be alarmed. This was temporarily put in place by beekeeper, John Waspe (you might also see him at the Suffolk Show herding geese with his sheepdogs!). The bees from the other side of the brick wall had decided to swarm, so John was trying to recapture the swarm.

Do let us know of any sightings of barn owls in the vicinity of the two Suffolk Wildlife Trust nesting boxes in the churchyard.

A CENTENARY COMMEMORATION

In 1913 the Great Bealings Quoits Team were crowned Champions of Suffolk. The players in the Team were: G.Waters, J.Mills, J.Emmerson, H.Death, D.Hockley and J.Adams. The Umpire was F.Etheridge, the scorer E.Grindell.

One year later the Great War began and like so many villages in our country, memorials were built to commemorate the names of those who made the ultimate sacrifice. Their names appear on our War Memorial. Sadly some of the young men in the above successful team are also named on that list. There are many important reasons for us not to forget those who gave their lives in the Great War and such reasons will be expressed in many ways on August 3rd throughout the land, including in our own church. It therefore seems fitting, in view of the link shown, to re-introduce the game of quoits in reflective memory of the Great Bealings Quoits Champions of Suffolk, 1911/12/13

We have the pitch, kindly provided by Andy and Eunice Mayhew – we have the Quoits equipment – what we need now are the teams. In the spirit of the occasion, Great Bealings would like to issue a challenge to the other villages in our Benefice to a Quoits match, played under the same rules as those who played in 1913. A team will consist of 6 players and to acknowledge the changes in present society, there should be 3 gentlemen and 3 ladies. Dress for the men is recommended as tie, waistcoat and flat cap (see 1913 photo) for the ladies, preferably a long dress/skirt and summer hat. An umpire and scorer will be provided and a copy, beforehand, of the rules of the game. So come on, Little Bealings, Playford and Culpho – the hour of challenge has arrived.

In September 2013 East Anglia THREE Limited (a subsidiary of East Anglia Offshore Wind Limited and 50/50 joint venture between ScottishPower Renewables and Vattenfall) published a Statement of Community Consultation, outlining how we would consult with local communities and businesses throughout our development of the proposed East Anglia THREE Offshore Windfarm.

On the 6th, in memory of her father Bill Boughton's birthday, Margaret Roseboom switched them on. He would have been 93. Bill was a Coastal Command pilot during the war looking for U.Boats in the Bay of Biscay.

The next day – 7th – they also shone for Eddie Barrett, remembered by Anne and family and many others for this true Suffolk gentleman.

On 8th, our own Stadium of Light appeared to warm Andrew Reed's heart as his beloved Sunderland retained their Premiership status.

The 9th celebrated the life of Lt Col James Goodson at Melanie Brookes' request. James died aged 91 after an amazing life which you will be able to learn about in a separate section of this magazine.

LT.COL JAMES GOODSON USAAF (died 1 May 2014)

Sometimes in life one comes across by chance extraordinary people and James Goodson is one. I wonder how many of vou last week saw a lone Spitfire flying through the Suffolk skies with the unique sound of its Merlin engine emphasising the sheer beauty of this classic aeroplane. As a boy I was evacuated to a small village in the Sussex Downs where I used to stand and watch the vapour trails as the R.A.F fought off the Luftwaffe in the Battle of Britain. My excitement knew no bounds as the sounds of the engines were sometimes followed by planes being shot down, all of which I believed were German!

The lone Spitfire I saw last week gave a victory roll over Great Bealings, thanks to Melanie Brooks of Boot Street whose family had close friendship ties with James Goodson. His funeral in Canada took place whilst the lights were on in memory of his time in England as a fighter pilot, firstly with the R.A.F. and then with the U.S.A.A.F. when America entered the war. His skill elevated to him becoming a fighter ace with 32 "kills" . Like many other American air crew he was shot down during a raid over Berlin and was captured and imprisoned in Stalag Luft III. the infamous camp on which "The Great Escape" was based. There is however so much this unique Canadian more that experienced and achieved during his life, full details of which can be seen on www.theglobeandmail.com - Please have a look at the history of this remarkable man who was buried with full military honours and a flypast by the R.C.A.F. In addition I have a further detailed copy originated by Melanie Brooks which I shall be pleased to let anvone have. Lt.Col James Goodson we salute you and all those other air crew who flew from East Anglia.

ALL SAINTS CHURCH ROOF AND TOWER REPAIRS

The PCC have known for some time that the roof on the North side of the church needed to be retiled. After two freezing winters and the previous very wet one it has taken its toll on the roof. Our surveyor's report shows that the roof timbers under the tiling are showing signs of rotting. We have been advised that new timbers and tiles are needed. Also some repairs are needed on the south side of the tower where some of the stone work has come away, also due to weather conditions

This all comes at a cost, a very big cost for our small church - £35,000.The PCC have had three tenders for the work and have accepted the lowest and we all agree that the work needs to be done and completed, if possible, by the winter.

PLANNING

DC/14/1125/OUT: Valcot/Acacia Cottages, The Street: Demolition of existing two dwellings, workshop unit and associated outbuildings. Erection of four dwellings with garages and creation of new centralised vehicular access.

The views of local residents were available to the Council, both support and opposition. It was resolved to object to the application as over-development of the site, the design was out of character with the street scene and there were traffic and environmental concerns. There was concern that 'back land' development would set a precedent. A smaller development which reflected the current housing density would be supported.

FOXHALL STADIUM

SCDC had agreed a new operating formula without consultation. It was agreed to invite an officer to the Council meeting in September to explain concerns further.

EAOW

Consultation on EAOW3 was due shortly. There was no decision on EAOW1 and it was not yet known if all the cabling would be installed at the same time.

STABLES OPPOSITE BRIMAR, THE STREET

There was concern about parking, which was not taking place within the site as intended.

PSWICH GARDEN SUBURB

Presentation information about this development had been circulated to Councillors. There was concern that a new access on to Tuddenham Road would slow journey times into Ipswich.

TREE WORKS

There was no objection to proposed tree works at The Chestnuts, Martlesham Road. SCDC had given permission for tree works at Oakfield, Playford Road.

PROPOSED CONSERVATION AREA FOR LITTLE BEALINGS

The views of local residents were available to the Council. Most of those who had responded were against the proposal, as overly restrictive on residents and because the village was not of especial architectural merit. The trees were valued, but it was considered that protection by TPO was more appropriate. It was resolved not to proceed with an application to SCDC. A tree survey would be considered further.

PUBLIC SEWER FOR THE STREET

Application had been made to Anglian Water and an initial site inspection was planned for 27 May.

ELECTORAL REVIEW OF SUFFOLK COASTAL

It was noted that Woodbridge Town Council and Great Bealings and Hasketon Parish Council agreed that the parishes should not be included in a Woodbridge ward. The Electoral Commission's recommendations were due on 29 July.

POLICE

The next 12PT meeting would be attended by Mrs Wilson as Mrs Cornish was unavailable.

FOOTPATHS

SCC had confirmed funding for footpath cutting and Mr Ball would carry out the cutting again.

Walkers are reminded that there is no public footpath or permission to walk along the river from the footbridge by the white bridge over the River Lark.

The permissive footpath between Great and Little Bealings runs only from the wooden village sign, along the edge of the field parallel to the road and ends opposite the Playing Field path.

There is also no public footpath or permission to continue around the field to join the Manor Farm track. Walkers should only use the permitted route.

FINANCE

Updated Financial Regulations were adopted. The internal audit for 2013/14 had been completed and the external audit was approved for return. The first half of the precept, £3025.25, had been received from SCDC. Cheques were signed for annual subscriptions to Suffolk Association of Local Councils, Community Action Suffolk and the Suffolk Preservation Society, for donations to the Village Hall and Playing Field, the Benefice Magazine and the internal auditor, and for the Clerk's salary, annual allowance and expenses and for PAYE.

LOCALITY BUDGET

District Councillor Tony Fryatt had $\pounds 6,000$ available to fund local capital projects in his ward. Please contact the Clerk if you have any suggestions.

NEXT MEETING

The next scheduled meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday 7 July 2014. During the first 15 minutes of all Council meetings the public are welcome to raise any matters of concern with Councillors. The public may also speak for a maximum of 3 minutes on any item on the Agenda at the beginning of that item.

THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

This was held in Playford Village Hall and attended by councillors and residents. They were welcomed by the Chairman, Joan Metcalfe and refreshments were served. Joan then read out her report on the year's activities – a full copy of this report can be seen on the website.

County Councillor Peter Bellfield was unfortunately unable to attend due to illness but District Councillor Steven Hudson reported on Planning issues, EAOW, Northern Development of Ipswich, Finance and the latest from the Boundary Commission.

The Police were also unable to attend.

ELECTION AND APPOINTMENTS FOR 2014/15

Joan Metcalfe was voted in as Chairman for the forthcoming year and accepted. Steve Hicks is happy to continue as Vice-Chairman and Joan Metcalfe will continue as Parish Hall rep and as the 12PT/SNT rep. Veronica Bunbury will continue as Footpaths Officer and Mr Paul Gardiner is willing to continue in his role as Internal Auditor.

ACTION POINT REVIEW

The two grit bins smashed by SCC verge-trimming vehicle last June will be replaced soon – the delay was caused by change of staff in Highways dept. The fallen tree blocking FP no. 20 has been cleared but overhanging branches further down the track have now been reported. Byway 19 is now is dry enough for repairs to be carried out –the

clerk will investigate whether this can be reverted to a Bridle Way to prevent vehicles damaging it in future bad weather. Contractors working in Church Lane will look into fixing the broken underground pipe causing problems of water seepage. See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details of these items.

FINANCE

The accounts for year ended 31st March 2014 have passed the internal audit. The Annual Return and Statement of Accounts 2013/14 were approved and adopted by the Council and will be sent to BDO LLP shortly for the intermediate and external audits. The first instalment of the Precept has been received (£2,250) together with the Precept grant (£155.21). Cheques were authorised for SALC subscription, Clerk's expenses, annual insurance renewal and the internal audit fee. Amendments to the Financial Standing Orders were approved to enable online banking to be arranged at a future point. Clerk to investigate the merits of possibly changing the present banking arrangements. The various sand bins in the village have been re-valued at £700 - this includes the two new ones, which are about to be installed.

HIGHWAYS

It was felt that road signs and street name signs could be cleaner. Parishioners are to be requested to wipe any signs near to their homes if at all possible.

OTHER MATTERS

An auction is to be held in the Parish Hall on Wednesday 25th June to auction the five Pocock paintings –details will advertised around the village soon. Quotes have been obtained for a basketball post & net and for concreting the post into an area on the playing field, Clerk to ascertain whether available Outdoor Playspace Funds may be used for this. Headway, Ipswich & E.Suffolk have requested permission to park their mobile charity shop van in the village on a regular basis. Quotes have also been obtained for renovating the village sign & notice board.

Private landowners and occupiers have legal responsibility for:

- Ensuring growth does not prevent the passage or affect the safety of people using a road, footway, cycleway or public right of way, including cyclists and pedestrians
- Ensuring growth does not obscure road signs
- Maintaining visibility for road users, particularly at junctions and on the inside of bends
- Removing dead or decaying trees and other growth that may fall across the highway
- Removing branches that may prevent the passage of high-sided vehicles
- Ensuring the highway is left clear of debris from cutting work

Geoffrey Buckingham Pocock was born at 47 Ludgate Hill, London on 15 October 1879, son of William Josephus Pocock, a substantial milliner but later a brewery cashier, and his wife Ellen Miles, who married in London in 1878. Educated at Merchant Taylors' School, London after which he studied at Slade School of Fine Art from where he gained first class certificates for painting and drawing. He became life master and teacher of etching at Battersea Polytechnic School of Art and later life master at London County Council School of Photo-Engraving and Lithography at Bolt Court, London.

He married on 18 February 1916, Anna Airy, painter, both in oil and watercolour, etcher and pastelier. He lived part of his married life in Playford and died here in 1960 aged 78.
