WHAT'S CHANGED

Last month we published a full account of possible changes to this Magazine. 10 days later only one response had been received, and that was to offer an item for publication. This all-engulfing silence suggests either that no-one reads the Magazine, or that the readership as a whole is ready to accept change, or, indeed, welcomes it. Had there been a torrent of anary invective we would have had to reconsider our plans for change. Nothing happened - no response, one way or the other - so we have gone ahead, introduced colour. changed the changed the name. We can always review this if anyone comes up with anything better, but the beautiful rivers and valleys of the Lark and Fynn flow through our villages, characterise them and bind us together. Hence the front cover! We have kept "News" - in line with the old title, rather than go for anything more fancy such as "Messenger, Courier, Grapevine etc."

CONTENT

The content cannot change immediately. It has to evolve. But we will gradually introduce regular items. Editorials will be written by different people -2 a year on behalf of the churches at Easter and Christmas, two a year from each of the villages. We will establish a template, setting aside space for specific contributors, and suggesting the number of words appropriate to the space. We hope to find support to publish a regular children's page, with a children's editor. We will introduce a format for Obituaries and Profiles. We would love to receive regular contributions from Bealings School, plus a voung people's Section. Do send us puzzles/jokes/crosswords, occasional cookery items, occasional write-ups/

critiques of personal visits, ideas for school holiday activities. For some time the Magazine has been contributor-led. We would like to be more pro-active, inviting readers to contribute specific items, pictures and ideas. With more pictures and colour, we will need to find a picture editor.

FINANCE

This has all come about because the Magazine made a loss last year, on top of a loss the previous year. We will now have our own bank account, our own Treasurer, and will be setting a budget. We will need income of over £2000 a vear. As before this will have to come from Parish Councils and from advertising - (Donations always welcome too!). The rates for advertising will be more clearly advertised and we very much hope that the new format will be attractive to both old and new advertisers. There will also be an option for colour advertisements at a slightly higher rate. Do please help us to bring in more advertisers. The rates for a full year will be from as little as £35 for one sixth of a page, up to £150 for a full page.

This is YOUR Magazine and can only be as good as the contributions we receive. You, the readers, are also our contributors. Your Magazine is part of what binds our communities together, by ensuring that our local communications are effective and inclusive. FUNDING OF THIS MAGAZINE

The review of this Magazine, together with its functions, format and financing, was our collective response to two years of financial losses. We have addressed these issues. We have changed the presentation of the Magazine, while holding printing costs more or less at previous levels, despite the addition of our much enhanced colour sections. We now have to ensure that control is exercised over the size of the Magazine - last year it varied between 24 and 40 pages, with monthly costs swinging wildly between £132 and £222. From a budgetary point of view this is unsustainable.

We are moving from church finances to our own independent bank account, but the funds to be transferred are not sufficient to see us through to the end of the year. This makes it all the more important that:

- We seek help from anyone who can be, or might be able to identify. possible advertisers, to fill the pages allocated to advertising
- Parish Council contributions become all the more vital
- Any donation, from whatever source, will be greatly welcomed
- We attract sponsorship from business or private sponsors. (Any sponsorship would be acknowledged appropriately)

We very much hope that the re-vamped Magazine will, over time, attract more advertising, insofar as it becomes a more attractive read. If you or any potential advertiser would be prepared to help us bridge the gap until the end of the year. please contact Norman Porter, Advertising Co-ordinator (nhp@rillcott.co.uk), and a rate will be calculated to cover the final 5 issues of 2016. We start our 2017 advertising year with renewals in time for the February 2017 issue.

Please be fully aware that the situation is urgent. If we have no money in the account we will not be able to commission our printers to print any impending issue. Those responsible for moving the Magazine forward are confident that the future of the Magazine is bright, provided that we can move positively over the next few months. The future of this Magazine - or, at least, its free distribution to every household in our four villages - is in your hands, and in the hands of those who entrust us with the advertising of their wares and services.

PLANT SALE 2016

The surge in income and the very positive vibes emanating from this year's Plant Sale are motive enough to produce quickly - and even proudly! - a very warm Thank You letter to all those who made it possible. Income was almost 25% up on last year, which is a fantastic result and a credit to all concerned. Well done. We did have a bit of a dampening shower right at the beginning but were otherwise lucky to have enjoyed very decent weather. Certainly nothing that deterred our visitors. who arrived in considerable numbers from quite a wide area. I did a bit of amateur market research and discovered that people had come in from Ipswich, Martlesham, Kesgrave, Sutton, Woodbridge Stowmarket and Bury St Edmunds and had been alerted to the sale through a variety of media, including our own signs designed to catch the eye of driversthrough. Ferial Rogers deserves a warm mention for her publicising efforts with the wider media - I even heard her name mentioned on Radio Suffolk, in connection with the Sale.

At our preliminary meeting we agreed that the Plant Sale formula was in need of constant freshening up. Thus was born the idea of the Children's Garden Hub. Margaret Roseboom picked up the idea and ran with it - with wonderful results. She and a team of talented helpers assured that our vounger visitors had plenty to keep them occupied - and able to learn a bit about growing and living things in the process. A discrete exercise in educating future generations of plant growers, with the support of Bealings School. If this was the experimental launch of the idea then the future can be bright indeed. It makes the occasion more of a family day out.

We had an impressive number of plants this year, and it seemed that a much higher proportion of them were sold than in recent years. Suffolk Wild Life Trust had leaner pickings— but we compensated for this with a few items of paraphernalia, and surplus cardboard boxes. Once again we had the attraction of a very special raffle prize, generously gifted by Colin Hopkins—a flight in the skies over Gt Bealings, and it was won by one of our stalwart helpers, Bob Tate. Very fitting.

We finished up with net income of just over £2300 - a spurt upwards from last year. The Raffle takings leapt to just under £500 and for this we have to thank our new Raffle Team of Toby and Faith Chapman, who tapped into a whole new grapevine of possible donors. Their debut was nothing short of brilliant, and the quality of the prizes was exceptional. In the event The Raffle brought in £457. the special raffle £90, Cakes £306, and there must have been some 200 or so people enjoying the occasion. The rest of the money came from the sale of plants and paraphernalia. Special thanks too to our ever-cheerful refreshments team - a bonus, in that the ingredients are kindly donated. Very well done to all concerned, in whatever capacity. The value for money factor, compared with local Garden Centres, continues to be a main attraction.

Our team of experienced **car parkers** again did a great job in keeping the customers happy – and moving. Quite a bit of their work is done in advance – putting up signs etc – and that works. Our thanks to the Ruffords for again allowing helpers to use the space in front of the Manor House and to Nigel Rolph for use of the drive. Eric Richardson once again promoted his wonderfully crafted walking sticks, and Gary Farmer (aka Remraf) added much colour to the occasion with his pictures and photographs. If you can think of further ways of improving things, do let me

know, while the memory is still fresh.

Much of the enjoyment of the occasion comes from the teamwork that goes into making a success of this event, so an enormous thank you is due to all who contributed – in whatever capacity. The Village Hall Lunch again brought together some 20 helpers, and really summed up the spirit of teamwork that makes for success. It also ensures that the Village Hall is completely restored to its original state before 2.00.

We once again hope that this year's team will be prepared to stay in place for next Most of us are surely still young vear. enough! The heavy gang, responsible for the initial set up, needs recruits for the Friday morning; otherwise all departments were fully manned. Thanks to Peter Prentice and Bob Tate for use of trailers.

We normally have just one pre-sale meeting a year, and hope that team leaders will again be in place unless they let us know otherwise, so could we please put the provisional date of Monday March 6th (ACH) into the diary for the preliminary meeting, on the assumption that anything that needs to be done before then will have been done by those who have done it all before. Easter Sunday next year is April 16th March so I suggest that we go for the comparable date of Saturday April 22nd for next year's Plant Sale—giving the plants time to mature and, hopefully, to be as good as frost-proof. Hasketon have their sale a week later usually, and we don't want to tangle with them. Any counterarguments?

Apologies for having just mentioned just a few of the many names of people who contributed to the success of the morning. but grateful thanks once again to every**one** for all your efforts and achievements. ST MARY'S

This is a time of significant challenges, both for your village church, and for this Magazine. Both have for many years been part of the fabric of our community, and probably all-too-often taken for granted. We are not alone in facing these challenges – they are on the agenda of rural communities across the country.

To take the Magazine first: as most people know, the viability of the Magazine is now entirely dependent on income from Parish Councils and advertisers. In the past two years income has failed to match costs, with the inevitable result that an urgent review has taken place, as to how these challenges can be met. Despite the increasing use of digital media, this Magazine is the only hard-copy means of communication across our four villages, and, as such, performs a very important function. We need to do all that we can to keep it viable.

Secondly: our church. There is an inevita-

ble correlation between the size of congregations, the frequency of services and levels of income. The building is insured for around £2 million pounds, which gives vou some idea of its structural and architectural value - but it is used for just two or three hours a month. This is totally disproportionate. We are faced with potential repair costs of close on six figures. with more and more churches desperately joining the queue for grants. On a more regular basis we have to pay a parish share to the Diocese of around £10,000 a year, in order to secure the services of a priest and to enjoy diocesan support. Income is nowhere near this level. So we face real challenges. The solutions are not yet clear, but the reality of those challenges needs to be spelt out and fully understood. These words are written in a combative rather than defeatist spirit, but they need to be written. Do please carry on the debate and share your thoughts with your PCC.



ELECTION AND **APPOINTMENTS** 2016/17- Joan Metcalfe was voted in as Chairman for the forthcoming year and Steve Hicks will continue as Vice-Chairman. ACTION POINT REVIEW

Byway19 issues will be held over until the next meeting. The verges on Hill Farm Road have been trimmed back by SC Norse Ltd and Clarke & Simpson have tidied the hedges and cleared adjacent ditches on behalf of the landowner. We are still awaiting remedial work on the unsuccessful temporary repair of the tarmac at junction of Brook Lane & Butts Road. The arm missing from signpost at iunction opp. Church Road on the C324

has still not been replaced - clerk will of Playford within the boundaries of its chase this. Further evidence forms verifying the existence of unregistered FP to the north of Playford have been received and this will be taken to the next stage. It was agreed not to pursue cutting back the vegetation to improve vision at the splay at junction of C324 and Church Road as the construction of the new EAOW depot will be commenced there soon. FP9 & FP13 still overgrown but in the hands of contractors. SC Norse Ltd is to be approached to remove the residual debris from the fallen laurel & ivy in Spring Meadow, which contractors failed to tidy up. Clerk to report further fallen branches at Alder Carr on FP20.

The Annual Governance Statement for 2015/16 was signed by the Chairman & Clerk but the internal audit for accounts for year ended 31st March 2016 is not yet complete. An additional Council meeting is scheduled for 1st June 2016 to approve and adopt the accounts and these will then be sent to BDO LLP for the external audit. The first instalment of the Precept Precept grant has been received (£2,276.79). Continuation of the clerk's salary and expenses at the same rate was agreed although this will be reviewed 2017/18.
