THE LANDSCAPE OF A VILLAGE

With apologies for misquoting the strapline of the Great Bealings Neighbourhood Plan¹, I thought that it might be interesting to look at what actually defines the landscape that we value so much and then consider what steps we can take to protect and enhance it.

Within the parish we have two landscape character types: the 'Rolling Valley Farmlands and Furze' and 'Ancient Rolling Farmlands' (inhabited in the past, no doubt, by the rolling English drunkard who made the rolling English road pursued by the parson, sexton or squire).

It seems likely that over the years the inhabitants may have changed more than

our landscape, much of which originates provide 'ecological connectivity' which from the ice age. The landscape of the may be important in allowing wildlife to Fvnn Lark vallev is covered with silts. sands and gravels dating from the Anglian glaciation, which accounts for the drv sandv soils and associated areas of furze (heathland). There are also mixed hedgerows and fragments of woodland. The chalky clay and loam soils to be found in the Rolling farmlands above the valley floor also originate from the Anglia glaciation. This area is characterised by large areas of semi-natural woodland with prominent oak trees and largely arable fields.

The lack of development has ensured the preservation of several areas which are regarded as Priority Habitats. Acid grassland occurs wherever sandy, free draining soils dominate, such as the plateau and south facing slope to the west of Hasketon Road and the area around Cherry Tree Farm. Floodplain Grazing Marsh is a familiar sight along both rivers. We also enjoy ancient species rich hedgerows interspersed with oaks: mixed deciduous woodland: wet woodlands: lowland meadows: lowland wood pasture and parkland to the south of Bealings House; and at least seven ponds.



Our two rivers play a very important role encouraging and supporting in biodiversity. The rivers provide corridors which link adjacent habitats and thereby

adapt to the effects of climate change.

The forthcoming Environment Act is introducina Local Nature Recoverv Strategies across the country which will map specific opportunities for taking priority action for nature recovery. These spatial strategies for nature are likely to be at district, rather than parish level but Suffolk Wildlife Trust suggests that the Suffolk river systems and their associated habitats are likely to be a key feature in identifying the most valuable habitats as well as being a focal point for nature's of "nature-based recovery. The use solutions" will be encouraged to address wider environmental problems including flooding and climate change mitigation.

This initiative gives us a focus for our efforts to protect and enhance the landscape. Tree planting has been identified as vitally important contributor to both initiatives. Over one hundred native trees were planted recently along Rosery Lane and Lodge Road by volunteers and members of the parish council, and we shall continue to look for opportunities to plant them across the parish. So please let us know if you have identified a suitable location for more trees to be planted. Please also share any other ideas you might have for rewilding. NATURE NOTES





This item is prompted by a picture of an ivy-clad Culpho church. That, in turn reminded me of an ivy-clad Seckford Hall, and, similarly of a picture of The Old Rectory, Great Bealings.

It was once clearly fashionable to allow ivy to festoon the facades of some of our most significant buildings. The American Ivy League universities owe their name to formal ivy-planting ceremonies. Nature was allowed to soften the architectural edges of prestigious buildings, and to it is very destructive. Apparently, you impart a kind of romantic natural look to them. We also know that ivy is wild-life friendly, allowing access to a range of creatures, some welcome, some probably evergreen, and that gives it, along with not.

Something has changed. Perhaps it is the realisation that ivy is incompatible with good maintenance, that it harbours damp, indeed that it feeds off the mortar and can actually be destructive.

We have a love-hate relationship with ivy. It is a useful plant to cover up our oil tanks and relatively unsightly fences, as it mortar to the persistence of nature. is fast-growing.



It provides sustenance and habitat to wildlife. while at the same time threatening to choke the life out of whatever plant or surface is hosting it. When it takes over a tree it can give the tree a bulk which is unsustainable in high winds and makes it vulnerable. Hence the snipping off of ivy roots close to the base of the trunk, to protect the tree.

Ivy may be symbolic, (fidelity, eternity or strength, depending on your country) but



should not bring it into the house when it is attached to firewood, as it brings bad luck. But it does have the quality of being holly, a special role at Christmas.

Such is the persistence and sturdiness of ivy that it prompts the imagination to think ivy could become readily take over in a post-human world. It certainly needs little invitation to establish itself at the base of our houses, walls and trees and to soften their profiles, a concession of bricks and

HISTORY CORNER -COMPARATIVE JUSTICE

The dispensing of justice over the years has been subject to changing social attitudes. We probably all remember how village stocks were used as a means of discouraging social misbehaviour at a local level, but two local nineteenth century examples of sentencing might serve to put current sentencing policy in perspective.





As a follow up to the recent village history a distortion of divine justice. I was told the following story about Rev Philip Meadows of The Lodge, Great Bealings, whose only other claim to claim appeared to have been collusion with local smugglers. Apparently, his black pony was stolen - these were the days when the necessary means of travel for parsons was the pony and trap. The wrath of the Magistrates was visited upon the miscreant who was sentenced to transportation, presumably to Australia, whence he never returned. Something of

This ties in with a previous story about a man who stole a bag of flour from the His Bealings windmill. punishment: similarly, transportation to Australia. The poor man died in transit. Hardly a proportionate punishment.

Nineteenth century justice was very much in the hands of the gentry. Property was sacrosanct, and punishments exemplary.

HEADWAY SUFFOLK NEURO CONFERENCE 11 MAY

Keynote speakers on brain injury and crime, the mobile stroke unit and powerful brain injury survivor and carer stories.

The conference, now in its seventh year, takes place at Wherstead Park, near lpswich, from 10am – 5pm, but it will also be streamed online.

Four speakers will address the subject of brain injury and crime.

Tim Passmore, Suffolk's Police and Crime Commissioner, will be joined by Chief Inspector Nick Paling, Head of Custody in Norfolk and Suffolk, to talk about how people with a disability are cared for in custody.

His Honour Judge Martyn Levett, a resident judge at Ipswich Crown Court, will talk about acquired brain injury witnesses in Crown Court.

Huw Williams, an Associate Professor of Clinical Neuropsychology, will talk about his experiences of brain injury and the criminal justice system.

The conference will also hear three powerful personal stories.

Gordon Watling will share his journey, from a former Headway Suffolk client to a firefighter at Suffolk Fire and Rescue, while Alec Charnley will talk about his switch from service user to director. Carole Almond will speak of her life as caring for a loved one with dementia.

Professor Silke Walter, a neurology consultant, will discuss the mobile stroke unit, which carries out immediate tests to determine the best course of action.

Amanda Cousins, a Chief Operating Officer at the United Kingdom Acquired Brain Injury Forum, will speak about brain injury rehab on a national and regional basis.

The conference will also have updates from Headway Suffolk's CEO Helen Fairweather and mental health nurse Sam Jangum.

Notes of matters considered at the Council meeting held on 7 February:

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSIONS

Two residents referred to current activities at Sinks Pit and preparations for the next Joint Agency Liaison Group (JALG) meeting.

PLANNING

Application: scc/0097/21c: part retrospective erection of a wooden close boarded fence along part of southern site boundary: Sinks Pit Main Road Kesgravelt was noted that the development would result in close boarded fencing being installed on top of the existing bund next to the public footpath. It was resolved to object to the development in view of the adverse impact on the landscape and amenity value of the footpath.

ENFORCEMENT AT SINKS PIT

It was agreed to arrange a meeting with ESC to discuss issues not covered by the previous JALG meeting and to set up a Working Group to compile a list of outstanding issues to put to SCC, as a meeting had been refused. Working Group members would be Chris Cheeseman, Mike Garnham, Douglas Hunter and Helen Saagi.

SAFER VILLAGE DRIVING (SAVID)

In response to a request, it was agreed to donate £50 to SAVID for 2021/22. It was agreed to accept SAVID's proposal that ESC funding for another Speed Indicator Device be passed to the Council for it to purchase the device and share it with one other parish.

PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

I hope that everyone is now settled into 2022, and I doubt I am the only one searching for the first daffodils emerging, so I can say 'it must be Spring!' My perception this year is that the new ways of living and working Covid19 imposed upon us nearly two years ago, have now been absorbed into our lifestyles. A combination of flexibility and resilience has seen many people reassess priorities and alter routines, and some of these changes are likely to remain with us indefinitely.

In that respect I wanted to give an update about Parish Council meetings for the foreseeable future. It has long been the Council's routine to meet in the Committee Room of Bealings Village Hall, usually on the first Monday of every other month and with such additional meetings as have been needed.

For a while in 2020 and 2021 government legislation provided for Parish Councils to meet 'remotely', meaning that we held meetings using Zoom so that everyone could stay safely at home during lockdowns. There was no change in the rules for meetings to be open to the public and I am very pleased with the way we adapted quickly, acquiring a Zoom account and admitting residents to our meetings to listen and speak, as if the meeting was held in the Committee Room as usual. Broadband width was at times a challenge, but we managed very well to carry on 'business as usual.'

In June 2021, when the capacity to hold meetings remotely ended, we took the decision that the size of the Committee Room meant it was no longer appropriate to invite the public to attend meetings in that space. We have held meetings in the main Village Hall in consequence and we are very grateful to the Hall Secretary for helping us to book and run 'Covid secure' meetings.

Unfortunately, long standing bookings at the Village Hall mean that we will not be able use the Hall for our meetings this year after 9 March. We have therefore arranged to meet in the Angela Cobbold Hall instead, which has both advantages and disadvantages. The Hall space there

is larger than the Committee Room, but smaller than the main Village Hall. making it quicker and easier - and cheaper - to heat for meetings. It is also a good size for people to be able to maintain distance but hear what everyone The main disadvantage of is saying. course is the lack of parking. We do hope therefore that if you are attending a Council meeting you can walk, cycle or arrange to be dropped off. However, if you do have problems and need a space reserved for you then please do let me or our Clerk know

We understand that at the moment the rules on facemasks and maintaining distances in community halls are relaxed, but I am aware that many people are still opting to wear masks generally and there is still concern about the transmission of infection. We are therefore continuing to invite everyone attending meetings to continue to wear masks.

Finally, I am sorry that I am unable to be at the Annual Parish Meeting on 9 March. Our Vice Chairman Helen Saagi will take over that evening and I am sure it will be interesting to hear everyone's reports. Please do come along.

By this time Binky had had enough, just like you.



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
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
