# PARISH PRIEST'S REPORT FOR 2010

Once again I would like to thank all of you who support me by taking on responsibilities within each parish, and without whom parish and church life would be the poorer. Many people help throughout the course of a year, with tasks such as flower arranging, cleaning the building, switching on the floodlights and heating, setting up for services, looking after the churchyard and building. Then there is all that paperwork!

Which seems to increase each year, keeping and auditing the accounts, preparing and writing up minutes for meetings and the production of the benefice news. We put together a new benefice news production team this year, and it became very obvious how great a debt we owe to Geoff Bills for all his hard work and dedication as Editor over the last 10 + years that he was involved...

As always we are very grateful to our benefice choir so well led by Gill Peck. Due to her involvement in Suffolk music she is able to call upon friends to augment our choir at special occasions notably Christmas and Good Friday. We also thank our organists. Andrew Clarke. Margaret Cotton. Maurice Jones, Jane Hartley and Elaine Strouts. We are very fortunate indeed to be able to enjoy such a high standard of music.

We have faithful churchwardens, and Elders, who are the eyes and ears of their communities They help me to keep in touch with the joys and sorrows of community life even though I do not live among you. Alison Baker has been taking a Sabbatical due to the workload of her new employment but that hasn't stopped her helping out when she can, and Jenny Cavell-Shaw has also been on light duties due to family circumstances. Our other Elders have been quietly working among you as normal. I am grateful for ministry of our Elders who with me form the ministry team. We try and meet regularly throughout the year for prayer, discussion and study.

I am pleased to report that we have a Reader in Training – Diana Gardiner who lives in Playford and also sings with the choir. Diana will undergo three years of demanding training before she is licensed, but you will have noticed her taking part in services as part of her training. We still have one person ex-

ploring authorised ministry.

This year Culpho had a change of Treasurer when Sue Bruce resigned her office. Playford's treasurer, Paul Gardiner kindly agreed to look after Culpho as well. Grateful thanks to Paul as it is always a struggle to find people willing to be part of our church councils and who have enough time to offer their skills, particularly secretarial and financial.

We have had 20 Occasional Offices this year and while we have lost some good and loyal friends from our villages the good news is that 2 couples were married in our churches, 5 people have been baptised and 6 confirmed, when we welcomed Bishop Nigel to Playford Church in May.

A lot of my time in the benefice is spent taking Holy Communion to the house-bound. This is something that is available to everyone; please ask if it is something you would like to happen, either on a temporary or permanent basis. Elders are also able to visit in this way.

We try to mark the major festivals with special activities and this year we have included two All Age workshops, one on Good Friday, and the other just before Christmas. We held services on Ascension Day, and Ash Wednesday, and commemorated those of our family and friends who have died at the beginning of November, just before we held our benefice Remembrance Day service. Due to the hard work of our General Synod representative Tim Allen, Thomas Clarkson was added by the General Synod (the church's parliament) to the list of those who worked for the abolition of the slave trade and are commemorated in the weekday lectionary on 30th July. Playford celebrated his inclusion with a service at 12 noon. We also blessed our pets at a special service in Playford during the summer.

Sadly our mums and tots group Tiddlywinks has had to close, a lot of mums with pre school children now work and are not free to attend with their children.

We have been able to put together an Open the Book Team who go into Bealings School on a regular basis, dramatising Bible Stories. The team is ecumenical and includes Baptists and a Roman Catholic as well as members from our own churches.

The Angela Cobbold Hall continues to be well used. Thanks must go to Peter & Vicki Carr who provide us with delicious soups in Advent and Lent and cream teas in the summer, with profits going to charity. A visiting group which also makes regular use of the hall is the Abraham Study group, a multi faith group of people, who meet together and share what they can of their faith with others

Since 2005 I have been Rural Dean for the Woodbridge Deanery which includes 35 churches and runs geographically from Ashbocking to Bawdsey, and Orford to Otley. This is a demanding role and I have told Bishop Nigel that I would like to stop this extra dimension to my ministry. However I am not retiring from parish life, and look forward to being your parish priest for several years to come.

Our church communities are delighted to welcome those who come to services and those who help in various ways to keep the building and grounds open and in good repair. Sadly we are losing members who are not being replaced and this makes the regular tasks more difficult to keep going, both in financial and practical terms. We pray that in 2011 we still have the resources to do all that we want to.



## NATIONAL GRID SEEKS VIEWS ON ITS APPROACH TO UNDERGROUNDING CABLES

National Grid has launched a public consultation into its approach to undergrounding the electricity lines needed to connect new power generation. The company is currently revising its approach to undergrounding and is now asking the public, industry, government, environmental and other organisations for their opinions.

When planning a new transmission connection, National Grid is often asked to consider putting cables underground rather than building overhead lines in order to protect views of local land-scapes. However there are many considerations involved with undergrounding owing to its cost, environmental impacts and technical considerations.

Your opinion will help to guide the company's decision on underground transmission lines.

Hector Pearson, National Grid stakeholder and policy manager, said: "We last reviewed our undergrounding approach in the early 1990s. With a significant amount of new power generation needing to connect to our network in the coming years, including low carbon generators such as nuclear power and wind farms, we believe that now is a good time to review our approach.

When planning to connect a new generator to its network, National Grid looks at different methods, including overhead lines, underground cables and subsea cables. As a transmission operator, we need to comply with statutory duties such as building a network that is efficient, coordinated and economic to construct, operate and maintain.

We need to manage the costs of these projects responsibly as these costs will ultimately be paid for by electricity consumers. However, we also need to

consider the impact on the local landscape and communities of what we build.

We are very keen to hear people's views. Their opinions will play an important part in shaping our approach."

The consultation will run until 16 March 2011. National Grid will consider all feedback received before publishing its revised approach to undergrounding in April. Anyone wishing to contribute can do so by completing the questionnaire on

# CONSUMER CHAMPION NETWORK

Suffolk County Council's Trading Standards Service is delighted to announce the launch of its pioneering 'Consumer Champion Network'. The aim of the network is to educate and empower volunteer champions about consumer rights, so building resilience to rogue traders, scams, and rip-off merchants across Suffolk's communities.

Residents of Suffolk can volunteer at one of several 'consumer champion' levels. These range from simply choosing to receive email updates on the latest news and scams in Suffolk, to giving talks or running events at local community centre/libraries. Volunteer champions will receive basic training on consumer protection law, as well as access to educational documents, posters and leaflets to disseminate within their local community. More active volunteers can also receive consumer protection refresher training twice year, as well as access to a range of literature and training manuals.

The scheme is one of only a handful of similar initiatives operating in the UK, and it is the first to be anchored in social media, with champions able to exchange information and ideas in an online forum.

Graham Crisp, Assistant County Trading Standards Officer at Suffolk County Council welcomes the scheme: "The Consumer Champion Network offers a real opportunity for the people of Suffolk to stamp out roque trading and scams across the county, which are often targeted at the most vulnerable people in our society. Working in conjunction with Trading Standards, volunteer champions will gain a real insight into consumer issues, will be able to help make their communities safer and stronger. and will help our Service identify where our interventions can be employed most effectively to crack down on roque traders "

Notes from the Little Bealings Parish Council Meetings held on 14 December 2010 and 17 January 2011

# TREES FOR VILLAGE HALL AND PLAY-ING FIELD

Jennifer Cook, Tree Warden, had collected the new trees from SCDC and they would be planted in due course.

#### POLICE

There had been six reported crimes in the parish in December, including four of theft from motor vehicles. In January there were two reported crimes: theft of a generator and a mixer from the grounds of a house, and damage to a window at the village hall.

# SIGNS FOR VILLAGE HALL PLAYING FIELD AND SCHOOL

SCC had provided a new signing scheme and would be advised of the Council's suggested amendments to it. SCC Cllr Peter Bellfield was thanked for funding the cost of the signs from his SCC Locality Budget. It was intended that new signs would be in place before the end of March 2011.

# SECURITY LIGHTING FOR VILLAGE HALL CAR PARK

The Council had received Parish Plan

funding of £333 to contribute to the cost of installing a light. Confirmation was awaited regarding the need for planning and building control permissions, together with a design approved by the Village Hall Management Committee.

#### **FOOTPATHS**

A meeting with SCC was awaited to discuss improvements to the footpath at the bottom of the playing field.

Correspondence from Great Bealings PC concerning removal of the footpath (Footpath No 5 Little Bealings) running diagonally from Holly Lane across the field towards Great Bealings, and its replacement with a path running on the field edge on the southern side of Boot Street was considered. It was agreed that Footpath No 5 was popular and well used. Any proposed change should be publicised widely to enable all residents to comment.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

Potholes at the junction of Holly Lane and The Street had been reported for repair.

#### PLAYFORD ROAD

It was agreed to contact SCC with a view to installing traffic calming measures in Playford Road.

Please advise the Clerk if you would support an open meeting held in the village with SCC to consider this.

#### THE STREET

Closure of The Street from the level crossing to Bealings Bridge was planned between 1 and 28 March for UK Power Networks to install new supplies. Closure will be in operation 24 hours during the works. Please contact Ben Green of Mervyn Lambert Plant Ltd for more information: 01953 688211 email: planning@mervynlambert.co.uk

#### **PLANNING**

Mr Beaumont reported on his attendance at an SCDC event concerning its LDF Reviewed Core Strategy and Development Management Policies.

SCDC had revised its Core Strategy in the context of the revocation of the regional strategy (the East of England Plan). Regional requirements were to be replaced with national and local requirements. It was noted that the parish is now included in the Eastern Ipswich Plan Area, where there is a focus for growth. The regional target of 510 new homes a year in the SCDC district had been revised to propose 446. Mr Beaumont reported that the parish's designation in the LDF as a Local Service Centre (LSC) was partly as a result of its local bus service. Mr Bellfield had advised that, while the 70 and 70a bus services would be cut as SCC introduced budget cuts, they would not be terminated. SCDC had advised that it was for the parish to decide if it wished to continue to be an LSC or, with less bus provision, be designated an Other Village. The latter would hamper any development proposals, while continuing as an LSC would enable development within and adjacent to the village physical limits boundary.

#### **LOCALISM AND PLANNING**

It was noted that a proposed Localism Act included a new power to produce a Neighbourhood Plan, which could lead to a Parish Council making Neighbourhood Development Orders, permitting development. Other proposals included the duty of applicants for major developments to consult locally before submitting applications, and for local referendums (if a minimum of 5% of the electorate signed a petition).

#### **NETWORK RAIL MAST**

Network Rail had previously been asked about the mast it had installed near the station. It had replied that the mast was part of a new railway radio communication system to improve safety, punctuality and efficiency. Network Rail had advised that it had no plans to repaint the mast as requested, as it had been advised by SCDC before installation

that the current colour was appropriate. The mast could not be made available to mobile phone companies for safety reasons. Network Rail would be asked again if they had any community budget to contribute to parish initiatives and District Councillor Ivan Jowers would be asked for his views on the consultation which had been carried out – which had not included the Parish Council.

SCDC had approved these applications.

#### **FINANCE**

Cheques were signed for the purchase of a shovel to spread sand/grit near the level crossing and for the Clerks salary and expenses.

#### CORRESPONDENCE

SCC's proposed budget cuts and service information was noted, including proposed cuts in services for verge cutting.

The Clerk would attend an SCDC/WDC Town & Parish Clerks' Meeting on 7 March.
