
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NEWS & GENERAL INTEREST

This magazine has traditionally been EAST ANGLIA ONE contributor-led - in other words the Pre-enabling works editors have simply published what has been sent in. In recent months we have become rather more pro-active, and have tried to seek out people to make contributions on a range of topics and under a range of headings. We can but repeat that this is your magazine, and that it is only as good as the contributions (and pictures) that we receive. Do please play your part -you never know what kinds of snippets, profiles, historical memories, reflections, tips etc might be of interest to others. (Particular thanks to new arrival on the scene - Lily, our local gardener!) We do try to be politically neutral and not to engage in controversy, not even gardening controversy, but if there are controversies then we would present both sides of any argument. Keep us to that!

With increased ambitions, we do find ourselves sometimes at full stretch. The April edition took virtually a full week to design. As we become more pro-active, the hunt for material is on-going. The editors have much to deal with and, indeed, to seek out. It is with this workload in mind that we publicly wonder whether there might be others out there who might like to be part of this operation - maybe as understudies or assistants to the small group of people who currently do the work.

Do please let us know if you would like to help in some capacity. A glance at the huge team responsible for producing the Grundisburgh News every 3 months shows, by comparison, just how skeletal our own organisation actually is.

To enable the construction phase of the East Anglia ONE Project to proceed with minimal disruption to all local residents and road users there are areas along the route requiring road alterations and improvements and this is programmed to take place from the end of April to July 2017.

These "pre-enabling works" involve the installation of passing bays and road signage along the route and will be undertaken by enabling contractor Roadbridge, with traffic management installed by local company Palmer Group. Letters are shortly to be sent to residents living in the areas where these road improvements are taking place and these will detail any traffic management or diversions that will be required.

We appreciate that whilst we undertake these works, they are likely to cause some inconvenience, but please be assured that we will endeavour to keep disruption to a minimum and that the works will be completed as quickly as possible. The traffic management is designed to maintain safety and to manage the flow of traffic as efficiently as possible during the works, in compliance with current regulations and in consultation with the Local Authority.

In addition, over the next few weeks, we will be starting to erect the fencing to demarcate the construction corridor across the route as part of the preconstruction works.

Johanna had arrived in England with a special Alien's permit immediately after the Second World War, to work for Mrs Moor in The Rosery, but she clearly

became much more of a companion than domestic servant. Mrs Moor was at great pains to ensure Johanna's future and her home, Green Close, was provided for her by Mrs Moor. As mentioned above, Green Close was passed on to Jack Sihver, Johanna's nephew, and similarly of Estonian origin. Jack's background is similarly fascinating - his father had served in the Luftwaffe, a tactic of personal self-defence, as Estonians found themselves helping the Germans to repel the savage advance of the Russian armies from the East.

After Johanna's death in 2001 her nephew, Jack, moved into her house and made the wooden building into a more permanent dwelling. Jack had previously taken his aunt back to see the farm in her home country, Estonia, but she did not enjoy the experience as the memories were too painful.

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

HISTORY CORNER 1. GREAT BEALINGS CHURCH AND ITS RED BRICK WALL

This is obviously not a normal church wall. In fact, it must have been part of the walled garden that was once attached to the original Great Bealings Hall. The church was a manorial church, set close by the Hall and under its patronal jurisdicled to the Hall, but it may come as a surinto disrepair well over two hundred years ago and was finally demolished in the 1780s. Useable masonry was a valuable commodity, and was recycled. Transportation was difficult so the recycled masonry tended to be used for local projects, in this case Great Bealings House.



The wall, however, remains, and is still in good condition. We have now planted espalier apple trees up against the church side of the wall, so it is probably being used once again for its original purpose. In fact, the SW facing wall probably gets more sunshine than the east-facing for- there seems to be such interest, I thought mer manor house side.

In 1763, the following description of the Hall appeared in The Ipswich Journal:

To be left as it is furnished and en-

tered upon at Michaelmas next for three years: Bealings Hall in Great Bealings, consisting of a hall, 3 parlours, a dining room, kitchen, baking office, wash house, brewhouse, cellar and other conveniences, seven chambers (with light closets to all of them but one) garrets and other lodging rooms for servants; a garden of tion. Two fish ponds in garden, well stocked, a dove house with a good flight of pigeons, coach house, two stables, stalled, with about 25 acres of meadow and pasture land adjoining the house; together with the right of sporting upon the Manor of Great Bealings.

> The dovecote was still present in a 19th century painting of the church but has now sadly disappeared. History suggests that choir practices once took place in this dovecote - and that it was very cold inside! The association between the site of the old Hall, now part of the Cranworth Estate, survives, in that Lord Cranworth is the patron of the church.

I visited The North Heigham saw mills in Norwich where I always bought my timber and then travelled to Ron Corbett's workshop to discuss the precision joinery. I placed the final timber order and ordered the post from another source. At this time I was deeply immersed in the research for the sign as described last year and I produced the design drawings and full scale clay models before starting carving. The Village Sign Committee was kept in close touch throughout. The wood was delivered to me for carving in Nov.1988 and was finished by Easter 1989.

Hans Fleck must also be mentioned for his superb architectural drawing of the base and site which I still have. Rosalind Fleck and her other fundraisers have already been mentioned in last month's Fynn-Lark News. This was one of my final year projects and I saw it through from beginning to end with obvious expert advice from Ron and George, plus financial assistance for materials from the fundraisers. > While my Grandfather and one brother survived the war, the two youngest brothers (Wilfred and Arthur Mutimer) did not survive and are among the names listed on the Great Bealings war memorial. The two surviving brothers -Francis and Reginald, returned the village after the war and are both buried in Great Bealings churchyard.

> My research has uncovered some information about the deaths of Wilfred and Arthur Mutimer in northern France and also the actions of Reginald Mutimer

(who I remember, as Uncle Reg in my youth), who was awarded the Military Medal for bravery during the conflict. I also have photographs of all of the Mutimer brothers from the time of WW1.

April 28th 2017 marks the centenary of the death of Wilfred, the first of the brothers lost in the war. I am planning to mark this centenary by visiting the site of the battlefield in northern France where he died and also the cemetery where he was laid to rest.

NATURE NOTES



Cowslips seem to be a very volatile species. Climatic conditions maybe determine whether or not they thrive and bloom in profusion, or whether they make a half-hearted attempt to make an appearance but quickly fade away. The cowslips in Great Bealings churchyard, in recent years, have rarely gone beyond the green leafy stage, but for some reason this year they have formed a yellowspangled carpet, dominating other early flowering species. If we have managed to get something right in the management of the churchyard, we don't quite know what has been the secret. Botanical input welcomed.

MORE MUSINGS FROM LILY'S GARDEN

I love plant sales, coming away with my newly acquired treasures then experiencing the delight of trying to decide where to put them. But (there's always a 'but'), rather like those wonderful clothes one buys because they are too good to miss because they are a bargain that sit unworn in the wardrobe until they are taken to the charity shop, many of the plants one buys on impulse don't always seem 'right' in the garden with the result that we spend ages moving them around the garden until, hopefully, we find the ideal location. It doesn't always work and we become frustrated, decide that we are not 'good' gardeners and then, if we haven't killed the poor things, give them to plant sales, the gardener's answer to charity shops. So why do we get it wrong? We may know the type of location the plant needs - sunny, shady, dry, moist etc. so why is that not enough? According to Gertrude Jekyll, writing in 1900, we begin the wrong way. Instead of buying plants and then deciding where to put them, we should look at our spaces and then decide what plants we should get for them. We should use only those plants which our 'critical garden conscience approves of having'. A bit like packing for our holidays, less is often more.

If, like me, the problem is that your 'critical garden conscience' needs developing, garden visiting is a wonderful way to educate yourself (or simply have a lovely time wandering around). I recommend Beth Chatto's garden at Elmstead Market, Colchester CO7 7BD and The Old Vicarage at East Ruston, Norfolk NR12 9HN for inspirational ideas for planting schemes in dry areas such as ours. But be warned, both have wonderful plants to buy and if you are anything like me, the critical garden conscience goes to sleep while the avid collector parts with her money for new treasures.

Tip for the week. Gardeners can spend a disproportionate amount of time worrying about their attempts to create perfection and in so doing overlook the joy of being in the garden. On a sunny day when I just being in the garden is enough to lift my soul, I often think fondly of part of a poem by Dorothy Frances Gurney: "God's Garden" which my beloved grandmother had on her wall:

The kiss of the sun for pardon, The song of the birds for mirth, One is nearer God's Heart in a garden Than anywhere else on Earth.

A team of professional business trainers are based here and a timber importer with links in Latvia. A fumigation company works in the agricultural and shipping industries. The Centre houses an international data company, a business consultancy, a deep sea shipping agent and a recruitment company completes the mix here.


