NATURE NOTES GOLDFINCHES

This colourful little bird, a member of the finch family, is probably one of our brightest garden visitors. The bright red facial patch is slightly larger on the male. What so often makes them particularly endearing, in our gardens, at least, is their habit of arriving at the feeder in pairs, either side of the feeder, and looking out for one another – they are quite nervous about predators, and there are frequent jerky movements as they watch out for danger.



The nest is built entirely by the female and is generally completed within a week. The male accompanies the female but does not contribute. The nest is neat and compact and is constructed of mosses and lichens and lined with plant down such as that from thistles. I remember one particular Spring watch when the presenter referred to the particularly dirty state of the nest, and the inability of the

birds to keep it clean of spatterings and droppings – so much at odds with the neatness of the nest itself. The chicks are fed by both parents, initially on a diet of seeds – thistles, niger and teasels, for example and, increasingly, insects. Niger seed is a favourite, but only available commercially for bird feeders. The parents typically raise two broods each year and occasionally three.

Goldfinches often join up into large flocks in winter, and they can be seen swooping down on fields where their favourite seeds may still be available. Sadly, European goldfinches are still commonly kept and bred in captivity around the world because of their distinctive appearance and pleasant song The RSPB has campaigned against this practice.

HISTORY CORNER PLAYFORD HALL BARN



Even those with a bent for history find it hard to imagine the large red bricked structure just a few feet to the south of Playford Hall as a working farm building but that is what it was for the greater part of its life. Contemporary with The Hall, it has a similar tenoned-purlin roof that dates it to c. 1590 and, as with the main

European (1565-1614) whose family had come from Shotley at the beginning of the century. 5th and last baronet, in 1719. Dving childless, the Playford estate then passed to Elizabeth his niece who some 25 years earlier had married into the Bristol family of Ickworth. Sir Compton's widow however retained a life interest in the house and on her death in 1734 it was let out firstly to a schoolmaster and then, in around the middle of the century, the east wing was pulled down and The Hall 'reduced to the condition of a farmhouse'. Until that moment the family and their predecessors had themselves cultivated the 350-acre demesne, a stretch of land that ran from around New Buildings up to the Warren, the remainder of the parish being let out to farm tenants.

> William Parmenter, whose family farmed in Rushmere, was the first to rent the former home farm and to live in the scaled-down Hall. On his death in 1791. the tenancy passed to his great nephew John Cutting who was declared bankrupt in 1815. It was then that Thomas Clarkson moved in and when he died in 1846 his widow Catherine ran the farm for a further ten years. On her death, their grandson Thomas Clarkson III took over but, leading an unconventional and squandered life. he his dissolute inheritance and in 1867 was forced to sell the contents of the house before running away to Jersey.

> It was at this point that the Bristol Estate took the decision to take on tenants other than 'cultivators of the soil' and, in consequence, both house and grounds were re-gentrified. The work was carried out by Richard Phipson who, on completion of this undertaking, became Diocesan Architect whose first assignment was the re-building of Playford church chancel. The first of the new non-farming tenants was to be the Revd. Allen Page Moor, son of a Woodbridge solicitor and a cousin of Canon Moor of Great Bealings but he

SUMMARISED NOTES OF THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD ON 19th April

The following four reports were received, full copies of which are attached to the minutes on the PC's website:

 Chairman's Report Charles to his Barrington expressed thanks Councillor colleagues and to the Clerk for their support during the year, also to Fiona Powell for hosting the virtual meetings. He expressed regret at the loss of three Councillors during the year and welcomed the appointment of the three new Councillors. During the financial year 2020/21, 12 new planning applications were received of which 11 were supported, 2 objections were submitted, and one was neutral. Some were contentious, one resulted in a complaint to ESC which was dismissed on the basis of there being no case to answer. He also covered more aspects of the planning process and the positive effect of the Neighbourhood Plan, and the PC's success in convincing SCC of the need to extend the 30mph from Boot St bridge to the junction with Rosery Lane. Grateful thanks were expressed to our two District Councillors for their funding support from their grant allocations. Assistance was given to the PCC with a volunteer provide assistance scheme to to residents during the pandemic, and a Talking Bench has been installed in Lower Street, thanks to efforts by Sally Johnson.

• Village Hall – Peter Prentice presented a report for the Bealings Village Hall Trust. A major project to provide an extension and enhancements to the Hall, car park, courts and playing field had to be shelved due to prohibitive

estimated costs. However, during the year the car park surface was improved, and a replacement of the flat roof was installed. As a result of a grant from the District two Councillors. Wi-Fi was and installed. а large smart TV purchased. Appreciation was expressed from the Trustees for the donations from the two Parish Councils, and to Margaret Wilson and Keith Beaumont for their hard work.

• Fynn-Lark News - Norman Porter reported on the important role of the magazine during the year of the pandemic. Following financial problems, the previous year, the situation is now resolved but needs to be sustained. Grateful thanks were expressed to individuals, the Parish Councils. churches. other organisations and advertisers for their financial support. Following an exploration of views, it was clear that FLN is widely valued by the residents of the four parishes and that hard copies are still enjoyed. Each PC now has а representative on the committee and some additional help has been secured. The magazine will continue on the same path in 2021.

• Bealings Community Hub – Helen Clarkson-Fieldsend reported on the 2020 activities and a look forward to 2021. She said that the Hub serves not only Little and Great Bealings residents, but also other surrounding areas. She thanked all residents on the Founding Committee for their vision and their work. New heating and emergency fire system has been installed in Little Bealings Church, and broadband, Wi-Fi and a large screen and projector is being installed, to be followed later in the year by a permanent kitchen. It is anticipated that the Tearoom and Shop will re-open in early July, and that Parish Council meeting and may speak all previous activities can gradually be for a maximum of 3 minutes on any item recommenced. The Hub will be pilot venue for FSC's Suffolk Cinema Club.

OTHER MATTERS DISCUSSED

A suggestion was made that а Befriending Scheme would be beneficial to the village, this idea was well supported. Norman Porter reported on the progress of the History of Bealings project that he has been working on. It is hoped this will be published in book form before Christmas.

SUMMARISED NOTES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 19th APRIL

The main purpose of this meeting was to discuss planning application DC/21/1273/ FUL & 1274/LBC - Rosery Farmhouse, Lodge Road – Amendments and variations to approved works to listed farmhouse and outbuildings - The Chairman invited the applicant to provide some background regarding the reasons for the variations, and to explain what they are. Several auestions were raised during the discussion. The PC resolved to support the applications.

Regan Scott mentioned an imminent meeting between ESC and SCC re Sizewell C that he will be attending. He will report to the next PC meeting. He also drew attention to a Green Villages project and suggested this could be factored into the next review of the Neighbourhood Plan

LOOKING BACK

PCC MEETING

Margaret Wilson and I had the opportunity to show them our concerns with parking in The Street and the speed and volume of traffic passing through, which leads to dangerous situations when parents are walking between the Village Hall car park and Bealings School. Over 30 cars are parked at the Village Hall each day to deliver and collect pupils attending the school, many from villages outside the Bealings and Playford area.

A few years ago the Parish Council achieved the introduction of a 20mph zone along The Street, to help protect all pedestrians. SCC's installation of two poles to hold Speed Indicator Devices in The Street is awaited, and these devices will enable us to collect data on the volume and speed of traffic passing along this road, as well as reminding drivers of their speed.

Mr. Passmore will be discussing the possibility of a police presence with the police operational team, to remind drivers of the hazards when parking irresponsibly and why a 20-mph limit is in place. He fully accepted that the police would not normally enforce this speed limit but agreed that our village had a particular need.

This is obviously not a long-term solution

and parking at the Village Hall has also always had to consider the needs of those hiring the Hall, so the Parish Council will be considering whether any new land can be made available to provide a suitable parking area. Mr. Passmore suggested that the Community Infrastructure Levy from East Suffolk Council along with a contribution from Suffolk County Council Education Department might be a way to provide funding if land can be found.

We were very pleased that Elaine Bryce could attend as she is standing for election to become the Carlford Division councillor. If successful, she will be our representative within SCC and this visit enabled her to have an even greater insight into Little Bealings. Candidates from the Green Party and the Labour Party are also standing and full details are on the Parish Council noticeboards.
