THE HOUSING CRISES

the population of this country increases so we need more housing. The figures for 2019 (170,000) for 2020 (125,000) and 2021 (184,000) fall far short of the estimated 315,000 per year required up until 2030. Should we build more Council houses? Never tiring from the monotony of finding food and staying alive, feeding the young so that they can grow up and take their turn to look left, look right and dash for safety.

Two pigeons are dancing about on the conservatory roof making a heck of a row. The cat is stretched out on some concrete warm outside sleeping peacefully. Maybe. Satnav? Probably. A loud crash and ping. Ah! Another wing mirror bites the dust. I go out to the road to retrieve the pieces which are definitely irreparable. I then wonder whether the driver has the cost of damage taken from his wages and if so, the effect that will have on his families' budget. I walk back up my drive and breathe deeply the fresh morning air.

Now, what can I write about that will interest anyone? I haven't a clue. I sit down in front of the computer. A very hesitant finger presses the letter M...

NATURE NOTES - SWIFTS

Some time, usually around the middle of April onwards, our skies become alive with our summer migrants, the swallows, swifts and martins. The swifts, in

particular, can not only be spotted but also heard as they wheel across the skies in squadrons that become ever larger as breeding season progresses. screaming and squealing in apparent delight at their formation acrobatics. dispersing. and then comina together again on low level sorties above our rooftops. With the predictable departure of the swallows in early August. our skies become guieter, and one is left the uncomfortable feeling summer is on the way out. Our swallows are the symbols of high summer.



But as we now know all too well, this species is under threat. Fewer and fewer of them make it back to these shores. Hazards lurk on the journey, and nesting sites become ever scarcer. The latest issue of the RSPB's magazine highlights the danger. Swifts are on the red list – seriously endangered. But what can we do? For a start really appreciate them while they are here, and more

> Norfolk and Suffolk were the major areas subject to invasions from the Angles and the Saxons across the North Sea. and evidence survives in place names, and unearthed treasures, most dramatically at Sutton Hoo. The quality of artefacts and jewellery found in this county, and, indeed, locally - see the depiction on the village sign of the Saxon sword discovered in a Little Bealings field by Great Bealings resident, Major Moor tend to give the lie to the idea that these were primitive people.

HISTORY CORNER THE ANGLO-SAXONS AND US.

BBC2 is just into an eight-part series called Art that Made Us. It presents a history of the British Isles, told through art. The first programme, shown recently, was particularly relevant to these parts. with our Anglo-Saxon heritage. The centrepiece was an item called "Spong man." The figure was described as an ornate earthenware figure, probably once on top of a cremation urn.

This urn lid was found during excavations at Spong Hill, North Elmham, Norfolk, within the largest known Anglo-Saxon cremation cemetery. It had become separated from its urn. but when complete, the decorated urn and its lid would probably have stood about 35 cm tall. One is easily led to speculate on the attitude and expression of the figure, and its relevance to contemporary beliefs. wonder and puzzlement displayed. Even though these Anglo-Saxon years from the fourth through to century, mid-eleventh retrospectively called "the dark ages", that term may well stem from Christian writers who controlled the writing of history and could retrospectively determine how the age that preceded them might be defined. Raedwald was probably the first Christian



Spong man is unique among surviving potterv. examples of Anglo-Saxon Although called "Spong Man', the figure has no features to define its sex. It is one of few three-dimensional very representations of humanoid figures from the entire Anglo-Saxon period. Our county and many villages owe their names and much else to the Anglo-Saxons. It is easy to forget the legacy of those 600 years after the Romans and before the Vikings.



Notes of matters considered at the Council meeting held on 11 April:

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

A resident spoke against planning application DC/22/0566/OUT.

ESC COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP ROAD SAFETY FORUM

Mr Garnham had attended the March meeting and would attend again in May.

SPEED INDICATOR DEVICE (SID)

The shared SAVID SID would be displayed at the Village Hall and in The Street during April. Funds had been received from SAVID for a new SID, which was on order and would be shared with Playford.

FOOTPATH 18

A meeting had been held with SCC and the landowner and it was established that the footpath ran to the north of the vehicular track. The landowner had agreed to the route being cleared by the Footpath Wardens, and SCC would provide new signing. SCC was also arranging for the bridge to be inspected.

REPLACEMENT OF DOG FOULING SIGNS ON FOOTPATH 3

The sign at the southern end had been vandalised and it was agreed to purchase further signs and replace, as necessary.

NOTICEBOARD IN PLAYFORD ROAD

The Council was pleased to accept an offer from the local Plymouth Brethren of funding for a new noticeboard and its installation, and to add £57 to the cost to enable a green rather than silver aluminium finish

MINK RAFTS ON THE RIVER FYNN

Suffolk Wildlife Trust had reported sighting of mink on the river near The Street and had asked the Council if mink rafts could be installed for capture. This would be considered by the Trust and the landowner.

ESC COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP AND CORE MEMBERSHIP

It was agreed that the Council wished to be a Core Member and that Mr Ransome would represent the Council at meetings.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

SCC/0071/19/SC: Erection of a noise attenuation fence with associated recontouring along northern boundary bund

SCC/0097/21C: Sinks Pit, Main Road, Kesgrave, Ipswich, IP5 2PE.

Part retrospective erection of a wooden close boarded fence along part of southern site boundary.

These applications had been approved by SCC, but concerns about implementation would be raised with SCC.

ESC had advised that it was awaiting information on the lease of alternative premises for the business activities.

DC/22/0896/FUL: Construction of a summer house in front garden and additional driveway access to create an in/out driveway: Camelot 9 Beacon Lane



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

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
