

REMEMBRANCE

November is upon us and at 10.00 a.m. on Remembrance Sunday, 13 November there will be a short wreath laying service at Little Bealings War Memorial in All Saints churchyard. Playford will hold a similar service at 11.15 a.m. and Great Bealings has a Remembrance ceremony at 10.55 a.m. Please do come and join in.

Poppy wreaths will be laid at each of our War Memorials, as they will be at Memorials across the country, and the names inscribed upon them, those who lived in each village and died in the First and Second World Wars, will be read out. Culpho has no War Memorial. It is a 'thankful' village, losing no one during the First World War.

All Saints, Little Bealings is looking further loss, in future. War Memorials especially fine this vear. Originally unveiled recently in 1920. it has undergone cleaning. repair and conservation, a project which started in 2020. The lettering on the monument had become faded and indistinct, to the point where the names inscribed on the stone were in danger of being lost. Parts of the Memorial were covered in lichen and patches of moss, perhaps due to its site in the shadow of a yew tree.



Little Bealings Parish Council, with the help of a grant of £680 from the War Memorials Trust Grants Scheme, which is supported in East Anglia by voluntary funder Denburv donations from Charitable Trust, formerly Hopkins Homes Foundation, has organised and part funded the work, with the co-operation and support of All Saints Church. The process has taken two years from initial enquiry to completion of the work, partly due to Covid restrictions.

Frances Moreton Director War Memorials Trust said, "War memorials are touchstones to our past. Preserving them maintains the link between those who have made the ultimate sacrifice and later generations who benefit from the freedoms for which they fought. War memorials also remind us of the full cost of war so we can hopefully learn the

clearly see the names that are read out each year. With current conflict in Ukraine and elsewhere in the world, it is perhaps more important than ever that we do not forget the link between events on the alobal stage and the very real impact on individual families and communities.

The Little Bealings Memorial carries the names of nine villagers lost in the First World War. We sometimes forget that our village communities were much more tightly knit and interconnected a hundred years ago - everyone knew each other, many worked and socialised together within the village and so the loss of these young men would have been keenly felt and mourned by all.

Many young men enlisted together. joining the same Regiment. This was the case with two Bealings boys who enlisted on the same day – Thomas Clarke from Little Bealings and Wilfred Mutimer from Great Bealings, who both joined the Suffolk Regiment. They were of a similar age - they had known each other since

childhood, went to school together and conflict, was given the honour of unveiling were good friends. Their families knew the War Memorial in 1919. Tom died in action the verv next day. Two young men who had grown up and joined up together, had lost their lives within a day of each other. One can only imagine the effect on their families and the wider community within the villages when news of this came through.

Many families were left to mourn their losses during the conflict and for these two families in particular, the war was to deal a particularly cruel blow. Early on during the war, in June 1915, the Clarke family had already received news that another son. George, had died in the conflict. For the Mutimer family also, further tragic news came in May 1918 when Wilfred's younger brother, Arthur, died in a military hospital in northern France, just two days after his 19th birthday.

The Clarke family would be dealt a further grievous blow in the Second World War when Ted, a younger brother of George and Tom died from hepatitis at his Kesgrave home in 1944 after serving in the Merchant Navy.

The loss of each and every man named on our War Memorials left lasting impacts on these closely knit village communities and families. Those who returned carried on with their lives as best they could, rarely speaking of what they had seen and endured. The villagers who remained did their best to ensure that the memory of their lost friends and family members would be honoured and so they erected the Memorials to the fallen, around which we still gather every Remembrance Sunday over a century later.

In Great Bealings, Laura Mutimer, sister of the two Mutimer brothers lost in the



- SEWAGE. THEN AND NOW

Sorry to pollute the idyllic country air with this subject, but sewage is a perennial problem, particularly the disposal of human waste. This is a theme which runs through History and still concerns us today, even though it is not readily talked about.



We can still recoil with repugnance at thought of medieval folk in castles depositing unpleasantries from upper apertures. The toilets of a castle were usually built into the walls so that they projected out and any waste fell below and into the castle moat, sometimes, even better, waste went directly into a We have made great progress, but, in



In quite recent times, locally, horse-drawn carts, known as honey carts, used to bring the night soil out from our towns and spread it over surrounding fields, helping to produce tasty vegetables. Woodbridge waste found its way on to the vegetable fields of Bealings.

Animal waste does the job well, so why not extend the practice to human waste, as the thinking went. The stuff has even been imported from London, in special ships - see illustration.





We still have to deal with pollution and launch last year you might like to know sewage leakage in our waterways, that all the initial 500 copies have gone, unfit making them sometimes swimming, certainly for drinking. Our rivers need constant monitoring, to ensure that impurities are not being released into them, so we applaud citizen science attempts, including those of our own Parish Councils, to demonstrate that our November is the season for the second rivers are still unclean, still potentially flowering of poppies. Artificial ones. Real hostile to wildlife, still incompatible with poppies come out in profusion in early human immersion in them. They are prolific, and seed water from the rill, and still live on well generously. The seeds of the poppy can into their 80s have long gone, as residues lie buried in the soil and suddenly burst of fertilisers, pesticides, herbicides etc into flower when that soil is disturbed, as filter through into such streams.

Sewage is, and always has been a messy business. Those who deal with it deserve our help and encouragement - perhaps to do better.

NATURE NOTES - POPPIES

happened in Flanders fields during what became known as World War 1. The numerical classification became necessary once we realized that the horrors of World War 1 had not prevented a sequel in the shape of World War 2. It was the multiple explosions of the battlefields from hell which, ironically, gave the poppy seeds fresh life, profuse flowering, alongside the spilling of blood, and which led, eventually, to their adoption as symbols of remembrance.

The beauty of poppies has captivated artists. Poppies were to Monet what sunflowers were to Van Gogh, and he painted them extensively. They enjoyed an innocent beauty in those pre-war times. Summarised notes of the parish council meeting held on 1st sSeptember 2022

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Sally Johnson (SJ) declared a nonpecuniary interest in Planning Application DC/22/2871 regarding Stone Cottage. She will not take part in the vote.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

A resident spoke about speeding traffic in Grundisburgh Road, and requested that, now the road has been designated a Quiet Lane, a request be made to SCC to impose a 20mph limit.

SJ was given permission by the Chairman to address the PC at the start of item 9(ii)

REPORTS BY

County Councillor Elaine Bryce (EB) EB was unable to attend the meeting but had submitted a report, a full copy of which is attached to the minutes on the website.

District Councillor Colin Hedgley (CH) - A report had been circulated to Cllrs and a full copy is attached to the minutes on the website. CH verbally reported on the damage being caused to the wall outside Annesley House in Boot Street. He is liaising with EB regarding having special white lines painted on the road in this location. A site inspection by SCC is awaited.

QUIET LANES

Grundisburgh Road – Sue Prentice (SP) reported on a meeting with residents regarding location of the posts. SCC require written household permission for

metal posts to be concreted in on their land. It has been suggested that wooden posts be erected. A Sub-Committee comprising Regan Scott (RS) and Trevor Harris will take this forward with residents. Following the request for the speed limit to be reduced to 20mph, SP suggested that we should wait until the Quiet Lane posts and notices have been put up then the traffic must be monitored. Evidence must be provided to SCC.

Lower Street – discussions with local residents are ongoing

Footpaths – RS reported on the complaint about barbed wire on the footpath by Cherry Tree Farm. This issue will be raised with the SCC Footpath Officer

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

DC/22/2330/FUL – Cherry Tree Cottage, Seckford Hall Road – erection of extension to dwelling and erection of detached garage with annexe/holiday let above.

The PC repeated their support of the extension to the house, but still have serious concerns about the size of the garage and the access to it. It was resolved to support the application for the extension to the house but to object to the erection of the detached garage

DC/22/2871/FUL – Stone Cottage, Lower Street – Retrospective application – siting of one domestic treatment plant

SJ, who resides at the neighbouring property, advised the meeting that she is experiencing two types of noise resulting from the installation of the new tank. She provided the meeting with a copy of a report from an ESC Environmental Health Officer recording a visit made to the property which confirms the noise and states that further mitigation measures published approx. a week in advance of a should be undertaken. It was resolved to meeting. object to this application on the grounds that adequate noise mitigation measures are not in place - SJ did not take part in the vote.

DECISION UPDATES

DC/22/1517/CLE - Regency House - Clirs expressed their dismay that ESC has permitted this application.

Enforcement Matters - ENF/22/0069/USE -Water Meadow, Lower Street

ESC has confirmed that the change of use of this site is unauthorised, and an enforcement letter has been sent to the landowner

REVIEW OF NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

SP reported that the pre-consultation draft is being prepared for forwarding to ESC by mid-September

ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

Trees – many of the trees planted in the Spring have been lost due to the extreme weather. John Carter-Jonas will arrange a meeting with landowners to discuss planting of new trees on their land.

FINANCE AND ADMIN

ST MARY'S

CHURCHWARDEN'S NOTES

This is written against a backdrop of major national uncertainty. Monetary uncertainties are swirling around. The war in Ukraine is lurching backwards and forwards. No-one quite knows how hard we are going to be hit by energy bills. The NHS is under pressure. How severe will the winter be? How do they cope with the backlog of 7 million operations.

Where are the certainties? The consolations? Surrounded by all this bleakness, amplified, as it is, across the media, it is sometimes salutary to seek the antidotes closer to home. Time we can still spend with our friends and family. Walks we can still take in this lovely Suffolk countryside. Making the best of such health as we have, to enjoy it all, Community activities, bringing us together including meeting up in your local church, a place to count your blessings. There may be plenty on the horizon, distant, middle or imminent, to keep us watchful, worried even. But there is still much in life that we can enjoy as we move towards that joyous festival, which is Christmas, a bright celebration, set incongruously in the dark depths of winter.

LOOKING BACK

PCC MEETING. 27TH SEPTEMBER

A meeting was held in the church on this date, and the main points emerging were:

1/ The Rector produced draft plans for services until the end of the year, including the Christmas period. (See below)

2/ It was agreed that a small group of PCC members, from both parishes, should have a closer look at ways in which joint working could be streamlined.

3/ Measures for ensuring compliance an with Safequarding regulations needed to evening floodlighting. be taken.

4/ Plans for planting trees as part of the creation of the "Queens Canopy" were discussed. It was hoped that there would be planting ceremonies after the Harvest Festival

5/ It was agreed that we should firm up plans for creating and formalising Support Groups.

6/ Expenditure now regularly exceeds income, and the position is unsustainable. Further efforts should be made to engage more people in offering financial support to the church.

HARVEST FESTIVAL AND TREE PLANTING - 2ND OCTOBER

This took place the day after an energetic team of helpers had prepared the churchvard for winter. Sites had already been prepared for the planting of trees, two provided by the Bishop, both of them personally grown, and one by Michael Crimp, in memory of his late wife Sarah, sister of Julian Haywood Smith.

Our Harvest Festival, supported by a small but enthusiastic band of villagers, included the offering of gifts for the local Salvation Army foodbank. We must acknowledge, ruefully, that this was not a Harvest Festival as in those times when the village and its residents were deeply rooted in agriculture and when the harvest had real meaning to those involved in it. The favourite hymns were sung, but a full church would have been a more fulsome expression of thanksgiving for all the bounties of harvest which we enjoy, perhaps now taking them more for granted than our ancestors once did.

IS A CHARITY HELPING YOU OR A RELATIVE OR FRIEND IN LITTLE BEALINGS?

The Parish Council receives regular requests from charities for donations to help with their work. These can range from national charities, such as Age UK, to very local ones like the Disability Advice Service (East Suffolk).

The Parish Council's policy for many years has been to give a donation only where we know that a charity is actively supporting residents of Little Bealings. In the last few years we have given grants, typically of £25, to local Citizen Advice Bureau branches, Headway and Homestart, when they have confirmed that they are helping residents.

It is of course very difficult for us to know which charities are supporting residents and we are ever mindful of our data protection responsibilities. Sometimes we can establish that a charity is active in Little Bealings by asking them directly – but this only works if they contact us initially of course.

I am therefore asking that you let us know if a charity is supporting a resident. We certainly do not want to know the details or any personal information – just which charity it is and a very brief outline of the support they give or have given.

We set our annual budget in November and in the last few years we have included up to £100 to enable donations to be made to charities active in Little Bealings. However, we are very mindful of increasing costs for everyone and want

to be sure that any donations we do give are appropriate and beneficial use of Parish Council funds for Little Bealings residents.

Do get in touch if you can provide any information, or indeed if you think the Council should review its policy regarding charitable donations. We welcome your views.

LOCAL RESIDENTS' LIVES CONTINUE TO BE BLIGHTED

After thousands of complaints over the years rofm local residents with regards to Noise, Dust and Light pollution from the TRU 7 Group of Companies located at Sinks Pit, Kesgrave; East Suffolk Council (ESC) finally took action and issued a 'Noise Abatement Order' against TRU in Aug 2021.

As a result, Dr Dan Poulton MP called for a cross Agency (CLG) approach to deal with the issues with this being chaired by Elaine Bruce, County Councillor for Carlford Division. The Environment Agency (EA) subsequently directed TRU to produce a 'Noise Pollution Plan,' leading to the production by TRU of a 'Voluntary (Noise) Improvement Plan (VIP).

Following the third meeting of the CLG on 6th October the voluntary changes in the VIP have now been completed and should the EA decide that the changes made to the site regarding machinery and working practices are sufficient, it is likely that the CLG will be wound down at the next meeting in January 2023. This decision will have a direct impact on the two pending applications TRU have, which are to:

- Increase working hours 06:00 to 19.30 hours Mon Sat (32% longer)
- Increase from 350K to 500K tonnes (143% increase in the quantity of concrete/rubble crushing and processing

However, despite these voluntary changes, local resident's lives continue to be blighted in their homes and gardens. It has been the persistent complaints by LB residents which has made an impact and influenced the Agencies and Politicians. We now need your URGENT help to maintain this pressure by making your complaints/concerns known EVERY TIME you are disturbed by:

- Noise / Vibration disturbance
- Light & Dust Pollution
- Traffic Issues
- Out of Hours Working


