s I write this half way through October, there is a growing sense of change in our weather. We are still enjoying days that remind of the summer that we didn't really have, but increasingly also those that remind us of the approaching winter, and ever darkening evenings. As the month of November comes it brings with it its own particular flavour. It is a month of mists and damp days, of bonfires and fireworks and November is also a time for remembering.

All Saints day is on the **1**st **November** and is a day when we remember not just those people like St Francis or St Luke, but all the holy men and women both sides of the grave, who have lived Christian lives. The Church calls them the Communion of Saints. As All Saint Day falls on a Thursday this year we shall do our remembering at our church service in Little Bealings at 10.00 am on Sunday 4th November. Little Bealings church is dedicated to All Saints so it is very appropriate.

On **2nd November** our remembering is for All Souls, all those who are dear to us who have died and whom we wish to remember before God. There will be a service in Little Bealings Church at 7.30 pm to which you are invited. During the time of readings, prayers and music there will be an opportunity to light a candle in memory of your loved one.

All Souls quickly gives way to the 5th November, an excuse for bonfires and fireworks in memory of the activities of Guy Fawkes, and then hard on the heels of bonfire night comes Remem-

brance Day/Sunday when the nation turns out to remember those who gave their lives in defence of their country.

Remembrance Day is also Remembrance Sunday this year. It is a time that has a special poignancy for communities. During the two great wars of the twentieth century, nearly every community contained people who had lost family or friends. The whole community felt every family's tragedy. It is important for those who are still alive to remember the terrible times of a country at war, and to meet to remember, and to prav for those who lost their lives, and for world peace. It is important not just for them but also for those of us who have been born since 1945. We need to understand and remember just how awful it was, in the hope that through our remembering history will not repeat itself.

Community remembrance is important and our joint service on **11th November** starts at 10.00 am in Great Bealings Church this year.

Culpho is one of only a few "thankful churches", a village where no one was lost in either war and the church has a plaque giving thanks instead of a memorial. Culpho residents are very welcome at the service. As a Community we need to pray continually for world peace, for our armed forces who are committed to peace keeping duties, for those who are still on the front line, and in danger, and for their colleagues who have lost their lives.

BEALINGS, PLAYFORD AND CULPHO HEART START 17TH NOVEMBER 2PM

Would you like to learn basic life support and resuscitation skills? Have you ever wondered what you'd do if you were in a situation where someone needed this essential help? Perhaps you've had training in the past but would like to refresh your skills? The application of early resuscitation can save lives, buying valuable time 'till an ambulance arrives.

We have organised a one-off training session in Basic Life Support. You will be shown how to do cardio-pulmonary resuscitation along with essential information to help you identify and cope with these unexpected situations. There will be plenty of time to practice your new skills on mannequins. The session will be held at 2pm on Saturday 17th November 2012 in the Angela Cobbold Hall, and is open to all residents of Great Bealings, Little Bealings and Playford and Culpho. The session will last around 2 hours and the training and equipment will be kindly provided by The East Anglian Ambulance Trust.

There is no charge for the training, although we are asking for a small voluntary donation to cover overheads. Each participant will receive a key ring resuscitation face mask. For practical reasons numbers are limited, and we need to know in advance who is coming. If the course is over-subscribed we will endeavour to arrange a further one next year.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED TO HELP VULNERABLE PEOPLE STAY WARM

Can you volunteer a couple of hours a month in your community to help people in your community, especially older people and those on low incomes stay warm this winter and at the same time gain some benefit for yourself?

Over 1 in 5 households in Suffolk are estimated to be in fuel poverty with an average of over 400 "excess winter deaths" a year according to NHS Suffolk. Half the households in Suffolk are not on mains gas and these are some of the reasons why the charity Suffolk ACRE set up a community oil buying group for Suffolk earlier this year. Over 500 people have already joined the scheme saving on average 5p a litre or £50 on a 1000 litre order.

Suffolk ACRE's community oil buying group want to help people that use heating oil to pay a reasonable price, especially those more vulnerable residents on low incomes, older people and those who do not have access to the internet and who may be paying high prices for heating oil; especially if they are on monthly top up schemes.

They are asking for more volunteers to act as village co-ordinators to help prevent deaths and illness arising from cold homes. Volunteers do not have to deal with any money or payments; the role is about talking to local people and passing on the orders to Suffolk ACRE, who with other charities across England, negotiate the best price in one massive order.

There is a small annual fee of £20 for each household joining the group oil buying scheme but in appreciation of helping, volunteer co-ordinators are invited to join for free.

PARISH COUNCIL

These are condensed notes of the proceedings of the Great Bealings Parish Council meeting held on 11th September 2012.

EAST ANGLIA ONE WIND FARM

The Chairman reported back from the meeting he and Julian Haywood Smith had had with EAOW on the different technical methods of laying the cable line for the Windfarm and the cable route in general:-

EAOW have outlined their different methods. These are:-

1. To dig trenches all the way. Time taken 10 - 12 weeks. Impact will be felt heaviest on Lodge Road which will have to be closed for 3 weeks. Scar

across the landscape will be most obvious.

2. Horizontal Directional Drilling (HDD) method – Time taken 12 – 14 weeks approx. Will need to establish two "working compounds" and have machinery on site – one compound west of Lodge Road and the other in field just opposite Southernhay. This method has the least impact on landscape helping to retain more trees, hedges and use of roads.

3. A mixture of 1) and 2) i.e. part trenching, part HDD.

Councillors resolved to write to EAOW expressing their preferred method being Horizontal Directional Drilling. Councillors also resolved to write requesting that any widening of roads etc. should be reinstated to their previous state. In addition Councillors resolved that the recommended working hours should be from 8.00 am - 6.00 pm, 5 days a week.

REPORT BY COUNTY COUNCILLOR PETER BELLFIELD

Peter Bellfield reported that he has talked at some length regarding traffic calming in Boot Street to the SCC Highway Dept. and there is not much more they can do. They are still against artificial measures such as "chicanes" and believe that putting physical barriers in the road causes more accidents. Peter Bellfield however does not agree with this view but does think that with improved enforcement by police or community speed watch the situation could be improved.

SCC is on track for making savings of £26,000,000 this year.

In schools - The first results from Key Stage 2 are very promising and subject grades are improving. Mr Bellfield hoped that this is indicative of the move to two-stage schools.

Mobile libraries are now scheduled to visit once a month as opposed to once a fortnight.

REPORT BY POLICE

There have been 2 reported crimes for the month of August including items stolen from rooms in Seckford Hall Hotel.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The Working Group had met last week and various members had been made aware of the terms of reference and their allocated jobs. Eric Barnett and Charles Barrington are meeting with Hilary Hanslip, the Policy Officer at SCDC on the 3rd October and the next Working Group meeting is scheduled for the 10th October. There is a £10 million "pot" available to help in the production of Neighbourhood Plans and LPA's can bid for up to £30,000 for each Neighbourhood Plan.

HIGHWAYS

The question of the "hump" being removed from the hump back bridge arose. Peter Bellfield reported that roads must cater for 44 tonne HGV and SCC had done this work to meet this requirement. The Clerk was asked to enquire whether we could have access to the results of the consultation that went out.

Retrospective permission was given for the go ahead for speed roundels between Holly Lane and the Bealings Road junction paid for by an anonymous donor.

Damon Bloomfield has been in contact with Ian Sparrow from BT over the leaking BT box. He has asked to be sent photos of the site with an accurate address.

Mr Martin Cripps asked if the Boot Street sign could be painted.

FINANCE

HARVEST THANKSGIVING AT LITTLE BEALINGS

All Saints Church celebrated this year's harvest with a thanksgiving service with songs of praise and prayers for our countryside on Sunday September 16th. Our usual Harvest lunch followed where we welcomed approx. 40 parishioners to a sumptuous ploughman's meal.

THE WYNAUD TRUST

Alison and Nigel Brown were our guests at Little Bealings Harvest Festival Service. All Saints Church. on Sunday. 16 September. They had recently returned from a visit to Zambia and were able to give us an update on the work of the Wynaud Trust, the African Charity we support. The Trust works in a rural area of Zambia, its aims are to promote education, encourage healthy living, provide training for life skills, and support the vulnerable. A new project which the Trust is helping is Kabompo Honey Limited, who plan to export 2 consignments of organic honey and beeswax each year, providing a supplementary income for 200 rural honey producers. The honey will be marketed in the UK under the Tropical Forest label. Another venture which caught our imagination was the School Support programme. Education in Zambia is free

until the child reaches Grade 8: from then on the parents have to pay: if they are unable to pay education for the child ceases. The Wynaud Trust works in partnership with the school and community to assist families and children living in severe poverty with school fees. For the basic school the fees are £8 a term. for the High School £20 a term. Currently the trust is supporting 47 children in Kabulamena, 24 of these children have sponsors in the UK. Visit the web site www.wynaudtrust.org if you would like to sponsor a child or learn more about the work of the Trust. We are fortunate that Alison and Nigel visit Zambia regularly and are able to give us such a clear picture of how the money we give is spent.

- Grass-cutting system to be investigated.
- Church wardens to examine quinquennial report in detail and make plan of long term repairs and improvements.

Our thanks to a certain young man for sweeping the church path even though it's like painting the Forth Road Bridge.

Our thanks go to all the flower ladies that are making such a difference inside our church. Lastly a big thank you to all those who help quietly and without fuss week in week out in order to keep our Church clean, open and alive.
