All are most warmly welcome to all the services.



SURVIVING WINTER APPEAL

Unbelievable as it might sound, 450* vulnerable people in Suffolk die in the winter months from causes directly attributable to the cold and poor living conditions. The vast majority of individuals affected are over 65 years old.

In fact, this is just the tip of the iceberg- almost 30,000** households in Suffolk currently live in fuel poverty. Many will suffer in silence during the coldest months, hidden from view, withdrawn from their community and surrounds.

Spearheaded by the Suffolk Community Foundation and in partnership with Age UK Suffolk and the East Anglian Daily Times, the Surviving Winter campaign offers vulnerable older individuals respite from the anxiety of managing fuel costs and the opportunity to stay warm and healthy during the winter. Over £85,000 was raised in the winter of 2014-2015, helping over 300 older households in the county.

Suffolk Community Foundation is now asking you to pledge your Winter Fuel Payment to those in need of extra support during the winter.

The money raised will be used in 2 ways:

- Support payments to those in need to help heat their homes properly, eat healthily and keep in touch with their community.

BRILLIANT BUSES

With bus cuts happening all over the country – more than 2,000 routes have been lost since 2010 – our villages are lucky enough to still have a bus service into town.

It may be infrequent but I think it's brilliant!

The drivers are friendly and go out of their way to be helpful. And the times are actually guite sensible: from Bealings and Playford you can travel into Ipswich around 8am and back soon after 5pm, which suits many workers and students. And on Tuesdays. Thursdays and Saturdays there are additional buses suitable for a morning's shopping. Culpho is on the route from Grundisburgh into Ipswich and has slightly more frequent buses.

What's more, you can travel happily in the knowledge that you're supporting a local service, that you aren't adding to traffic or pollution, and that you don't have to worry about parking when you get to town!

If you haven't used the bus in a while, why not give it a try? For times and routes the Traveline East Anglia website is great, or you can call Traveline on 0871 200 2233. Then just head to your nearest bus stop and stick out your arm! (Warning: some of the buses look like white vans, and you'll probably find yourself waving at several confusedlooking builders and couriers before you get the right one. Look out for 'Norse' on the side!)

PLANT SALE 2016

Our usual rallying cry, timed for a time of year when you are getting the garden ready for winter, and may be splitting plants, finding stray seedlings which could be potted, or rogue plants which might be of use to somebody else. Please don't just throw surplus plants on to the compost heap – it only takes a few seconds and a handful of compost to pot them and then be in a position to offer them for next year's sale. Most will survive the winter, and can be trimmed up before the actual sale.

What we would REALLY welcome is a prior commitment by a significant number of people to bringing along a modest number of plants next year. If we KNEW that 3 dozen people had committed to bringing along just a dozen or twenty plants to sell, then we would know that we would have at least 500 plants on the day, rather than just keeping our fingers tightly crossed that something will turn up – as it (happily, so far) usually does. If you do let organiser Norman Porter know that you are harbouring the intention to bring along some plants, then please email *nhp@rillcott.co.uk* and he will happily send out a reminder nearer the date of the Plant Sale, which next year is on **Saturday April 23rd**. Easter is at the end of March. We particularly welcome new growers, and contributions from people who have moved into our villages. It is a great way of getting involved.

If you haven't yet been to a Bealings Plant Sale then you've missed something special!

Footnote: Paddy Bills is having to scale down her involvement drastically, having committed much time and energy in recent years to ensuring the success of the Plant Sale. We owe her an enormous debt of thanks – and desperately need people to take up her various roles, on behalf of the Little Bealings PCC. She has always been particularly active on the publicity side of things, producing and distributing posters and flyers etc. Thank you Paddy, for all that you have done to ensure that the Plant Sale has survived and thrived – particularly during those years when it was held at the Manor House. We shall miss your input enormously.

GREAT BEALINGS - (and beyond) - WILDLIFE GROUP

Although this group is based on Great Bealings we emphasise that it is very much open to everyone in our benefice – and indeed beyond. All who have an interest in the ecology, fauna and flora of this beautiful part of Suffolk are warmly encouraged to join in.

We had one meeting earlier this year, based on a talk given by John Midwinter about the sort of wildlife that people might expect to encounter in these parts. We now have provisionally lined up a talk entitled *"Creating a wood for*" *Wildlife".* This illustrated talk will be given by Malcolm Key, who has spent the last 20 years doing precisely what the title suggests (near Debenham). We may not have many sites in Bealings that are a large as Malcolm's (22 acres), but Malcolm mentions all sorts of ideas which have encouraged wildlife and which might be deployed in more restricted areas. There are also some very fine images of animals, birds, tree and plants.

Given the progress of our Neighbourhood Plan, and the role that the local environment plays in this plan, it seems to be important that more and more people take an interest in, and are involved in enjoying, preserving and enhancing the natural environment.

We have currently pencilled in two dates: Saturday 19th March and Saturday 2nd April – both at around 10.30 am in St Mary's Church. Public opinion might well nudge us towards confirmation of one or other of these dates, so please let me know if you would like to come along. (Norman Porter – nhp@rillcott.co.uk 01473 735565). KYSON PROBUS CLUB

Kyson Probus Club met for its usual monthly meeting at 1230 on Mon 12 Oct 15 at the Ufford Park Hotel. After a convivial drink and lunch we heard a fascinating talk by Mr. Malcolm Key, who is leader of the RSPB Woodbridge Local Group and who on retirement from BT in 1996 bought some 22 acres of Suffolk countryside near Debenham in which to create a woodland habitat for birds and other wildlife. He described

how the site had previously been farmland. With no use of chemicals the first few years saw the soil become less artificially enriched which allowed it to revert to a more natural state. During this time more and more trees were planted, meadows sown with wild flower seeds and hedgerows coppiced. With a great deal of hard work and despite the ravages of caterpillars, rabbits and various diseases the site has matured to the point where some of the timber can be sold as part of the site's careful management to offset some of the costs. The woodland and meadows are now a diverse haven for birds. mammals, plants, insects and many naturally living things and will continue to develop and accommodate Nature's unpredictable ways for many years to come. It is a true oasis and our members were deeply impressed by the vision and commitment of Mr. Key. Overall, it was an extremely informative and enjoyable afternoon.

◆East Anglia Three Wind Farm – Following the comments sent regarding the consultation document, the Clerk has asked for an acknowledgement and anticipated date of response.

A reply has now been received and will be discussed at the meeting on 29th

October.

♦ Registration of Community Asset – the consultation period ended on 15th September.

We have since been told by SCDC that our application has been rejected due to the fact that the land in question has never been subject to public use. The Parish Council is considering an appeal

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The draft NP had been circulated to all Councillors and following discussion it was RESOLVED that The Plan should be taken to the next stage, as set out below, followed by subsequent formal submission to SCDC. The tasks that now need completing are as follows:

Finalise drafting

•Consult with owners of Non-Designated Heritage Assets and prepare a list of FAQs for them

Now completed

◆Organise public meeting for first week in October *The meeting took place on* 15th October having been advertised via the benefice email system and also through an insert in the last Benefice Newsletter

◆Arrange pre-submission meeting with SCDCThis took place on 16th October and will be actioned in terms of the amendments recommended by them

The current draft plan is accessible on the website, but anyone who does not have internet access can request a printed copy. It was further RESOLVED that If anything material emerges from the next steps, there will be a need to convene a special PC meeting for a further decision. The Chairman expressed his appreciation to all the members of the NPWG for their significant contribution. Councillors also thanked the Chairman for the enormous amount of work he has personally undertaken to get the Plan to this stage.

REPORT BY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR COLIN HEDGLEY

Cllr Hedgley reported that:

♦SCC has ceased making any financial contribution to District Councils for the use of the brown recycling bins. SCDC have yet to make a decision as to whether to retain them, since if they do so they will have to absorb the full cost.

•There is a deadline of 14th September for SCC and SCDC to finalise a plan for devolution of some powers and duties to District/Town/Parish Councils.

◆SCDC are going to re-examine the possibility of creating any sites for travellers.

•The renovated Felixstowe Seafront Gardens were officially opened last week.

POLICE REPORT

The police report for July showed there had been one crime in Great Bealings – for assault.

IPSWICH GARDEN SUBURB – TRAFFIC IMPACT

Colin Hedgley reported that a letter had been sent on behalf of the four parish councils to the Cabinet Member for Highways and Transport at SCC, and copied to Dr Dan Poulter MP, who has expressed concern about this matter, and replies have been received from both.

PLANNING

DC/15/2322/FUL – Creation of new private access drive to serve plot 1 and associated change of use to residential curtilage – Land near Woodbarn Cottages, off Seckford Hall Rd, Great Bealings - It was **RESOLVED** to object to this proposal on several grounds.

DC/15/3274/FUL – Siting of two mobile homes adjacent to Fynn Bridge Barn for a limited period whilst barn conversion work carried out – Fynn Bridge Barn, The Street, Little Bealings - Councillors were advised that the previous application had been withdrawn and this was for a slightly different location on the site. It was **RESOLVED** that the PC has no objection to this application, subject however to the same conditions as were previously agreed.

HIGHWAYS

Following the letter which had been sent to SCC, a response has been received from the Area Engineer outlining future plans for the areas highlighted.

RIVER LARK EMBANKMENT

Following concern expressed by a number of residents over changes being made by a householder to the embankment of the River Lark, the Clerk had sent a letter on 24th August from the PC to the Environment Agency (EA). The owners of the property were present at the meeting and they advised Councillors that the EA have inspected the works and will report back to them in two weeks. They also reassured the Council that they are quite prepared to rectify any work which is found to have been carried out incorrectly. The Chairman thanked them for attending the meeting and asked them to contact Colin Hedgley once they have received the report from the EA.

EMERGENCY PLANNING

Colin Hedgley has made enquiries to SCDC and there is a web site for this plus they have an Emergency Planning Officer who would help. Councillors agreed that Gt Bealings should have an Emergency Plan and Anthony Shepherd volunteered to take on this project.

FINANCE

Seven cheques were authorized, including Data Protection Fee, Election Fee and Clerk's salary and office expenses. The Clerk informed Councillors that Adrian Melrose has volunteered to perform the internal audit of the annual accounts. This news was welcomed. The Bank Reconciliation was noted and approved.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Broadband Roll-Out – Charles Barrington outlined to Councillors the 'Better Broadband for Suffolk' scheme by which it is possible for local businesses to apply for vouchers which can be submitted to BT to co-fund better broadband installation. It would be necessary for there to be a co-ordinator to open discussions with the scheme organisers.

Phil Holmes has kindly agreed to follow up and recommend what steps can be taken
