THE BIRDS OF CULPHO VILLAGE

'That's the wise thrush, He sings his songs twice over, Lest you should think, He never could recapture,

That first fine careless rapture' Robert Browning

From March till August I hear, as I cycle through Culpho, a Song Thrush singing. Song thrushes are slowly recovering after a serious decline their numbers. This thrush repeats his song again from the over and over churchvard of St. Botolph. I found the nest this year - a mud lined basin with four bright blue eggs that were speckled black. In early February another thrush can be heard from the top of the churchyard conifer. This is the Mistle thrush - a bird that serenades me with mellower tones.

Because Culpho still has magnificent hedgerows, it is an ideal habitat for our resident finches, **goldfinch**, **linnet**, **chaffinch** and **greenfinch**. But there are two places where the dandy of them all, the bullfinch, nests. Not much of a songster but by a mile the most attractive of finches.

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It is worth spending a few minutes perusing made off with a vole. More serious was the the meadow at the corner of the village. An area of various grasses and wildflowers, it is perfect for the **barn owl**. I have often stopped to watch this ghostly owl quartering from the owl's neck. Occasionally a **kestrel** hovers over the piece of 'set-aside' for both this bird of prey and the barn owl hunt for short-tailed field voles that are plentiful in most years. I once witnessed a kestrel attack a barn owl and after a locking together of talons, the kestrel

wonderful raptors in a thermal over Culpho. At least three pairs nest in this area. Another bird, indeed my favourite bird of prey, is the hobby. This small summer visitor is a dashing, handsome falcon. A pair of these visitors waits for the young crows to leave their nest in a tall oak between Culpho and Tuddenham and then rear their own voung from that disused nest. It was a redletter day for me when I saw a red kite floating over Culpho. The gnarled oaks are also home to two other species of owl, little and tawny, and although the latter is mainly nocturnal, it is not unusual to see little owls perched on overhanding branches in the middle of the day.

The above is just a few of Culpho's resident birds. There are many more, especially in winter when the area becomes a magnet, not only for **redwings and fieldfares**, but for hundreds of **lapwings and golden plovers** that flock to the freshly ploughed

We are most grateful to Reg Snook for agreeing to provide the Editorial 'The Birds of Culpho Village'. Reg is a well-known ornithologist and artist, having spent most of his life working with wildlife and art both as a representative of the RSBP and, for 29 years, an Inspector for DEFRA. He is the author of a trilogy of books depicting Portraits of Christchurch Park, the Owl and Birds. His wildlife paintings depict almost every bird in the British Isles. In 2001 his art took a change of direction when he commenced painting portraits of the people of Grundisburgh, in particular those working for Lord Cranworth. Over 200 paintings have been produced and this wonderful piece of social history has been bound in six volumes and placed in the Village Archives. As Reg points out this is an ongoing project. Ron Hurlock is a figure regularly seen around our villages and in our churches, of which he is a great supporter. His reputation as an artist is spreading too. Following his successful exhibition last April at Snape, he is staging another exhibition of his work this year at the same venue. ST MARY'S

Many households in the village will by now have received a letter from Charles Barrington, our Treasurer, and myself, outlining the severe challenges facing our church. We are doing our best to ensure that these letters are delivered direct, handto-hand, giving recipients a chance to chat about the content. So far these letters have been delivered in person to more than half the households in the village. It takes time, but the rest will have been delivered in the latter weeks of October. We take this opportunity to thank most sincerely those who have so far responded.

If the letter is still in your in-tray we do urge you to dig it out and to read it carefully, and then to reply as positively as you can manage. Your suggestions too are very welcome. Even if you feel that you can add little of positive in your reply, please do return the reply slip to either Charles or Norman. In our view, unless we act with real purpose, there is a very real threat that we may no longer have either an open church or a priest in the relatively near future.

In the meantime we are doing our best to

ensure that the church and churchyard have a function and an attraction way beyond its use for church services. As well as our Sunday services we can identify four other strands of possible interest:

1.**Wildlife** and further development of the churchyard in partnership with the Suffolk Wildlife Trust. In that respect we have already arranged for an **Open Evening** on **Friday June 9**th, when the Trust's Community Liaison Officer, Tracey Housley will tell us what flora and fauna we have to appreciate in the churchyard.

2.**History**, including a better focus for visitors to the graves in the churchyard. We hope to set up a small cabin, with a map of the position of the graves, visitors' book etc. There is also great scope for using the church as a focus for village history, with occasional small exhibitions etc. We have already installed a couple of recycled picnic tables, courtesy of The Ramsholt Arms. We are very aware that the church has had cycling visitors, so are hoping to install a cycle rack too.

3.**Talks and concerts**. If anyone can come up with names of possible performers or speakers do please let us know. We

have a good reputation for high guality feeders, a hedgehog house, bug pile, were concerts, but a recent lack of performers. discussed. Tracey will be coming back to an Use of personal contacts will help here. please.

4. Neighbourliness: We are looking at ways in which the church can play more of a secular pastoral role in the village. One idea is that we might have a list of people who might offer an hour a week, helping with gardening, shopping etc. for those whose independence of living is under stress.
