Strictly speaking, the only characteristic we all have in common is that we chose to live here, presumably because we like it. However, that in itself does not create a community.

definition The second above. does perhaps provide a clue. While we may not all share the same attitudes, it could be said that many of us do have a particular interest in common - namely to make our villages and neighbourhoods a better, safer and more pleasant place in which to live

Having recently returned to Bealings after an absence of over 30 years, the village community is certainly different to that of my childhood in the 1960s and indeed to that of my Grandfather. Born in Lower Street in 1889, he would have known virtually everyone in the village, which at that time, would have been a far more self -sufficient, self-contained community. The majority of residents would have worked, shopped and socialised within the village. making for a closer, some would say more insular, community.

When I arrived on the scene some 70 years later, Bealings was already a very different place. Gone were the village blacksmiths, smallholders, carriers and other tradesmen who in previous generations had provided the residents with many of their day to day needs. The railway station had closed, and manv people no longer worked in the village. At the beginning of the 1960s, the villages of

By the time I and my contemporaries reached school leaving age in the 1970s. there was little or no work available in the village, the pubs had all closed and the possibility of buying or renting a house here was remote to say the least. Put simply, there was little to keep us here. and one by one we all left, perhaps no longer feeling part of the community that we had grown up in.

So how does The Bealings I left in 1983 compare with that to which I returned in 2017? Physically, little has changed. The beautiful countryside is largely the same as that which I freely roamed and played in as a boy. The Fynn and the Lark still wind their leisurely way through the villages and the old hump backed bridge where we used to gather and play, still stands. The houses, lanes and footpaths are still recognisable as those of my youth, as the villages have been spared large-scale housebuilding and the development which has afflicted some. The old school (scaffolding notwithstanding) and the churches still look much the same.

But what of the community - does it still exist? Well, yes it does, albeit in a somewhat different form. While the shops and pubs may have all gone, there is still a core of willing volunteers and helpers who keep village life ticking over. These are the people who run our parish councils, churches, village halls, clubs societies, and playing fields and numerous other events which provide vital opportunities for people to meet and socialise - an honourable mention here

While there may be occasional disagreements over the means of achieving it, many villagers still carry on doing their bit to make our villages better places in which to live, all working towards a common goal, a common interest, for the good of the *community*.

NATURE NOTES

Extinction: The Facts

Our "Nature Notes" title, completely belittles the frightening significance of this programme shown on BBC 1 in mid-September, which this item now highlights.

96-year-old Sir David Attenborough investigated the devastating effects of climate change and habitat loss on wildlife and plant life, and how it is also impacting humanity and the planet. He detailed how a million different species are at risk of extinction due to the



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biodiversity crisis, which is also putting us at greater risk of pandemic diseases like COVID-19



This item is not just to urge readers to watch this programme, if they missed it, but also to invite them to turn the telescope round to see whether there is more that can be done at local level to help retrieve the situation. Most people living in the countryside are aware of the damage that is being done to wildlife: this Magazine and others carry items about the value of wild-flower meadows and gardens, about the need to encourage bees and insects, about keeping an eye open for stag-beetles, for encouraging hedgehogs, about feeding the birds, about safeguarding hedgerows - but is there more we can do as individuals? Is our voracious appetite for development, small though each incidence may seem, contributing inexorably to the demise of our living planet and the loss of millions of non-humanoid species? Are there things that we, as individuals, could refrain from doing which would help, and, conversely, are there things that we could undertake to do, to the benefit of other species. Every individual amongst us who is concerned that future generations should enjoy life as humans on this richly diverse planet of ours should ask themselves these questions.

This extraordinary man deserves to be the lead voice in a mighty, ever-swelling chorus, not just a voice crying in the wilderness.

HISTORY CORNER

For many years it has been a tradition to hold village fetes some time over the summer, usually in aid of the local church. This year it was impossible, owing to restrictions made necessary by the Covid virus. The nature of these fetes has changed over the years, but to fill the vacuum left by this lack of fetes to report on, it seems appropriate to resort to an account of a village fete held some 45 vears ago. What is remarkable - and in tune with the sense of community highlighted by Francis Mutimer in the lead item, is the way in which our villages cooperated in a joint objective: a Little Bealings fete, held in a large Playford garden, with a resident of Great Bealings officially opening it, and a Great Bealings auctioneer raising much of the money. The fete took place on 14th June 1975 and was in aid of All Saints Tower Fund.



"The fete was opened by Lord Belstead on a gloriously sunny day. Mrs Storey (Playford Mount) had kindly offered her garden as the venue for the fete. What a garden! It was very extensive, filled with shrubberies and rolling lawns, which slope away to a little valley and stream. the sides of which were covered in nettles and rosebay willow herb. The pony rides Norman Porter for the children were at the bottom of this slope, while further along there was the "toss the bale" competition. One of the

more energetic competitors cleared almost 13 feet! There was a verv wide range of produce and side-stalls scattered about the garden. The crowning spectacle was the performance of dancing and singing given by the "Coop Juniors". Their dresses portraved both ancient and modern themes. from the late nineteenth century to the present day. Everybody present was amazed at the colour and variety of those dresses. The garage was used as a picture gallery to show paintings by local amateur artists. Several of them were sold. Together with the sale of tickets the sum raised was £580.

The fete winds up a series of events and appeals to raise money for the restoration of the tower of All Saints Church. It had started with general house-to-house appeal, followed by an auction, with Mr Haywood Smith of Great Bealings as auctioneer. This single event raised over £1100 in one single afternoon. The Auction was followed by a Flower Festival and display of old photographs, organised by Mr Fleck. Coupled with this was a Buffet Lunch served in the Angela

Cobbold Hall, raising over £400.

All of this in an age when Christianity is supposed to be on the way out and in difficult economic times. There must be something in village life or depth of feeling for things past to be treasured and restored, which is most welcome to find, particularly when it is in your very own village."

So: A Little Bealings fete, opened by a distinguished local resident, held in a Playford garden, with a Great Bealings auctioneer, a wide range of activities, much enjoyment and a large sum of money raised for a much-cherished church. What could be more typical of the best of village life? We don't have any pictures of that event but we do have two nostalgia-inducing pictures from the Great Bealings 2002 Diamond Jubilee event held in the field beyond Kiln Farm which pick up on two items mentioned above; the opening by Lord Belstead and pony rides, plus the traditional whole-village photograph. Let us hope we get back to such times sooner rather than later.



DAD'S ARMY

Reading the History Corner section in the June issue about the local Home Guard. I should expand on the thought Т characters involved in the highly successful TV series. Dad's Army, still running after 40 years. In 1970 I became manager of Midland Bank, Brompton Road. One day I was advised" Mr Lowe is outside and wishes to see you ". In came Arthur and presented me with his request for finance to rebuild a Victorian Steam pinnace lving on the Shoeburyness mud flats. He presented me with a large scroll, which he unwound and lay on my desk, being upside down from my side, I moved round to get a better perspective and appraise the planned repairs etc. I looked up and there was Arthur Lowe sitting in my chair !, Little did I realise that a long and personal friendship would follow, including the whole of the Dad's Army crew, when they came aboard the finished boat at the Lensbury Regatta the following year. Also invited were Peter O'Toole, Jack Hawkins and Sian Phillips. "that the "bonhomie Durina usual followed, one thing struck me, their characters were the same on board as they were on TV. Clearly there was no need for any "character building "or to that matter, direction. This intrigued me to wondering what these characters were really like in real life. We all watch Dad's Army with its comedic situations piling on each other, true, and you will recall some serious moments when Capt. Mainwaring reminds his ancient troop that " Come on lads, we'll beat these German Boche. mark my words ". But what were their own war records and experiences like? Let me explain a few.

Arthur Lowe- Capt. Mainwaring: Born in 1915, When WW2 began, he tried to join the Merchant Navy but was refused due to his poor eyesight. He then joined the Army and served in the Middle East with the Duke of Lancaster's own Yeomanry. He was then transferred to R.E.M.E. as a radar technician and discharged at the end of the war reaching the rank of Sergeant

Clive Dunn= Cpl Jones: Born 1920: In 1940 served as a trooper in 4th Queen's Hussars, who were ordered to stop the German advance in Greece. Despite putting up a brave fight, the German tanks were superior to our own. The regiment was forced to surrender, and he was taken prisoner with 400 others and imprisoned in Austria until his release when the war ended.

John Laurie, Scots undertaker Frazer; Born 1897 Joined the army in 1914 in the Honourable Artillery Company and was particularly haunted by his experiences. In WW2 he joined the Home Guard, the only member of the cast that did so., apart from Ridley.

James Beck, Pvt Walker: One of the key cast members as Pvt Walker. He did his National Service as a Physical Training Instructor, his death in 1973 was a great shock to his cast friends. He lived very near to me in East Sheen and I had the very sorrowful task of comforting his wife. His character was never replaceable.

William A. Ridley: Private Godfrey probably the one character that attracts the most sympathy. Born 1896, he volunteered for service in the British Army 1914, but was rejected with a hammer toe. In 1915 he tried again and was accepted into the Somerset Light Infantry, he saw service in the Battle of the Somme, sustaining several wounds in battle, his left hand was useless and his leas riddled with shrapnel, he received a bayonet wound to the groin. The legacy of a blow to his head by a German rifle butt led to black outs after the war and he was medically discharged as a Lance Corporal in 1916. But he was not yet finished, he re -joined the Army in 1939, 43 years old as a second lieutenant. His role was to control and ensure the safety of the numerous journalists reporting the war in France. He returned to Britain in the overcrowded destroyer Vimera, which was the last ship to escape from the harbour during the battle of Boulogne. He relinguished his commission as Captain on 1 June 1940 and immediately joined

My question to them all," What do you think of the Home Guard then and your portrayal now? ", TO a man they believed they had done their bit when younger and now in their later years they could indulge in some "self-mocking" of the characters they portrayed in Dad's Army ". Perhaps that is why the TV series continues to be such a success?

NEW EAST SUFFOLK

PARKING TARIFF

Following a delay caused by the Covid-19 pandemic, East Suffolk Council is now nearing the end of rolling out new parking tariffs across the district including a simplified pricing structure and free half hour parking across a number of sites.

Reducing over 50 different price points to just three or four main ticket types across the district, the new price structure will see prices reduced or frozen in over 70% of cases. Additionally, the council has introduced 30 minutes free parking in a number of car parks to support people who said that they make regular short visits. This will also support local businesses who will benefit from drivers making guick turnarounds in our car parks.

East Suffolk Council are introducing the new tariffs in a staggered roll out, with signs erected to indicate the new charges this started in Bungay in August. The roll out then continued through the district.

Cllr Norman Brooks, East Suffolk's cabinet member for Transport, said: "Our new tariffs have been led by the data we have received from historical parking information and we are determined to make the process as simple and reasonable as possible. We know that the range of different charges has been inconsistent, and we also know that the tariffs to date have not necessarily suited the vast majority of people who park in our towns.

"The prices for longer stays remain competitive and our data tells us that around 75% of all users will pay just £1 or £1.50 for a two-hour stay. These changes are not about making money – in fact, we will not be making a penny of additional revenue from them, with more than 70% of tariff levels reduced or stay the same for a two-hour visit. This is about continuing to invest in improving the parking experience in East Suffolk, making it easier for everyone."

East Suffolk Council is also continuing to make the best use of technology to improve services by making them more efficient, and has seen an increase of 129% on contactless payments in its car parks as visitors take advantage of the simple RingGo app to park with ease and confidence.

Available in all East Suffolk's car parks, RingGo is a quick and easy to use mobile phone service which lets people pay for their parking with a credit or debit card, via an app, rather than using cash at the machine. This means that drivers no longer need to queue at the machine or handle cash to pay for their parking.

Whilst there used to be a convenience fee of 20p to use the app, East Suffolk Council covers this cost, so drivers do not get charged extra for using this payment option. There is however a small extra charge if drivers choose to opt in to receive SMS reminders, of when your time is running out.

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Parking management moved from the police to East Suffolk Council in April 2020, to improve parking locally and tackle nuisance and unlawful parking, enabling the Council to address the parking problems that are affecting communities the most.

Cllr Brooks continues: "Our role is to support local communities and manage parking demand by enforcing existing regulations and ensuring there are parking opportunities for residents and visitors alike. Key to this is tackling inconsiderate and illegal parking which can impact on businesses as well as pose a danger to other road users and pedestrians."

Alongside this, the Council also

reviewed how it administrated on-street parking permits, exemptions and dispensations. As a result of this, a new digital system has been put in place, enabling residents and others to apply for and manage permits online. The system also recognises valid permits from a vehicle's registration number, meaning that permit holders will no longer need to remember to display their permits.

SUFFOLK DOMESTIC ABUSE HELPLINE

Anglia Care Trust (ACT), in partnership with Suffolk County Council have launched a free, 24/7 Suffolk Domestic Abuse helpline: 0800 977 5690. The National Domestic Abuse helpline reported recently that, since the start of lockdown, they have received more than 40,000 calls and contacts, with an 800% increase in June. Working with our partners we want to offer a more direct, local solution enabling victims in Suffolk to get direct support, advice and action.

Domestic abuse takes many forms - similar to COVID-19 it's a hidden danger, and sometimes a hidden killer. Although domestic abuse is usually synonymous with violence, often physical abuse is not a factor at all. Many survivors suffer coercive control: their abuser will isolate them from friends and family and will make them feel as if the abuse is their own fault. Financial abuse is another form - the perpetrator will take control of all household income and will restrict access to any money. Psychological abuse takes many forms and, very often, the survivor hides the abuse just as much as someone that's been physically harmed, as they are made to believe they have caused the behaviour.

GEOFF DUNNETT FINALLY RETIRES!

A full feature was written on Geoff in the September 2018 issue of this newsletter detailing his work and his family's long connection with the village. His was the third generation to have worked on Hill Farm with his brother, father and grandfather all having done some 50 or more years there. At the end of his working life Geoff cared for the Hill House garden for 25 years but, now that the house has finally been sold, his services are no longer required and he has stepped aside. An earlier 44 years on the farm makes his a remarkable total of 69 years service surpassing the rest of his family by a mile.

Although it is 140 years since his grandfather Walter arrived in the village from Little Bealings, it is less well known that on his mother's side the Playford connection does back considerably further. Geoff's mother Eva was а Robinson from a large family of market gardeners who rented land at Branson's from 1863 until around the turn of the C20. Samuel, the father of the three brothers who worked the garden, had come from Framlingham in the early 1800s, had married in Playford church in 1816 and had found work with old Thomas Clarkson on Playford Hall Farm. Eva's grandfather however never joined his other brothers but moved away, working on various farms in the district and finally ending up at Warren Houses on the Felixstowe Road now long since built over. It was from Warren Houses that Eva went into service with Miss Rosa and Miss Emma Crisp at Playford Hall and where Geoff's father Fred met her

when delivering milk from Hill Farm where he worked as a cow man.

Within the last 20 years there have been three or four other such people with similarly deep roots living here in the village. There was Frank Mann whose great-great-grandfather had been born at Colonel's Cottages in 1801, Anne Woods whose great-great-great-grandfather had come from Rushmere in 1776, José Booker whose great-great-grandfather had moved from Ramsholt sometime before 1822 and there was Owen Goldsmith whose great-great-grandfather, Arthur Biddell, had moved from West Suffolk in 1808 and whose family had dominated village life and farmed every Playford acre throughout the C19. Geoff's retirement adds to this illustrious list though it is to be hoped that we have still not seen the last of him. Living in Whitton. he will surely continue to find a way to visit his beloved Mere... and maybe even to cut the grass while he is down there! We shall see.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Mary Evans is standing in as Co. Cllr for Playford following Robin Vickery's resignation from SCC - new councillors will not be elected until May 2021. Mary has been sending in regular reports from SCC since the beginning of lockdown. She is aware of the many Highways issues not resolved in this parish and asked the clerk to send details/reference numbers to her so that these can be followed up. SCC is looking to spend money to promote Quiet Lanes in Suffolk for walkers, dog walkers and horse riding. Mary's special responsibility is with children's services and she has been organising holiday schemes for them since March. Current legislation whereby parents cannot be prosecuted for not sending their children to school is likely to be reversed soon. Home/school transport needs to be better organised.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Colin Hedgley and Tony Fryatt have sent in regular reports from East Suffolk Co. And updates on the Covid-19 situation throughout the pandemic. Colin further stated that ESC has taken over all car parking in East Suffolk, that all District Council meetings were being held via Zoom for the foreseeable future and the Suffolk Coastal Local Plan will likely be received back the from Inspectors sometime in September. The Hardship fund started at the beginning of the pandemic has been provided by each District Cllr contributing £2K from their respective budgets - this has been very much appreciated bv many disadvantaged people in the district who have benefited from it.

ACTION POINT REVIEW

Progress on footpaths is on hold until after the Covid pandemic has eased as we cannot get hold of the ROW Footpaths Officer to discuss.

Signs to be installed in Church Lane to deter heavy vehicles from using the route are similarly delayed until easing of social distancing will allow the work to be carried out.

A site meeting is needed to discuss remedies for maintenance of the drainage ditch near the entrance to the Village Hall car park and a barrier may be required at the edge of the ramp.

Dead oak tree close to the carriageway on C324 is not thought to be an imminent danger but will be monitored regularly.

Two new grit bins in Church Road

should be filled before the winter months.

Part of the pavement in Spring Meadow, damaged by the water issue in FP7 has been re-tarmacked.

More potholes at the southern end of Butts Road have been reported, also the removal of silt built up on C324 has been requested again.

Blue algae on the long pond in the water meadow on the Fynn Valley walk has yet to be confirmed by the Environment Agency.

See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details of these items.

FINANCE

Payments were authorised for clerk's salary from April to July, to HMRC for tax due on clerk's salary, annual subscription to SALC, annual donation to FLN, to CAS for annual insurance renewal, a donation to Grundisburgh Baptist Church in respect of the internal audit carried out by Colin Grimwood and the annual subscription to the ICO. Credits received: First half of the Precept £4000.00 and reclaimed VAT of £806.73. A bank reconciliation was carried out. The budget for 2020-21 and the pricing of Assets were reviewed. The internal audit has been carried out by Colin Grimwood and his report together with the Certificate of Exemption (from external audit), the AGAR (Annual Governance and Accountability Return) and the Accounting Statement were agreed and accepted by an email vote taken in May.

HIGHWAYS ISSUES

Silt/drain clearances on the C324 and road signs etc in Church Lane have been covered in Action Point review (above). Also a site meeting will be arranged to discuss remedies for the drainage ditch around the playing field as above.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The completion certificate for the Groundwork grant received in this tax year has been received and a decision must now be made as to when NP will be finalised and put out for referendum. It

may be advantageous to wait until after the new Local Plan is adopted later this year.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

DC/20/0894/VOC – variation of condition of planning permission DC/19/2217/FUL at Heath Cottage, IP5 1DA - Playford PC supported this application.

DC/20/1732/FUL Conversion and extension of existing agricultural building to form a dwelling (following prior approval of DC/19/4256/PN3 for change of use of an agricultural building to two residential dwellings) at Archway Piggeries. - Playford PC supported this application.

OTHER MATTERS

Website Accessibility issues have been addressed in line with new legislation effective from 22nd Sept 2020.

The newly proposed Code of Conduct has been circulated to all councillors for comments and should be approved by the LGA later this year.

Ipswich Ramblers have donated a bench which has been installed next to the water meadow on the Fynn Valley walk commemorating Mr Geoff Pratt, one of their late members.

Following a unanimous vote, Martin Hill was co-opted onto the parish council as a new councillor. One more councillor is still required to serve – please contact the clerk or any councillor for details if you are interested.

Joan Metcalfe thanked Colin Hedgley as Churchwarden for arranging the meeting in the Church.

MEMORIAL BENCH

Playford Parish Council was contacted by the Ipswich and District Ramblers in May of this year to ask permission for a memorial bench to be placed near Playford's Footpath 1, which runs alongside the north side of the water meadow and forms part of the Fynn Valley walk. The landowner, John Fenton was in full agreement and a suitable site was chosen, with a pleasant view facing south across the water meadow.

The bench is to commemorate their late member Mr Geoff Pratt, an engineer, whose books on local walks are well known and whose work in making walking more available was spread over several decades.

The following is taken from the Ipswich & District Ramblers' website (with their permission).

"Geoff and his wife Jean, also an engineer, were a force in developing the Ramblers Association in Suffolk. They had met on the engineering course at Bristol University where Jean was the only woman. Her bench is at Melton Picnic Area.





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They produced a weekly walk for the East havens for as long as possible so as to Anglian (Daily Times) which led to a preserve somewhere tranquil to enjoy the series of books on walks in Suffolk. They sold well and encouraged many to explore their county. He was an enthusiast and earned respect for his knowledge which came across all the better for his friendly manner. He was pretty handy at persuading others to support the work of the Ramblers".

The dedication on the bench reads:

Geoff Pratt 1928-2018. Engineer. walker and author.

His books and writings celebrated the Footpaths of Suffolk.



Let us hope the bench provides rest and enjoyment for local walkers for many, many years to come. Walking is our heritage and is FREE - all you need is a suitable pair of shoes and appropriate clothing. We are so lucky in this little corner of England to have so many footpaths to choose from and many of them are near rivers which we can admire and explore. The Fynn and the Lark are almost literally on our doorstep and the Deben, Orwell and Stour (the big boys!) are all within a short drive. It's good to know that local footpaths have all been enjoyed by so many people during the lockdown period and in the main, they have been respected by walkers and social distancing rules been obeyed as far as possible, though it is regrettable that the latter should have to be necessary.

We have fought back the lpswich Northern Relief route and will continue to deter the development of our local rural

countryside which has largely been unchanged for centuries.

I don't think I would have found the strength at Charles' funeral service to have stood up and adequately expressed my love for and admiration of him, and utter sadness at his loss; it was not until some months later that I came across these few words, which describe in a wonderfully succinct and appropriate way (Charles was a talented cricketer), the man Charles aspired to be ... and, indeed, was.

Under Government Guidance, the Church Representation Rules and the Churchwardens Measure, meetings of more than six persons are allowed in Church provided they are safe; social distancing is upheld, and face coverings are worn. In this respect we are pleased to announce that we shall be holding our APCM at 10 a.m. on Tuesday 20th October 2020.

All persons on the Church Electoral Roll are eligible to attend together with residents whose name appears on the Local Authority Electoral register.

In order to ensure everyone is safe, there will be an exist and entry system in place, with hand sanitizer in the Porch. Chairs will be positioned to ensure social distancing and there is a need to wear a face covering. In this way the meeting will be conducted safely. The Churchwardens will have conducted a Risk Assessment prior to the date of the meeting. Details of all attending will be recorded and kept for 21 days in accord with Track and Trace directives.

Regardless of the uncharacteristic conditions under which the meeting will be held, a warm welcome awaits if you are able to attend. Details of appointments will subsequently be posted on the Notice Board.

There are vacancies for Parochial Church Council members and still time to make application if you feel this is something you would like to be part of. There are certain criteria to be met, notably that you are over sixteen years of age, have been baptised and attend Church, either at Culpho or elsewhere. Please contact either Churchwarden if you would like to apply.
