also been a long-term distributor of this Magazine in her local area.



Ivan was born at home in the centre of Ipswich. One of three boys, his father was a policeman and his mother a post lady. They survived a World War 2 bomb exploding next door and Ivan was evacuated to Leicester as a little boy.

Ivan lost his own father when he was only 8 years old, and times were tough for his mother bringing up 3 boys on her own.

Ivan went to Northgate Grammar School. This was always very important to him. although recently a school report said he should have tried harder!

At the age of 18 he went to Egypt to complete his National Service with the RAF, at the Suez Canal. He slept in tents for 2 years in the desert without seeing his family. Before Ivan's departure to Egypt, he met Freda in Christchurch Park and shortly after his return they married. Ivan and Freda's marriage lasted for over 50 years. Shortly after they married, Ivan and Freda left Suffolk to live in Welwyn Garden City where he worked as an accountant at ICI for over 25 years.

The family moved to Hertford when their three daughters were babies. It was the perfect place for young children to grow up amongst many families, who became lifelong friends.

Ivan quickly ioined the local Bowls Club and later the Deben Rotarv Club. Ivan became President of the Club and was made an Honorary Member after he moved back to Hertfordshire. Ivan and Freda were active members of All Saints Church in Little Bealings and stalwart members of the choir.

HORTICULTURAL CONSOLATION CORNER

Most things have withered and wilted under the sustained heat and drought of this past summer. It can happily be reported that the editor's garden has known two brave exceptions: tomatoes flowers. An unlikely passion combination.



The bucketsful of juicy tomatoes can be explained by the fact that there were a few spare plants after the near-abortive Plant Sale, and that they found a bit of spare space, in the sun, in open ground. With a little bit of watering they have proliferated, producing at least four trusses of fruit per plant. Keen gardeners will know that it is not advisable to allow more than three outside tomatoes trusses, so these have excelled and exceeded their brief. And the tomatoes are still coming thick and fast, leading to lots of tasty mozzarella salads. That is not

Secondly, and extraordinarily; a passion plant draped over a trellis, which last year managed to produce just three or four spindly tendrils, has this year gone completely berserk, covering the trellis with thick runners which seem to grow a foot a day, spreading out into the surrounding foliage. and producina hordes of beautiful flowers, as illustrated. Those flowers are worth close examination. Thev wondrously are delicate and really beautiful.

They have a tropical look about them, which may explain why they have thrived during a long hot summer. passionflower is a vine-like perennial, and is best chopped back every year, after flowering. The name comes from the passion of Christ, so seems to be linked with Easter, despite its proliferating in late summer. If our summers are to follow the pattern of summer 2022, it may be worth considering planting one.

CHURCHWARDEN'S NOTES

I write this as we find ourselves in the throes of mourning the passing of our late Queen Elizabeth, and preparing for the reign of our new King, Charles 111. Within the swirling of so many emotions and reflections on the historical context of it all - an octogenarian has had more time to accumulate these than many that part of me that plays the role of churchwarden in this village has found itself focusing on one thing in particular: the fact that our Head of State is also the Head of the Church of England. The two offices are inextricably bound together and have been entwined with particularly beneficial effect in the person of our late sovereign. Our late Queen has been our Head of State, and in that capacity has met and entertained other Heads of State from across the world. At the same time. she has also been the Head of the Church of England - Fidei Defensor and that has not been an empty role. It has been widely asserted that her faith has been at the very heart of her reign, and of her pledge to serve, and has given her the strength to reign over us, with all the demands and challenges involved, over a period of more than 70 years. Her reign, as Head of State, and her faith, Supreme embodied in her being Governor of the Church of England, have been indivisible. And her successor. King Charles 111, has promised to honour his mother by keeping the same vow that she made so many years ago.

What does that mean for our own small village church? It means that, trickling down from the heart of British monarchy, church and state are one, and that there

should be no conflict between the two. It is not a matter of faith. That can come at all sorts of levels of intensity, and through a range of different channels, if at all. It has become so easy to see the church as a place apart, reserved for the small band of churchgoers who try to keep it alive. But if our churches are still part of our national fabric then they are as much part of our Britishness as our civic identity. The way in which the great ceremonies of state are being conducted, with wonderful dignity, ceremony and emotion in our great cathedrals can be reflected on a smaller scale, and has been, in the more modest churches that still stand at the heart of so manv of our smaller communities. Those churches borne witness to the evolution of our history over hundreds of years. They too, are a proper place for commemorating or celebrating auspicious moments in our national history, and for enabling people far away from our great cities to play their own small part in the national story.

LOOKING BACK

A large congregation, including many from St Mary's, Woodbridge, came together on the first Sunday of August to celebrate the Virgin Mary, after whom our church was named. It was an uplifting service, with a sermon from Rev Peter Wintgens, which aimed to enable us to see Mary in a modern context and through modern eyes.

The service was followed by an outdoor lunch, with cheese, cold meats and a range of desserts and salads kindly provided by people attending. Our grateful thanks who all who contributed in this way. Thanks to them, we could almost have fed the 5000 of biblical

OUR TRIBUTE TO THE LATE QUEEN ELIZABETH 11

On the day after Her Majesty's death was announced there was a slow 96-part toll on one of our refurbished bells. Subsequently a book of condolence was placed in the church, and a quiet place for prayer and quiet contemplation set up in the sanctuary. People were invited to leave floral tributes in the porch. The church was due to remain open during day throughout the period mourning.

On Sunday 11th, just three days after the announcing of Her Majesty's passing, there was a special service at 5.30 pm. The service, movingly conducted by our Rector, Fr Nigel Prior, was supported by a representative number of villagers. including, reassuringly, a number of nonregulars, covering an age range of late 80s to infant, plus a couple of very wellbehaved dogs, a gathering which our late Queen would surely have appreciated.

Notes of matters considered at the Parish Council meeting held on 5 September 2022:

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Following the Council's adoption of the new Local Government Code of Conduct. various applications for dispensations in respect of Non-Registerable and Other Registerable Interests by Councillors were accepted, to be effective until May In line with guidance, it was resolved to delegate responsibility for the consideration of future applications to the Clerk.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

Four residents gave an update on matters at Sinks Pit and a resident commented on the amount of development in the Beacon Lane area of Martlesham Road.

ESC COMMUNITY **PARTNERSHIP MEETINGS**

The Chairman and Mr Garnham reported on their attendance at meetings, including that ESC Community Partnership funding may be available to support Road Safety Week in November

PUBLIC SEWER FOR THE STREET

Anglian Water had advised that the project was still in its early stages and may start in 2024.

SAFER VILLAGE DRIVING (SAVID) AND SPEED INDICATOR DEVICE (SID)

Mr Garnham would attend the SAVID meeting on 13 October. The SAVID funded SID would be displayed in September at the Village Hall and in The Street, then passed to Playford Parish Council for use during October.

HIGHWAYS

Various outstanding problems would be raised with SCC, including with County Councillor Elaine Bryce. A resident had confirmed that they would again spread sand each side of the level crossing over the winter, if required.

FOOTPATHS

A report was received from the Wardens and the Council thanked them for their including installing QR code plaques on SCC posts. SCC was due to cut two footpaths which it appeared had been missed previously.

DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLORS' REPORTS

It was resolved to make formal complaint to ESC regarding the non-determination of three applications submitted in 2021 to extend working hours at the site.

SIZEWELL C

Following the grant of consent, the developers had advised that they were contacting residents regarding the installation of noise attenuation fencing on a site-by-site basis.

PARISH CHRISTMAS CARD

It was resolved not to incur the expense of sending parishioners a Christmas card this year.

WELCOME LEAFLET

It was resolved to prepare a new leaflet to welcome residents.

WEBSITE

Various updates are in hand, including adding photographs of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee events and publishing the digitised minutes of Parish Meeting and Council minutes since 1894.

FINANCE

Income and Expenditure

Income had been received from the return of a loan to purchase supplies for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee event and from Playford Parish Council as a contribution to the cost of insuring the new SID. Expenditure for the Clerk's salary for August to October, PAYE and expenses, to SCC for the digitising of Parish Council minute books and an increase in Asset insurance between July and September was approved, totalling £2,243.93.

Her Majesty's faith was one which guided her through her years, and was a rock on which she built. She is now at rest with God, to whom she has devoted her life. How can we be sure?



These are condensed notes of the proceedings of the Playford Parish Council meeting held 7th September 2022.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Co. Cllr Elaine Bryce sent apologies as she was unable to attend and concerns were voiced. Elaine's written report is appended to the full minutes on the PC website.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Dist. Cllr Colin Hedgley's report is appended to the full minutes on the PC website. Briefly, Colin added that East Suffolk's campaign "Ease the Squeeze" is the current most important issue at the moment and it is aiming to put people in need of financial help in touch with those who can help them. SC Norse is short of operators to collect rubbish and is having difficulty in recruiting staff. A campaign to help people to recycle waste items in the correct bins is also underway as this can waste a significant amount of resources.

ACTION POINT REVIEW

- Progress on C324 traffic priority problems is still lacking Co Cllr Elaine Bryce has urged Traffic Manager David Chenery for a solution and for advice on signage for Church Lane to deter heavy traffic as this is still unresolved.
 - No further progress reported from

Anglian Water who has been asked to check out the constant water flow down the bottom end of Church Lane.

 SC Norse will clear the drainage ditch bordering Butts Road, outside the village hall sometime in late September or early October.

See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details of these items.

FINANCE

Payments were authorised to Zurich for annual insurance costs, for the Clerk's salary for July and August, tax to HMRC and for stationery expenses. The Bank reconciliation was agreed and the budget for 2022-23 is on track. The quarterly report on Internal Controls was unanimously agreed and signed by the Chairman and Clerk

HIGHWAYS

We are still awaiting David Chenery's views on new signage for traffic priority issues on the C324 as above. The new shared SIDs device was used in Playford for the whole of August, is now in Lt Bealings for September and will be back in Playford for October. Footpaths 9 & 13 which cross the railway line near Lux Farm will be closed overnight on 4th-5th October for essential safety work.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Locality grant funds of £5861 were received in July and consultant Ian Poole is now working towards the completion of the Plan. A list of Non-Designated

Heritage Assets in Playford was forwarded to him for inclusion.

PLANNING MATTERS

Application DC/22/1794/FUL Single storey side and front extension to The Old House, Bransons Lane is still awaiting a decision by ESC Planners

Application DC/22/1156/FUL Archway Piggeries – this application has now been passed subject to retrospective engineering permission being obtained for the earth levelling operation that was carried out earlier this year.

ESC Enforcement Officer is monitoring the numbers of cars being parked at a premises in Hill Farm Road and will report back to the parish council in due course.

OTHER MATTERS

- •Playford Toddler Group is in need of volunteers to help keep it running details will be circulated around the local parishes.
- •The new oak tree on the playing field has survived the recent drought, thanks to the regular watering schedule.
- •A request to hire the playing field in September was sanctioned.
- •Quotes are to be obtained for the work required to repair broken paving slabs forming the base of the bottle bank.
- •There is still a vacancy for an additional councillor on the PC.

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
