

have just spent some time in Cambridge on Granny duty. My four-yearold grandson who has just started school needed collecting in the middle of town at 3.15pm. It was a military exercise to collect his sister from nurserv, catch the bus complete with pushchair, toddler and tasty snacks into town. Once there we followed a stream of mums and pushchairs past shops and university buildings to a small corner of Cambridge where his overcrowded primary school was situated. Here I fought my way though a barrage of mums who flooded through the single school gate when it was unlocked, and hoped that I could spot him among lots of other small people, all clutching school bags and looking rather similar! Thanks to the snacks I had remembered from his father's school days. energy flowed to arms and legs and we all achieved the return journey with remarkable ease. It took me back more vears than I can remember, but it was also interesting to note how many older people were collecting children. I didn't stand out but was one of a crowd.

Grandparent's day is on 3rd October and there are 14 million of us in the UK. or to put it another way, one adult churchgoer in every four is a grandparent. When my children were young their grandparents were retired with time on their hands and although they lived at some distance they could make frequent visits. Today half the grandparents in the UK are under 65, many are still working, and a staggering 64% of them care for their grandchildren for an average of 16 hours a week. This means that many grandparents have had to reduce their own working hours to care for their grandchildren. A huge commitment. Becoming a grandmother/ father can take us by surprise, it did me and I have heard several prospective grandmothers echo my own feelings "that I am not ready to be a granny". May I recommend "The Good Granny Guide" by Jane Fearnley- Whittingstall. It is a wonderfully entertaining insight into the joys and pitfalls of being a granny. It is terribly important to know for instance whether you rank as number one or number two granny, and offers help with the most difficult task of all..... which is to keep your mouth shut tight, even if you are itching to offer advice.

Changes in society are a significant concern for many grandparents. Issues such as a relaxed attitude to discipline, and the amount of time spent on computers are real worries. The generation gap seems enormous at such times. Some schools though offer us grandparents a chance to learn new techniques such as computer skills. However it can work both ways. Often a story about when Grandad was a young boy can be a memorable history lesson and hearing something of their grandparents' world can help bridge the generation gap for the children. It can be a problem for Christian grandparents, who are concerned about passing on their faith, but there are opportunities, we can share our experiences, read a bedtime bible story, and answer questions when asked. Most of all we can pray for them. They might even be allowed to come to church when on a family visit.

Despite the lack of energy being a grandparent can be an enjoyable experience. When it becomes more of a chore then there are agencies that can help. The Church Army is running conferences this autumn on grandparenting, in an effort to sustain grandparents and the Grandparents Association also runs support groups. Well I must have done a good job; I have been booked for a couple more school runs!

For the first time in their 80 year history, Ipswich Gilbert & Sullivan Society are this year presenting their annual stage show in both Woodbridge and Bury St Edmunds.

The Gondoliers, with words and music by the famous duo WS Gilbert and Arthur Sullivan, marks the Society's 80th anniversary this year as a repeat of the opening show of 1930 - however, this version will be a modern take on the classic operetta; the story remains the same and the well-loved songs and melodies are all there, but vou'll find some interesting parallels and up-dated jokes amongst Gilbert's own comedy. The story is set in Venice where two brothers live, Marco and Giuseppe. They are happy being gondoliers until one day an imposing stranger announces they are not, in fact, brothers but that one of them is the only sonand-heir of the late king of Barataria. Precisely which of the brothers is a king and which a gondolier is unfortunately a mystery. It is doubly inconvenient when they discover that the king, whichever he is, was married in infancy to the daughter of a Spanish duke - as only half an hour earlier, the brothers were both married to two local Venetian girls. Being forced to leave their new wives behind, the gondoliers go off to Barataria, set up a republican kingdom, where all are equal, and they reign in a coalition government - but surely this can't go on for ever?

ST MARY'S

Not much of a problem this month with the theme for the preamble. The Pope's visit has thrust the question of religion to the top of the conversational agenda. Whether or not one is catholic, indeed. whether or not one is Christian, the fact that there has been a more-or lesscivilised debate about relative values the values of faith, the values of secularity and the way in which they interrelate and can be inter-dependent, is something that we should welcome. I suspect that most people found the Pope's visit of greater interest than they had expected. Certainly the tens of thousands of Roman Catholics who greeted him showed great solidarity, respect, and, indeed, love, whatever contrary message the protesters of various shades may have been trying to convey. The voice of religion has been heard more loudly in recent weeks, and its case has been well advocated.

LOOKING BACK

U3A VISITS

We have welcomed two parties of U3A visitors in the past month. Both groups

seem to have enjoyed their visits. They were given a talk on the history of the church and then looked around the treasures of the church. As ever, the wood carvings attract particular attention and admiration. One interesting comment to emerge was that the Seckford memorial can surely not, in its entiretv. date back to Tudor times -the central feature, with the coat of arms, may well do, but the surround looks decidedly neo-classical, particularly the Doric columns and pediment (the triangular form at the top of the monument) -any further opinions welcomed. Such visitors challenge the uncertain architectural knowledge of your churchwarden.

This took place on Saturday September 11th. Unfortunately it clashed with a number of other events, such as school speech days, so the number of participants was severely limited. We do urge all villagers to maintain a high level of vigilance and to notify the police and/or a member of the PCC is they notice suspicious behaviour. We are cheered to see the frequent signature of local police patrols in our Visitors' Book. so we are not alone in maintaining such a vigil.

MAINTENANCE

A two-man team from Elix visited the church on August 25th and spent all

morning completely clearing out all the drains and gutters. They did a very thorough job. House-owners will know only too well how thorough completion of these tasks is an essential way of keeping damp problems at bay.

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes from the Little Bealings Parish Council Meeting held on 13 September 2010

PARISH PLAN ACTIONS

The views of the other Parish Councils in the Joint Parish Plan were awaited in respect of the Village Hall Trust's request for the release of the parish's share of the remaining funding for the installation of glass recycling bins and/ or lighting improvements at Bealings

Village Hall. The Village Hall Management Committee (VHMC) now preferred to use the funding to install a lamp post and infra-red light in the dark corner of the car park, especially as payments for recycled glass had been reduced; it would take 10 years to recoup the initial outlay incurred in providing a plinth, fencing and bins. The Parish Plan data would be interrogated to ascertain parishioners' preference for lighting or recycling facilities. The Parish Council's powers to install lighting in public places would be researched. The VHMC was also consulting a local resident on the liahtina.

PLANNING

Tim Baker of R & P Baker, the owners of the redundant Grove Farm buildings, had advised the Council that they were in discussions with SCDC over a requirement for the site to be allocated for housing development in the local plan before any planning application would be considered. In consequence they were not in a position to prepare any plans for consideration.

APPLICATIONS

C10/1732: Hawkridge, Playford Road, Little Bealings

Erection of new detached open fronted garage and new glazed porch, formation of gable end and vertical boarded finish to bungalow: SCDC had approved this application.

C10/0554: Finches Hill, The Street – Revised: Build enclosed swimming pool and enclosure on land forming part of plot at present listed as use. Change use to domestic for whole site. Build bund no more than 2m high to the north of the enclosure from the spoil excavated from the pool site. SCDC had been asked to advise on the works being undertaken at the property following the withdrawal of this application.

VILLAGE PHYSICAL LIMITS BOUNDARY (PLB)

Keith Beaumont reported on an information evening arranged by SCDC. It was agreed to concur with SCDC's suggestion that an area of the parish designated an Area to be Protected from Development should be removed from the PLB and other small changes made to rationalise the boundary. There was a presumption against development outside the PLB, with some exceptions.

No police representative had been able to attend. There had been one reported crime in the parish, a fraud involving cold call telephoning. The future direction of the 12PT group and its links to SNT priorities and processes would be considered at a meeting on 29 October.

BEALINGS SCHOOL PARKING

A copy of the School Travel Plan had been received from the School, but it was out of date and beyond its review date of March 2009. It was agreed to ask the School to update the Plan, especially acknowledging that parking for parents was now provided at the Village Hall. No comments on raising funds to deal with on-going surface repair of the car park had been received. Suffolk ACRE was continuing to advise the VHMC in respect of funding sources.

HIGHWAYS:

Mr Ball had finished the footpath cutting for the year within SCC's agreed budget and SCC had commented that the paths were in good order. The Fynn Valley footpath signpost and pot holes in Holly Lane/The Street had been reported for repair. SCC would be asked to comment on the standard of the resurfacing work in Playford Road. Works by SCC to improve the Church and Playing Field footpaths were awaited.

FINANCE

The external auditors had completed the audit for 2009/10 and not raised any matters of concern. The annual return was approved and the end of the audit would be advertised as required. Cheques were signed for Mr Ball for footpath cutting and for the Parish Council's insurance policy premium. It was agreed not to renew the subscription to the Local Councils Update publication.
