"THE PEACE OF THE LORD BE ALWAYS WITH YOU"

My son asked me to help him with his RS homework this morning. I was just back from church & had preached on the importance of forgiveness in our communities & the presence of God. The question he wanted help with was "Can you stop extremism?" It raised a number of supplementary questions for me – What is extremism? Does it always involve violence? How do we judge which ideologies have become extremist?

The world news has been very disturbing in recent months. The war in Syria has gone on for years & caused the displacement of hundreds of thousands who are now living in refugee camps. We have seen pictures of Palestinian towns being shelled. YouTube has carried horrific images & the situation in the Middle East feels unstable. The fighting in the Ukraine has reawakened fears of Russia's military might. Meanwhile conflicts rumble on in the CAR, Southern Sudan, Congo & Afghanistan.

This year is of course the 100th anniversary of the start of WW1. The suffering inflicted on all sides by the 4 years of attrition continues to shock us. Although we are blessed to live in a beautiful & secure part of the country, we are aware that the world is a violent place.

Week by week in our churches we pray for peace. We offer each other a greeting "The peace of the Lord be always with you", we pray for peace & justice in places of conflict & the services end with a blessing that "the peace of God which passes all understanding" be upon all present. For a number of us the practice of silent prayer, Christian meditation or mindfulness is about finding an inner peace based on stillness & the awareness of God's presence.

I have found the world news in the last few months very worrying & the RS question difficult to answer as well as tricky to interpret. Desmond Tutu who campaigned for justice during apartheid said

"Good is stronger than evil; love is stronger than hate; light is stronger than darkness; life is stronger than death. Victory is ours, through him who loves us"

St Francis of Assisi is remembered on 4th October each year. He wrote a wonderful prayer which it is impossible to live out in our strength alone but asks God to help us & sparkles as a pattern for how to live peaceably.

Lord, make me an instrument of Thy peace;

Where there is hatred, let me sow love;

Where there is injury, pardon; Where there is error, the truth; Where there is doubt, the faith; Where there is despair, hope; Where there is darkness, light; And where there is sadness, joy.

O Divine Master,

Grant that I may not so much seek To be consoled, as to console; To be understood, as to understand; To be loved as to love.

For it is in giving that we receive; It is in pardoning that we are pardoned;

And it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen.

Like Archbishop Tutu I remain optimistic that conflict, injustice & suspicion will be overcome. God's answer to some prayers lies within us so if we pray for peace we must each seek to be loving, forgiving & peaceful.

FRIENDS OF GREAT BEALINGS CHURCH RESTORATION PROJECT

We have now heard from Suffolk Historic Churches Trust, and the Trust set up under the will of the late Lord Belstead. Both have agreed to fund the work, as has a private donor who has supported the church in the past. We also hope to hear from Viridor in the next few days. We are hugely grateful to all those who have signed the e-petition in support of this application which shows a substantial level of endorsement from the parish and beyond. Meanwhile estimates from three builders have been received and our architects have selected a preferred contractor. The PCC meets on 24th September and at that meeting we hope to endorse the choice of builder, and, assuming we get a positive response from Viridor, give approval to start the work. We are keen to get the east wall done before the winter rains cause further deterioration. In the next Newsletter we hope to provide a full update on the project once we know the full extent of funding support we have been able to achieve.

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 8 September 2014

PLANNING

TRUCKS R US PROPOSAL AT SINKS PIT

Before the meeting the agent for a future application by Trucks R Us for use of a part of Sinks Pit for the sale and hire of lorries and vans explained the proposal. It would involve a replacement building accommodating 20 office workers and a maintenance shed, wash-down area and parking. Hours of operation for the maintenance, sale and hire of vehicles would be 7am – 7.30pm Monday – Friday and 7am – 1pm on Saturdays. There was concern about the noise which would be generated and possible applications for other areas of the site.

There was also concern about public access, as walkers used a route which is not a recorded public right of way. Please contact the Parish Council if you walk in the area and consider that your use could contribute to a claim to SCC that an additional public footpath exists across the site.

DC/14/2530/FUL: THE PINES, MART-LESHAM ROAD: EXTENSIONS AND AL-TERATIONS

It was agreed there was no objection to this application.

DC/14/2585/FUL: LEAWOOD HOUSE, SANDY LANE, LITTLE BEALINGS: TO RAISE THE LEVEL OF THE EXISTING ROOF AND RE-COVER USING NATURAL SLATES, ERECTION OF A FRONT EN-TRANCE PORCH, NEW FLAT ROOF IN LIEU OF SINGLE STOREY HIPPED ROOF AND OVERCLADDING OF EXTERNAL WALLS

There were concerns from neighbours about the impact, but it was agreed there was no objection to this application.

C/12/2483 FINCHES HILL, THE STREET: CERTIFICATE OF LAWFUL USE EXISTING FOR A SWIMMING POOL ENCLOSURE

BUILT UNDER PERMITTED DEVELOP-MENT LAW PREVIOUSLY ATTACHED TO DWELLING BUT SINCE 02/12/12 NOT ATTACHED.

The Planning Inspectorate had refused the appeal against SCDC's decision to reject this application. SCDC would be asked what action would follow.

EAOW3

The proposed accesses to the cabling corridor in the parish were considered excessive and inappropriate. The obvious access was from Holly Lane at the point where the corridor crossed the road anyway.

STABLES OPPOSITE BRIMAR, THE STREET: CHANGE OF USE TO RIDING ESTABLISHMENT

The Village Hall Management Committee had agreed to resolve concerns about parking by giving temporary permission for parking at the Village Hall. This would be reviewed early next year. SCDC was considering some information from the applicant and had not yet determined the application.

IPSWICH GARDEN SUBURB DEVELOP-MENT

It was noted that the impact on road infrastructure was of concern to the parishes nearby. Ipswich Borough Council would be asked for information on their discussions on other new development proposals to the north east of the borough.

FLOODING IN MARTLESHAM ROAD

It was agreed to ask SCC to consider improving soakaways to resolve this issue, as salt spray was affecting trees at a property.

HALL ROAD CROSSROADS

Both the police and SCC would be asked to consider the impact of a new green box on the junction which had decreased poor visibility still further.

FOOTPATHS

Cutting had been completed for the year by Mr Ball, with a third cut having been necessary on some routes.

SPEEDING TRAFFIC

SCC had advised that it would consider if The Street met the criteria for a 20mph speed limit. A resident had obtained details of speeding offences along Martlesham Road where 18 motorists had been caught speeding between 18 December 2013 and 15 July 2014, driving at speeds of between 35 and 38mph.

ELECTORAL REVIEW OF SUFFOLK COASTAL

Despite objections from all of the parishes affected, the Electoral Commission had confirmed that Little Bealings would be in a new ward with Great Bealings, Bredfield and Woodbridge.

POLICE

PSCO reported that there had been no reported crime in the parish during August, although nearby break ins to secure property in Rushmere were of concern.

FINANCE

The accounts for 2013/14 had been approved by the external auditors, with no issues arising, and the closure of the audit had been advertised. Cheques were signed for the Clerk's salary, Mr Ball for footpath cutting, PAYE and the premium for the Council's insurance.

PUBLIC SEWER IN THE STREET

Anglian Water had agreed that there was an issue to be addressed, but had not yet decided upon the proposed means of resolution.

NEXT MEETING

The next scheduled meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday 3 November 2014. During the first 15 minutes of all Council meetings the public are welcome to raise any matters of concern with Councillors. The public may also speak for a maximum of 3 minutes on any item on the Agenda at the beginning of that item.

ACTION POINT REVIEW

Blocked drain on RH side of Church Lane going eastwards has still not been fixed, clerk will chase. The STOP sign at exit of village hall car park has now been repaired. Clerk will also contact Highways for an update on Byway 19. Sand covering the kerb near Clematis Cottage in Boot Street has still not been cleared, despite having been reported several times – clerk will follow this up. See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details of these items.

COUNCILLOR'S REPORTS

Both County Councillor, Peter Bellfield and District Councillor, Steven Hudson were unable to attend due to ill health.

POLICE REPORT

Police apologies for absence were received. PCSO Justin Moss sent in a report saying that there were no recorded crimes in Playford in June or July this year and that current police priorities are in tackling anti-social behaviour in parts of Kesgrave & Rushmere St Andrew and in monitoring speeding within the districts IP5 & IP6. For more details, see PCSO Moss's full report appended to the Minutes on the website.

FINANCE

A cheque was authorised for the clerk's expenses. The budget was reviewed and it was agreed more should be spent on improving the look of the village. The Annual Report was approved and accepted and issues arising were dealt with. "View-Only" access to the Bank account is now in place and we hope online transactions will be authorised soon.

GOVERNANCE & ACCOUNTABILITY PROCEDURES FOR LOCAL COUNCILS

A new edition of this publication was produced this year. More time is needed for councillors to fully digest it and it will be discussed at the next meeting.

LAIS1367 – CHANGES TO RIGHTS OF WAY

All public rights of way must be registered by 1st Jan 2016 after which time, no alterations can be accepted. The definitive footpath map for the Playford area needs to be studied carefully to achieve this.

AMENDMENTS TO COUNCIL STANDING ORDERS

Laws on photography & recording as applied to council meetings have been changed to include live streaming and real time. This has been incorporated into Playford's existing Standing Orders.

OTHER MATTERS

Individual Electoral Registration now means that individuals rather than householders have responsibility for their own details being correctly recorded. If you have not had confirmation that your details have been successfully changed to the new system ring 01394 444324 for advice. This is especially relevant if you rely on a postal or proxy vote.

Funds for a basketball & net for the playing field are now being applied for from the Outdoor Playspace Scheme.

We hope to obtain funds from the Enabling Communities scheme for a new bench and grit bin on the Green.

Quotes are also being sought for repainting white railings on the river bridge.

A booking has been agreed for wedding celebrations at the parish hall on 11th July 2015 to include use of the playing field.

Ongoing issues with the bottle bank continue as other rubbish is being deposited nearby. It was agreed to fund another wheelie bin to avert this problem.

CORRESPONDENCE RECEIVED

We have been advised that initial planning permission is being sought for the development of 80 houses on land to the west of Westerfield Road. Ipswich. Outline planning permission is also proposed on land to the south of Westerfield Road for a mixed development of 815 dwellings with a district centre of shops, financial services, restaurants, pubs & takeaways. Ipswich Borough Council has published its Draft Ipswich Urban Character Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) for public consultation between 8th Aug – 25th Sept 2014. Local Boundary Commission final recommendations have been received and the newly proposed Fynn Valley ward will comprise Playford, Swilland, Tuddenham. Westerfield & Witnesham.

AOB

It was agreed to purchase a sign asking people not to park cars in front of the gates to the playing field as this prevents emergency vehicles from entering.

It was proposed that we consider a blue plaque for Anna Airey's cottage.
