I was struck by a headline in the August edition of Country Life, which read: A church is the heart of every village. Those days have gone, but the churches – and perhaps equally importantly, the community values they represent, remain - a historical symbol of the days when villages were more closely knit and identifiably independent, structured communities. As our world becomes ever more urbanized, there is still something special about our villages. Neighbourliness is more easily achieved there than in our towns, and, whether or not you are a regular attender at church services, or even religiously inclined, our churches still serve, or can serve a function. The buildings, bequeathed to us by generations through the centuries, may not be regularly full of worshippers, but they are still frequently the well-attended venue for weddings, funerals, memorial services, baptisms, special services commemoratives.

These churches may not still be considered by many to be the heart of the village, but they still serve a valuable function in bringing people together and in reminding us of the history of the places where we have chosen to live. Let's treasure them, whatever our religious persuasion. They are a special part of what constitutes a village.

Bealings Plant Sale 2017 – Saturday April 22nd.

This may seem a long way ahead, particularly as you may still be eating this year's crop of vegetables, and the autumn flowers are still in bloom. However – October and November bring all the tidying up for the winter, together with all the opportunities to split clumps of flowers, to rescue unexpected, unintended selfseeded plants etc.

This month we include a profile of Mike Bettell from Little Bealings. The justification for this is Mike's talk on September 16th about his experiences of being a pilot in the RAF during the Cold War. That event raised money for the Little Bealings Church Roof, but we thought that it would be interesting, particularly for those who were not there, to know a little more of Mike's background.

Mike's career spanned much of the time of the so-called, "Cold War" period when the Soviet bloc faced the NATO allies in a tense stand-off which finally eased in 1991. He joined the RAF in 1962 and spent five years at RAF Wattisham flying the Lightnings of Treble One and 29 squadrons. In 1969 he converted to Phantoms, which he flew for much of his career. He was promoted to Wing Commander in 1979 when he commanded 64 Sgn and was awarded an OBE in 1981. He then moved on to be personal staff officer to the C-in-C in Germany. As a Group Captain he commanded RAF Waddington from 1984-1985, which operated the Vulcan and the Nimrod AEW, during which time he was appointed ADC to Her Majesty the Queen. 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

Following on from our last email, you may have seen today's launch of the new national power cut phone line -105 – to help people contact the company that looks after their electricity network. This would be UK Power Networks for London, the East and South East of England.

The number, which is available to electricity customers in England, Scotland and Wales, will enable people to report or get information about power cuts as well as report damage to electricity power lines and substations that could put themselves, or someone else, in danger. 105 is funded and delivered by the electricity network operators, and is a first for the UK's energy industry. PARISH COUNCIL REPAIRS TO BOOT STREET BRIDGE

The Bridge is a Scheduled Ancient Monument and as such SCC must comply with the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979. This act requires them to apply to the Secretary of State for prior written permission to carry out works to the structure. This is known as Scheduled Monument Consent (SMC). In order to comply with conditions of the consent the designs and materials used must be approved by Historic England. SCC have been given consent to carry out the repairs to the Southern parapet using Soft Suffolk Red bricks and a lime mortar. Soft Suffolk Reds are made to order and there is a long lead in for the bricks to be manufactured. This has made the earliest start date fall during the Winter months and unfortunately due to cold weather it is not possible to lay lime mortar in the winter. Therefore. SCC will be postponing these works until Spring 2017. Due to the delayed start they are currently investigating the possibility of installing a more substantial temporary barrier system to increase protection to the Southern parapet and watercourse. The works, when undertaken in Spring 2017, will last twoweeks and will require a full road closure. During this time SCC will be able to carry out brickwork repairs to the Northern parapet also.

EMERGENCY PLAN

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Following the statutory public consultation carried out by SCDC, an independent examiner has now been appointed to review the Plan to ensure it meets all relevant statutory and procedural requirements. Once this review has been carried out and any changes recommended by the examiner agreed, the Plan can proceed to a referendum. It is still hoped that this will take place before Christmas this year.

WAR MEMORIAL

Thanks to the generosity of Paul Norris the war memorial has been refurbished and the old concrete base replaced with stone slabs that match the memorial itself. This excellent job has been done at no cost to the Council, and we are most grateful to Paul and his team. The memorial will now be in great shape for this year's Remembrance Sunday and of course for the centenary of the Armistice in 2018.

The PCC now has a vision for the future of the church, and we will provide the energy and the commitment to realise that vision. £3000 pa spread across a whole community is not a great deal of money, particularly if much of it can be raised by arranging events that not only bring enjoyment but which also bring villagers together. That, alongside an increase in planned giving, will see us though, and ensure that, not only do we continue to have a priest in our midst, but also that those many events and services which commemorate the rites of passage and which celebrate our national and local history will continue to be held in St Marv's. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

Noise and Development at Kesgrave Quarry A resident drew attention to new plant at the site, which was larger thought to be larger than previous equipment, and Mr Hunter advised what could now be seen at the site. It was thought that perhaps there were new stock piles and lorry movements, and activity on the west site of the site. Another resident had advised that noise had reached an intolerable level at times recently, and there was concern about concrete dust.

It was resolved to ask SCC if the new equipment required planning permission and to advise the resident that SCDC Environmental Health officers should be contacted about the noise and dust.

KESGRAVE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN AREA DESIGNATION APPLICATION

Many residents had copied the Council on their objection to SCDC about the inclusion of land in the parish in the Area application submitted by Kesgrave and Rushmere St Andrew Councils. It was resolved that formal complaint be made to SCDC about its acceptance of the application, the inadequacy of its contact with the Council and its lack of consultation in the parish on the application. The letter would warn of a legal challenge should SCDC determine the application. It was also resolved to consider again whether a Neighbourhood Plan for Little Bealings would provide any additional protection against development in the parish.

EAOW 1 and 3 PROJECTS

NOTES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL Details had been received of changes to cable corridor for EAOW 1 and 3 only. No change to the overall width of the cable works for EAOW1 was anticipated and the cable route may be less than had been originally anticipated for the installation of three projects.

20 MPH SPEED LIMIT FOR THE STREET

County Councillor Robin Vickery confirmed that he had allocated £5,000 from his 2016/17 budget to this project. This would enable the project to proceed and SCC would be asked to produce a design for the scheme for consideration by the Council and residents.

SAVID

Ms Head reported that the format of SAVID (Safer Village Driving) meetings would be changing and the group would visit member villages in rotation. A visit to Little Bealings was planned during 2018.

FOOTPATH CUTTING

The second cut had been completed and an invoice received from Mr Fear. SCC had been asked to provide the agreed funding.

DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORTS

District Councillor Colin Hedgley reported on new Health and Wellbeing funding, progress on the new SCDC headquarters, and that his locality budget had been increased to £6,000 for 2016/17. SCDC was running a prize draw to encourage Council Tax to be paid by direct debit. County Councillor Robin Vickery reported on devolution proposals for Suffolk and Norfolk, Raising the Bar Community grant funding and an 'Adopt a Post Office' scheme involving police officers and trading standards officers would have reached her 100th. birthday.

PARISH COUNCIL

These are condensed notes of the proceedings of the Playford Parish Council meeting held 7th September 2016. A full version of the minutes appears on the website: *www.playford.org.uk*

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

District Councillor Robert Whiting outlined happenings at SCDC, the offices are being moved to the new premises at Riduna House, Melton in the autumn. There may be spare furniture available for parish councils from the former premises. BT has a scheme to help fund provision of Fibre Broadband to smaller communities and additional help may be available from District or County budgets.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Robin Vickery introduced himself as the new Co. Councillor. Devolution has been out for consultation and the results are now with the government, a decision on this will be taken by Co. Council on 2rd Nov 2016. Raising the Bar community grants are available until 29th Dec 2016. The Police have a pilot scheme "Adopt a Post Office" aiming to highlight scams conducted against older people. More details are contained in Robin's report which will be appended to the full minutes on the parish website.

ACTION POINT REVIEW

The possibility of putting a gate across Byway19 at the Playford end was discussed – it would be expensive in legal fees to change the designation of this path. Joan Metcalfe will chase progress of the application to register the FP across fields between C330 & C3311.

Permanent fix for temporary repair to broken tarmac at the junction of Butts Road/ Brook Lane is still outstanding. Build-up of silt on C324 – clearance of this has been requested again. Clerk has written to the landowner requesting overhanging brambles to be trimmed back from the roadside of C324 opposite Clematis Cottage. Overgrown vegetation affecting FP's 9 & 13: this task is still with the contractors.

See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details of these items.

FINANCE

Payments have been authorised for the and The clerk's expenses salarv. remaining funds of £543 have been received towards cost of installing the basketball post on the plaving field. The clerk's salary was discussed and an increment of two points up the scale to SCP 21 was agreed to commence from 1st Jan 2017 - the number of hours worked per week is to be loaged by the clerk and reviewed at the next meeting. It was agreed that the budget is on track and the Financial Regulations will be reviewed at the next meeting. The accounts for year ended 31st March 2016 have passed the External Audit and are available to be viewed by appointment at the clerk's house until 23rd Sept 2016. Minor issues have been rectified.

HIGHWAYS MATTERS

The ditches outside the Village Hall in Butts Road have been dug deeper and cleared of debris and those in Hill Farm Road will be dealt with soon. Missing grid from a drain in Butts Road will be reported to Highways. Potholes in general may be reported directly to SCC Highways online and the public is being encouraged to do this.

OUTDOOR PLAYSPACE PROJECT

The newly strengthened bar for the basketball backboard has been fitted but it was not thought necessary to replace the net.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

A resolution was passed by the parish council on 22nd Aug 2016 to proceed with a Neighbourhood Plan for Playford and the clerk will contact SCDC Planning Dept. It is hoped that District Councillor Robert Whiting will be able to assist with funds from his Enabling Communities budget for this. At the public meeting held on 22nd Aug 2016 the boundary proposals put forward by Kesgrave Town Council their Neighbourhood Plan were for unanimously objected to by a show of hands from 34 members of the public and all councillors present, as the plans included land in both Plavford and Lt Bealings parishes. It may be possible for Playford to join forces with the Village Ward of Rushmere St Andrews in a joint Neighbourhood Plan - this would have advantage of more volunteers the available to assist with the groundwork.

OTHER MATTERS

A reply has been received from All Saints Kesgrave PCC to Playford PC's letter requesting that the signage at the cemetery should be changed to reflect the fact that this is on Playford land. They maintain that it would be very difficult to change the name on the sign as it appears on many legal documents and certificates. This matter will be further discussed at the next PC meeting. An ash tree opposite the junction of Butts Road and the lane leading to Lux Farm has shed a large branch and is potentially Clerk dangerous. will contact the arboriculturist at SCDC for advice.

PLANNING

It was requested that planning

applications DC/16/2137/FUL and DC/16/2698/FUL (both pertaining to Airys Cottage) be referred to the Planning Committee at SCDC but these have been referred back to SCDC Planning Office by the Sub-Committee. It is anticipated that these will now be passed subject to conditions.

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


