Yet somehow, up until now, we have never thought that it is our problem, here in this over-rained upon island of ours. Our pictures, thanks to Gary Farmer, are all taken in this locality. The problem is staring us in the face, as we look around us, as we take our daily walks through the field, or look out on to our gardens.



Drought can and does affect us. It can and probably will get worse. Collectively we see evidence that the climate-change pundits have been telling us a truth, rather than just trying to scare us.



Rivers are drying up. Lawns are brown, scorched, and arid. It's time to buy shares in grass seed producing companies, as bonanza, re-seeding all those dead for lawns.



Crops are withering in the fields and will have very low yields, and all that on top of the grain crisis emanating from the Ukrainian war. Hose pipe bans are imminent, and many miles will have been plodded by people with watering cans trying to keep their vegetables worth eating, and their flowers alive. And let's not mention the hoses. Our lovely green gardens and fields and hedgerows are becoming unrecognisable. THE TALE OF THE SOLDIER BOY

For weeks now the news has been full of war, hunger, economic disaster and disease. I thought we could have a little heart-warming tale in our magazine.

It starts in the summer of 1946: the war was over and I had just started school at the beginning of the Spring Term. We were told we were having something called a Sports Day and we were going to the local playing field. We were very excited when the day arrived, and several 'crocodiles' of mixed infants marched down to the field. There we were to play all sorts of games. Halfway through the morning we saw a Jeep arriving on the field followed by soldiers marching. These we learned were Canadian soldiers, who had been billeted in two big houses in the village. The chief said words cannot man some - 1 remember. Afterwards I learned they thanking everybody for welcome now they were going back to Canada. We were lined up to receive a present. The boys had a soldier doll, and the girls had a girl soldier doll. We also had a bag of chocolate powder for our Mums. My mum discovered a finger sized hole had mysteriously appeared in my bag! I was thrilled with the soldier doll who I called "Soldier Boy." He was new and he was mine, not second-hand, not handmade, not a hand me down, but new and mine. Looking back, I think, during the war years, Father Christmas got all his toys from Jumble Sales! I loved and cherished Soldier Boy until one day he was put away and more exciting things like Meccano sets took the place of soft toys.

Fifty years passed and I had the sad task, SUFFOLK which comes to many of us in middle age, encouraging a project called "Men's of sorting through the family home after Shed," where both men and women can tucked away in a drawer. He was in a sad also the dump, or did I keep him? I others. He was put in a drawer minus his tatty uniform.



Another twenty years passed; we had moved to Suffolk by this time. One evening I was talking to Toni Cornish, and we discovered we were both fans of the Repair Shop, a TV programme where treasured objects were brought back to their former glory. I told Toni about Soldier Boy and she immediately volunteered to restore him for me. Sometime later she brought him back, resplendent in new uniform and beret.

What a kindness to bring back cherished memories. What a marvellous thing to use a skill to bring back happy memories. World crises still go on, but I can look at Soldier Boy and recall happy times.

COMMUNITY ACTION is my mothers' death. I found Soldier Boy share their valuable practical skills, while building friendships, state, uniform in tatters and grubby with isolation and encouraging positive wellage. Should he go in the black bag for being through social interaction with

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

At the request of the Chairman, the applicant's agent for Planning Application DC/22/2330 was invited to provide further explanation regarding the plans for the replacement garage.

REPORT BY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR COLIN HEDGLEY (CH)- A report had been circulated to ClIrs and a full copy is attached to the minutes on the website; there were no questions from ClIrs. CH verbally reported that the ESC Chief Executive is leaving at the end of the year and a replacement is being sought. He reminded ClIrs that the elections for District Councillors will take place in May 2023.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

DC/22/2529/FUL- Aberfeldy, Grundisburgh Road – single storey rear extension, covered entrance and alterations. It was unanimously resolved to support this application

DC/22/2330/FUL - Cherry Tree Cottage, Seckford Hall Road - erection of extension to dwelling and erection of detached garage with annexe/holiday let above

The PC resolved to support the extension to the house, but further to the

information provided by the agent, Cllrs expressed concern regarding the size, construction materials and access for the replacement garage. The agent will refer these concerns to the applicant and report back before the application deadline.

DC/20/0902/OUT - Suffolk Constabulary HQ. Portal Avenue. Martlesham Heath outline application for demolition and removal of all necessarv buildings and structures to allow the residential development of 300 new dwellings with access from Avenue. It was unanimously resolved to object to this application on the grounds of traffic issue.

Decision Updates: DC/22/1517/CLE – Regency House – awaiting decision by ESC

Enforcement matters - Water Meadow - ENF/22/069/USE - This matter is now being dealt with by ESC. Unauthorised use is continuing, and the ESC Enforcement Officer is monitoring the site

For those who do make the service meaningful, and time -putting, then just have a chat with a creatively spent, but in other respects it is member of our PCC beforehand, and difficult to see how this level of support they'll try to tune you in, tentatively, to a can be sustainable in the long term, new Churches need people to survive and discover a dimension that enriches your thrive. In some ways churches ARE the life. people, and we have all too few of them.

We do our best to supplement income from services, by arranging events such as concerts, and are really grateful for all the support given to these, without which our financial position would be truly dire. As it is, the core activity of the church, its services, seem to be something alien to the prevailing social ethos. Other often commitments all too take precedence. That is the world we live in. But that has consequences. It costs some £12,000 per annum to keep our church open and alive as a place of worship. Half a dozen people per service cannot make that situation sustainable. So that's the negative part of this prologue.

Let's be more positive. We hear so often that the world around us is in a mess and may ourselves be part of the chorus of complaint. It is so easy to be sucked into that mood of despair. But just ask those who do go to church why they find it puts them in a different place, not just physically. but emotionally and conversationally, and that an hour spent thinking about things a little bit deeper than gas prices, wars, strikes, taxes, prices, food prices petrol can refreshing. It's not escapism. It's just about getting on to a different wavelength. For some that different wavelength may come from a walk in the country. For others, the exploration of deeper ideas, in a quiet space, a church, may have the same effect. Give it a go. We'll make you welcome and share thoughts with you. If it

Notes of matters considered at the Parish Council meetings held on 4 and 25 July 2022:

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Following the Council's adoption of the new Local Government Code of Conduct, applications from Ian Ransome and Helen Saagi for dispensations in respect of a non-registrable interest in Sinks Pit were accepted, with dispensations to be effective until May 2023

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

A resident gave an update on matters at Sinks Pit at the meeting on 4 July.

SPEED INDICATOR DEVICE

The SAVID funded SID was displayed in July at the Village Hall and in The Street and passed to Playford PC for use during August. Playford PC had contributed to the cost of the insurance.

NOTICEBOARD IN PLAYFORD ROAD

This had been paid for by the Plymouth Brethren and installed for the Council by a local resident, and the Council is grateful for the support.

PARISH BOUNDARY CHANGE

The proposed change to the boundary had a budget of £7,000 available for with Gt Bealings and Martlesham had projects, but this was for 26 parishes. been withdrawn by Martlesham PC.

ESC COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

The partnership had agreed three new priorities for its work of Roads and Traffic, Environmental Care and Covid Recovery.

WAR MEMORIAL WORKS

The Council's application for grant funding has been approved and a Faculty now enables the works to proceed. The works are scheduled to be carried out during the week commencing 19 September.

PC LAPTOP

The PCC had confirmed that it would like to receive the Council's old laptop, which would be professionally wiped, and a new hard drive installed.

SALC CODE OF CONDUCT TRAINING

The Chairman had attended this and passed details to Councillors, especially regarding the new requirement for a dispensation to speak in respect of a Non-Registrable Interest in a matter. National guidance was due to be published in the autumn.

DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLORS' REPORTS

District Councillor Colin Hedgley's report had been circulated and is available on the Council's website. He drew attention to various planning matters. County Councillor Elaine Bryce advised that she had a budget of £7,000 available for local projects, but this was for 26 parishes.

PLANNING POLICY

A response to the ESC consultation on the application of its 'cluster' policy which permitted development in the countryside was agreed.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS:

DC/22/2061/FUL Demolition of the existing High Rigg dwelling. Replacement with a new five-bedroom country house with a new driveway and highway access: Former High Rigg Martlesham Road

There was no objection to the renewal of this application but concerns about the safety of the new access by the railway crossing remained.

DC/22/2182/FUL Upgrade existing tennis court with fencing: Leawood House Sandy Lane

There was no objection to this application.

DC/22/1662/FUL Proposal: Construction of two detached single storey dwellings: Woodside, Martlesham Road

ESC has refused the application.

DC/22/2630/FUL: Construction of 1 no. new residential dwelling with detached garage in front of Marchwood: Marchwood, Martlesham Road

It was resolved to object to the application as the site was not a clearly identifiable gap in the highway and in view of the adverse impact on the street scene.

Re-consultation: DC/20/0902/OUT Outline Application (some matters reserved) – Demolition and removal of all necessary existing buildings and structures to enable the residential development for up to 300 no. new dwellings with access from Portal Avenue, associated open space and landscaping, drainage and infrastructure: Suffolk Constabulary Force Headquarters, Portal Avenue. Martlesham Heath

It was resolved that there was objection

to the development in view of the lack of up-to-date traffic survey data and modelling, especially the lack οf assessment of the impact on Little Bealings roads of displaced traffic seeking to avoid congestion created by the development on the A1214, and the lack of any proposed mitigation to address the impact.

THE ADMIRAL'S HEAD CAR PARK SURVEY

The survey returns had shown that, while there was support for the purchase of the car park by the Council, it was not sufficient to enable Compulsory Purchase to be pursued. The Council therefore reluctantly resolved that no further action be taken in the matter and the Council's right to bid be withdrawn.

this FINANCE

Accounts for 2021/22

The Certificate of Exemption had been returned to the external auditor and the period of public examination of the accounts had run between 22 June and 2 August.

The Council's support of £200 for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations at the Village Hall had been returned.

Income and Expenditure

Income had been received from the Plymouth Brethren for the purchase of a new noticeboard and from SAVID for the purchase of a new SID to be shared with Playford.

Expenditure for the Clerk's salary and PAYE and expenses, the purchase of the new SID, the new noticeboard, mobile phone, laptop and software was approved, totalling £4127,34. Mr Hunter would complete the first internal control quarterly report.

Bank and NS&I Accounts

Confirmation of the new signatories had been received from Barclays Bank. It was agreed to amend the signatories on the NS&I account to be Mr Ransome, Ms Saagi, Ms Head and Mrs Wilson. It was agreed to investigate a debit card on the Barclays account, given the increasing need to make purchases online.

KESGRAVE BENEFICE UKRAINE HUB – OUR SUMMER

Our benefice Ukraine hub was described on the BBC as inspiring, a 'model hub,' and it is certainly thriving with such a joyful buzz. Below are some summer highlights:

15 adults and 12 children received twice weekly English lessons throughout July/

August. Teaching and progress were superb, and pupils are now ready for the workplace/school. We were the sole provider of in-person English lessons to Ukrainians over the summer in the Ipswich/East Suffolk area but are happy to report that all families living in our benefice, and Great Bealings' benefice, were allocated a place on our course. A waiting list was compiled of families requiring lessons and living further afield, and we are now working with Ipswich churches to set up lessons for these families.

The children we worked with over the summer transformed into a wonderfully happy 'gang,' blossoming in friendship and confidence. We enjoyed watching them running together, laughing, playing hide and seek, riding bikes, just 'being children.' One mother said to me, 'These are the best English lessons, separating children and adults makes all the difference.' I can't thank you all enough for this; I give you my heart, you are helping my children, us, so much.'

In September, we continue with lessons for the children still without a school place, and with families who have arrived over the summer. Little and Great Bealings donated £837 towards Ukrainian English lessons, raised through the village Jubilee celebrations. We stayed within budget and have £50 left to start our autumn programme of lessons. Thank you Bealings! Your generosity has made such a difference to lives.

Emergency clothing was supplied to any refugees requiring help.

Six fantastic bikes from residents returned a sense of freedom. The joy on the teenagers' faces as they sped off was something to witness.

A family was taken on a day trip to Felixstowe by one of our volunteers. introduced to the amusement arcades and rides, and their teenagers' smiles returned. There have been shopping trips, Woodbridge trips, all helping our quests find their feet and settle.

50-60 people attend the hub each week; all have been welcomed, befriended, fed and supported. We are also a hotline for hosts who might otherwise feel isolated in their hosting, not knowing where to turn with auestions.

A family's bus fare was paid to enable them to attend English lessons before their financial help came through.

Via the hub, four laptops were given to for school work teenagers parishioners. The Church Army provided £1000+ worth of new school shoes. emergency field dressings was dropped off by EDF and we sourced an onward journey to Kyiv Military Hospital.

Six Ukrainian families were successfully matched to local hosts.

Shortly the hub will host an Employability course run by Suffolk Refugee Services. Our teaching is now slanted towards mock job interviews, and workplace and interview language.

Looking forward, we foresee a need for winter coats and shoes. We are also on





- Work on C324 traffic priority problems has ground to a halt. Co Cllr Elaine Bryce chasing Traffic Manager David Chenery to progress this and for advice on signage for Church Lane to deter heavy traffic as this is still a problem.
- SCC Highways has asked Anglian Water to check out the constant water flow down the bottom end of Church Lane and to investigate for leaks.
- •SC Norse is to be asked not to trim the verge in Hill Farm Road quite so often and to be reminded not to leave debris from trimmings in ditches. They will also be asked to clear the drainage ditch bordering Butts Road, outside the village hall.

FINANCE

A full version of the minutes appears on Payments were authorised for the Clerk's salary for May and June, tax to HMRC and for stationery expenses. Outstanding bill for SIDs pole is to be paid, having established that the PC is liable for this. The Bank reconciliation was agreed and the budget for 2022-23 was found to be on track. It was agreed that the clerk's salary should be raised by one point on the spine in respect of her annual salary appraisal. A review of the parish Standing Orders took place and it was agreed no changes were necessary.

HIGHWAYS

We are still awaiting David Chenery's approval for new signage for priority issues on the C324 as above. Local road without prior warning closures becoming problematic. A second SIDs device has been obtained by Lt Bealings PC and this will be shared wth Playford PC who will contribute to their insurance costs.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The Locality grant of £5861 has been agreed by Groundwork UK and funds credited to the PC's bank account within 3-5 working days. Consultant Ian Poole has been advised of this and can now go ahead with completing the Plan.

PLANNING MATTERS

Application DC/22/1794/FUL Single storey side and front extension to The Old House, Bransons Lane. This was rejected by the Parish Council as it was felt to be out of proportion with the rest of the house and PLAYFORD W.I. the flat roof would be detrimental to the character of the house.

Application DC/22/1156/FUL Archway Piggeries - the applicant has contacted the Parish Council requesting a site visit this would need to include the full council but it was felt it should wait until amended plans were received as objections to the former plans could not be withdrawn.

Update August 2022: Resubmitted plans for the above were considered by the PC and were supported subject to the necessary engineering permissions being obtained for the earth-levelling operations on the site and а satisfactory contamination report being received by Environmental Protection.

ESC Enforcement Officer has been advised of excessive numbers of cars being parked at premises in Hill Farm Road and will investigate.

OTHER MATTERS

- The new oak tree on the playing field is doing well, thanks to a regular watering schedule manned by councillors and volunteers.
- The Queen's Platinum Jubilee was a SUCCESS
- Two requests for hiring the playing field were sanctioned.
- Concrete forming the base of the bottle bank has broken up and will need repairing – this appears to be the reason the bins are not being replaced tidily in their enclosure after being emptied by Norse.
- •There is still a vacancy for additional councillor on the PC.

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

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
