# THE COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY: INCOME FOR OUR PARISH COUNCILS

CIL – the Community Infrastructure Levy - is a charge East Suffolk Council makes on new residential development. It is collected by ESC from developers and a proportion of the levy collected is passed to the local Parish Council to spend. It must be used specifically to improve infrastructure locally, to offset the impact of new development, and spent within 5 years of receipt.

As a result of recent new residential development in Little Bealings, the Parish Council has received CIL funding of £6,177.75. More may be received in October and subsequently. If you live in Little Bealings you will find a survey by the Parish Council enclosed in this edition of the Fynn Lark News. The Parish Council wants to know residents' views on how it should spend its CIL income. If you live in Little Bealings please do read the survey inside and respond – what are your priorities for services and facilities in Little Bealings?

# Magazine for the Parishes of Great & Little Bealings, Playford and Culpho

At present no CIL has become payable to Great Bealings or Playford Parish Councils and, should any be levied by ESC for development in Culpho (where there is no parish Council) ESC may decide where to spend it. The overriding requirement for spending CIL is that it is to be used for the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure or anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on the area. There is a list of items that qualify on ESC's website: https://www.eastsuffolk.gov.uk/assets/Planning/ Community-Infrastructure-Levy/Parish-Support/CIL-Parish-Guidance.pdf and it includes highways and public footpath works, village halls, litter bins and many more items.

This year Little Bealings Parish Council increased the donation it makes every year to support Bealings Village Hall and the John Belstead Playing Field from £750 to £1,000. However, in July the Council was approached by Bealings Village Hall Trust requesting that £5,000 of the CIL funding should be set aside to support the Trust's "Roof and Doors" Project, enabling it to qualify to apply for a grant of up to £50,000 from Valencia Communities Fund (as we are close to a recycling facility, the Masons Landfill Site at Great Blakenham).

The roof of Bealings Village Hall is leaking badly and urgently needs replacing, with current quotes of around £60,000. The Trust also needs to replace the rotting/ draughty wooden doors and make the entrance more accessible with automatic push button entrance and UPVC internal/external doors, which adds a further £26,000 to the total. The Trust has already secured pledges totalling £25,608 towards the total of £86,000 and has submitted grant applications to various grant funders to achieve the goal.

However, all grant funders look at the amount of local support in fundraising and often require 50% of the total to be raised locally before offering any grant. In consequence, even with the enthusiastic fund raising to date, the grant applications and the CIL funding, the Trust is £18,000 short of the 50% target.

The Parish Council agreed to the Trust's request for £5,000 to be allocated to it for this project, leaving a smaller CIL pot for the present, but with the expectation that more will be due to Little Bealings shortly.

We should have remembered to take an outside picture while all were gathered listening to Roy, but failed miserably in



#### Great Bealings resident achieves national acclaim for his 'Nature's Haven Bee Café'

#### Shed of the Year entry

By the time this issue does to print, we whether Great will know Bealings resident. Paul Martin. has won Cuprinol's 'Shed of the Year' competition, with his amazing bee-friendly, self-watering 'Bee Café' shed design. Paul's indenious design has made it into the national finals of this competition, which was previously televised, in which he came third in 2018. He has been sharing his know-how and enthusiasm with Caroline Saunders. organiser of our Bealings Plant Sale.

Paul's hard work has been enjoying degrees cooler than the ounational fame, after his shed was featured temperature, making it a lovely pla on ITV's This Morning, and also in the 'bee' on a hot Suffolk summer's day! Daily Mail.



The shed is designed with nature in mind, both in terms of creating a reliable pollen and nectar source for our beleaguered bee population and being completely 'off grid'. The shed is made up of four 'living walls', with all the plants growing in recycled plastic containers contained within a wooden structure. Paul grows everything from flowers to herbs, as well as cropping vegetables, such as peas

(which were delicious!), courgettes and even sweetcorn. Harvested rainwater. collected on the shed's roof, is stored in a 500-litre tank beneath the structure. A bilde pump then pumps the water up. using energy from a solar-powered battery, and re-uses it to perpetually water the plants via a dripping hose system. Any remaining water is returned to the sump, so no water ever soaks away to the ground. During the two-month 2022 summer drought, every plant was kept moist purely with this recirculated rainwater, without Paul having to resort to mains hosepipe top-ups. An additional benefit of the shed is that when the irrigation system is running, the inside of the shed drops in temperature, creating a cool and pleasant microclimate, several dearees cooler than the outside temperature, making it a lovely place to



Paul calls the individual modules which make up the shed walls 'Bee Cafes'. Each Bee Café is a wooden mini-planter, which is planted up with 4-6 individual recycled plastic containers, usually recycled drinks bottles. These are drilled with drainage holes, filled with peat-free compost and topped off with a specially selected flower, herb or food crop which aims to provide as much pollen and nectar across the growing season as which he, and it was almost invariably possible. This also allows gardeners with HE, was responsible. In the immediate limited space to increase their growing possibilities. purpose-built, recognisable by protrusions

Paul is generously donating Bee Cafés to local residents, with the hope of creating a 'bee corridor' to give our beleaguered pollinators additional support. If you'd like to request a Bee Café, please contact Paul on his Facebook page, 'Great Bealings Climate Emergency Rapid Response Squad'. You can also support Paul by donating clean 2l drinks bottles or large plastic milk bottles to his home. Please contact him directly to arrange drop off.

Paul is also in the process of approaching the local council and schools to find out whether the Bee Cafés could be installed in Woodbridge town centre, and in school playgrounds, to increase pollen supplies in difficult-to-plant areas. Voting for the Cuprinol competition will have closed by the time you read this article, but if you wish to support Paul in any way, either by supplying recycled bottles, seed-grown plants to add to the living walls of his modules, or any other way, please do contact him to keep this fantastic project going. We hope to donate surplus plants to Paul's project following the plant sale next spring, and perhaps you will see a 'Bee Café' there, if we're luckv!

#### **HISTORY CORNER**

#### - THE POLICING OF VILLAGES - A Memory

As the son of a Suffolk policeman, I have vivid memories of local policing in the 50s and 60s. These memories, drawn from a childhood spent in East Bergholt and Holbrook, but with strong Bealings echoes, will invite comparisons with present-day policing, but readers are invited to draw their own conclusions.

The most obvious feature of mid-twentieth century village policing was that the local bobby (the name itself, now rarely used, seemed to imply a degree of familiarity in itself), lived on the beat, in the village for

HE, was responsible. In the immediate post-war years many police houses were purpose-built, recognisable by protrusions on either end, one for the garage, the other for the office. As a consequence everyone knew the village policeman and. conversely the village policeman knew everybody, actual and potential villains included. Most of these houses were sold off, and have been converted, but some are still recognisable as such. Here are pictures of the Holbrook police house, and of the Little Bealings police house, opposite the lower entrance to the Playing another Field. There is one in Grundisburgh, in Park Road, close to the new housing development.





SUMMARISED NOTES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON  $27^{TH}$  JULY 2023.

#### REPORT BY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR COLIN HEDGLEY (CH)

A report had been circulated to Cllrs and

a full copy is attached to the minutes on the website. CH verbally reported on the discussion he had with the Head of Planning regarding the number of houses in a "Cluster" – apparently there is no limit. He also advised that the Planning Referral System is going to change, and he outlined the new system which is a great improvement. He confirmed that to make a verbal representation to the Planning Committee, registration must be made on the website at least 24 hours in advance.

#### REPORTS BY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR DAN CLERY (DC)

DC had circulated reports for June and July which are attached to the minutes on the website. He verbally spoke about the recent Community Partnership Meeting that both he and Sue Prentice (SP) had attended which gave rise to a discussion on various ideas that had been put forward regarding some activities. SJ volunteered to speak to a local resident about this.

#### **PLANNING APPLICATIONS**

DC/23/2127/FUL – Land North of Lavender Cottage –Build single storey stable room and storage room for hay and tools -Councillors unanimously resolved to strongly object to this application.

DC/23/2787/VOC – Barn C, Former Woodbarn Cottages, Seckford Hall Road – Variation of plans re Cart lodge - It was resolved that there are no objections to this application.

Decision Update - DC/23/1149 – 14 Grundisburgh Road – permitted by ESC.

# Report re ESC Planning Forum $7^{TH}$ July

SP advised members that, under the Environment Act 2021, Biodiversity Net Gain is a mandatory requirement from November 2023. She read out some statistics re ESC planning application approvals and specifically mentioned that for appeals – the national average is 42% success whereas for ESC it is only 29%. ESC Enforcement Matters that are upheld are very few.

#### **ENFORCEMENT MATTERS**

ENF/22/0069/USE – Water Meadow, Lower Street – The ESC Enforcement Officer has concluded his investigation and reports that a number of non-permitted items have been removed from the land and it has been determined that sufficient compliance has been achieved. Cllrs will continue to monitor this site.

#### **REVIEW OF NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN**

SP reported that the text of the revised NP is being proof-read and it is now at the pre-statutory consultation stage.

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN POLICY USAGE STATISTICS

SP reported that ESC has amended these, and the figures will be provided on a monthly basis.

#### Consultation on Shire Hall, Woodbridge

Regan Scott (RS) reported on the proposals regarding the future of the Shire Hall. Cllrs felt that the PC should not comment on this consultation.

#### **HIGHWAYS AND FOOTPATHS**

**Replacement SID** – The Clerk confirmed that the insurance claim has been successful and £2975 has been received from Zurich. Cllrs discussed the two quotations which had been received and decided to proceed with Westcotec, to align with neighbouring parishes. There is a shortfall of £450 and CH will apply for this amount from his Enabling Communities Fund.

**Footpaths** – RS is liaising with the Footpath Officer for Little Bealings with regard to cutting back giant hogweed.

**Trees** – John Carter-Jonas is in contact with the representative of Lord Cranworth regarding a site for a copse.

#### **REVIEW OF RISK ASSESSMENT**

Cllrs have reviewed this and decided that no changes are necessary.

#### FINANCE AND ADMIN

Six payments were authorised for office expenses, salary and PAYE for September and October and election expenses. The Bank Reconciliation was approved and signed.

#### ACCIDENT ON LODGE ROAD


a significant accident had recently occurred on Lodge Road, and Cllrs reported their concern about the speeding at this site.



•Small trip hazards on FP5 near to the NE border with Gt Bealings - no action taken by Highways, but the situation seems to have lessened in severity.

•Boules Piste repairs – it is hoped that a team of volunteers will be engaged to undertake this task.

See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details of these items.

#### FINANCE

Payments were authorised for the Clerk's May & June salary and stationery expenses, tax to HMRC, also costs to CAS for the Neighbourhood Plan website, training costs for courses for the new Chairman and a new Councillor and a contribution to SID's insurance paid to Lt Bealings PC. Credits received included £50.00 for playing field hire, and £15.64 interest on the Business Premium account. The current budget was agreed to be on track and a review of the parish Standing Orders was conducted.

#### HIGHWAYS

Highways' suggestions for traffic priority issues on the C324 still awaited (as above). The overall traffic priority has been established as being from the Ipswich direction but standard methods of dealing with this is difficult as there is so little road width. Also, build-up of silt washing off the field to the south of the road is a major contributory factor and the silt covers up road markings. Positioning of new road signs to deter heavy traffic from using Church Lane was agreed and a site visit to determine the exact locations of the signs is to be conducted. The SIDs report was given by Tracy Herrington, including data collected in June, giving statistics of daily usage of local roads by cars and other vehicles.

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The comments log from the presubmission consultation was discussed and must be agreed before the draft Plan can be submitted to East Suffolk Co. This is expected to be conducted at the next meeting.

#### PLANNING MATTERS

Application DC/22/2345/FUL - White Gables, Hill Farm Road - Front, rear and side extensions to building, upgrading insulation and cladding – this was approved by Playford Parish Council but

is yet to be decided by East Suffolk planners.

Application DC/22/2510/FUL – Alterations of Colts Meadow, Hill Farm Road - this will be discussed by the PC on 12.7.23.

...... (Update – this was approved by the parish council on 12.7.23)

#### **OTHER MATTERS**

A new concrete base has been laid for the bottle bank and a site visit held on 1<sup>st</sup> July agreed the next step i.e., to erect a low metal fence around three sides and to place loose paving stones to aid access over the grass.

Despite a watering rota by volunteers, the memorial oak tree on the playing field has been looking a little unhappy, possibly because of the heat wave in June – a closer eye is being kept on it and hopefully, subsequent heavy rainfall may be helping it recover too.
