WHAT PRICE LOCAL DEMOCRACY? WHAT PRICE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANS?

This month's editorial should, according to our schedule, have been written by someone from Playford, but we are now confronted with a local planning decision of great relevance both to Playford and to Great Bealings. Residents from Great Bealings have recently spent an enormous amount of time and energy working on their local Neighbourhood Plan. This plan was endorsed by over 90% of those voting in a village referendum and subsequently approved unanimously by Suffolk Coastal District Council earlier this year. Playford are in the process of setting up their own Neighbourhood Plan so what follows is of great significance to both villages.

The integrity of the position of Great Bealings in this respect was shown in the by the Parish unanimous rejection Council of a certain planning proposal, in the vicinity of Rosery Farm, one which seemed to fly in the face of the spirit of the Neighbourhood Plan. Our parish councillors are elected as spokespeople of our whole community, so a rejection of their views, is a rejection of our collective views. That Neighbourhood Plan, as submitted by Great Bealings PC, and all that it was thought to entail, had been unanimously approved by SCDC.

And now, in what seems to be a complete volte-face, the District Council (through its Planning Committee) - apart from our three District Councillors who spoke against granting planning approval seems to have gone against the view of Gt Bealings Parish Council. This is also contrary to the Council's own previous approval of the Neighbourhood Plan and, from what one can see, its own criteria for development. It has been suggested that the only redress seems to be recourse to the very expensive process of a judicial review, and a very uncertain outcome.

While we fully understand the need for more housing for an ever-increasing population, this has to be balanced against the need to preserve the integrity of the countryside in the face of potential exploitation. The approved application seems to have nothing whatsoever to do with additional housing. Once countryside

ROSERY FARM COTTAGE - AN ALTERNATIVE VIEW

The views expressed by the Parish Council, and shared in a general sense by villagers concerned at maintaining the rural integrity of the site, are not necessarily those of all residents. In the interests of balance, we include a counter argument, a perspective which was probably not entertained at Parish Council

It is possible to take the view that some development at some stage is almost inevitable in and around this site, given the pressure put upon limited land resources, and that the current proposed development is very much preferable to possible future alternatives. The applicant included, within the context of the broader project, plans for significant enhancement of the site as a wildlife area, including the planting of a large number of trees, many of which are already in place. The land in question is not of great agricultural value. so its proposed use as an environmental resource could well be preferable to other kinds of development which might be envisaged for this poor quality land. Such possibilities might even include the extraction of aggregates.

These views may not be consistent with current criteria for development, but acceptance of the current proposal might be a way of forestalling possible future developments which could be even more destructive of the rural integrity of the site.

We publish this view in order to enable readers to make their own assessment of the widest implications of what is at stake

> As a footnote, we might add that the fact that the Inspector involved in approving the Neighbourhood Plan had voluntarily commented that it was an excellent blueprint. Also at issue is the fact that the applicant had over a year to prepare the planning application under a confidential pre-application procedure – a procedure from which our own Parish Council was excluded. Our Council then had just 21 days to respond, 4 days of which were over Easter. This meant that the odds stacked against the collective Parish Council view, and the principles of the Neighbourhood Plan.

COMMENT

From the editorial team:

We received a comment that the picture of the burning Grenfell Tower on the front of the July issue of the Magazine was in bad taste. By way of explanation, we should mention that the editorial and picture were put together around a fortnight before publication, and that this was before the tragedy had been overpoliticised and hi-jacked by people with wider interests in mind. That said, it did at the time of writing seem to serve as a suitable symbol of the "mess" the country was in, and, as such, appropriate. A fortnight later, we too might have had second thoughts.

That editorial was trying to engage in news beyond our own community. To write is to choose, and to put editorial heads over the parapet. We do not seek to be controversial or partisan, but simply to write of matters which, for better or worse, affect our communities. It would be easy to write something which just added another layer of insulation to the by-and-large untroubled lives of those in our villages, but somehow the world beyond seemed at that time to have assumed a particularly ugly aspect.

We do now have a policy that each of our four villages tries, twice a year, to identify people prepared to come up with a theme for an editorial – and yes, to put their heads above the parapet. It could be you! Please consider whether you would like to be put on the list of potential editorialists. That is an even more productive way of engaging with us. We would rather be read, than ignored – and in this particular instance it was good to receive many alternative views about the article.

FLY-TIPPING

We are far from immune to this problem: tyres, old mattresses, and other domestic detritus mysteriously finish up in hedgerows or by field entrances, Why

One timetabling quirk is that Bealings and Playford have a six-day-a-week bus into Woodbridge... and no bus back. But it is possible to travel back via Tesco in Martlesham on a Monday, Wednesday or Friday. Your morning in Woodbridge could look something like this:

- •• Around 9.00 am (depending on which village): Catch the number 71 bus to Woodbridge.
- •• 12:15 pm: After a morning in Woodbridge, catch the number 64 bus from Woodbridge to Tesco.

12:43 pm: From Tesco, catch the number 72 bus back to Bealings and Playford.

...Or you could opt for an earlier bus to Tesco and pick up some shopping while you're there. Visit the Traveline website for exact times.

Rural buses are being cut all over the country leaving many villagers stranded - especially older people and those of college age. We lost most of our Saturday services last year. So, let's support the services we have left!

STAG BEETLES IN GREAT BEALINGS

Very soon after our Suffolk Wildlife Trust Open evening, and the presentation by county stag beetle expert, Colin Hawes, we received from James Firebrace a report of a hitherto unprecedented sighting of one of these extraordinary creatures, a female, in James' garden in Hill House, Great Bealings on July 26th. We even have a picture to prove it. This recording has now been added to the map of recorded sightings across the county.



THE RUNNING HARE

This book by John Lewis Stempel is described as "a history of the field, which is really story of our landscape and of us – it is a story of a field once moribund and now transformed". What really fired the author was the sight of hares and his motivation was to get them back to his

own field, which was unfortunately sited next to a field owned by "the chemical brothers". It is a reminder that farming methods have changed dramatically, and that while some farmers, mostly creditably, do farm with regard for wildlife habitat, others do not.

One interesting point to emerge from this book is that the author took Springwatch" to task for conveying a false impression about the abundance of wildlife. Thanks to hours of patient wildlife watching the team are able to give an impression that wild life abounds. The author contends that this is not actually the case, and that many species are indeed under threat.

The reading of this book coincided with a 6.30 am walk back "across the top" towards Great Bealings from the Vehicle Surgeon. It's a wonderful time to experience nature at its early morning best. Not only were partridges scuttling around in the fields, but there were at least a dozen skylarks trilling away above me - and then - as I looked ahead - there were three hares in the middle of the road. They stopped. I stopped. They retreated to the edge of the field about 10 metres away. I watched, motionless as they preened themselves, scampered around chasing one another, unaware that they were being watched. A magical moment or two.



Notes of the Parish Council Meetings held on 3 and 12 July 2017

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

DC2605/FUL - Single Storey Extension to Create New Study and Ensuite at 24 Beacon Lane/17/

There was no objection to this application.

DC/17/2772/ARM Approval of Reserved Matters of DC/14/ 1123/OUT – Demolition of existing two dwellings, workshop unit and associated outbuildings. Erection of four dwellings with garages at Aracot, The Street

It was considered that the current application, was an improvement on previous applications, but there was objection to over development of the site, which would result in too much extra traffic and create parking problems in The Street, and as the design should reflect the style of the current two cottages and avoid overlooking neighbouring properties.

DC/17/2734/FUL Rear first floor extension over existing ground floor extension at Marydene, Martlesham Road

It was resolved to object to the application on the grounds of the adverse impact on the neighbouring property.

PLANNING ECONSULTATION BY SCDC

It was agreed to accept econsultation for planning applications only if there was firm assurance that the Council would continue to receive paper copies of applications and plans to consider at meetings and for the benefit of local residents.

SINKS PIT

SCC Waste had advised that work to relocate the gas flare was expected to be complete by mid-June, enabling the bank to be reprofiled and landscaped. The acoustic survey had been carried out by the site owner and a noise attenuation report was awaited. It was agreed to ask the owner when this was likely to be completed and, if it confirmed that bunding was a solution, when a planning application was likely to be made.

SAVID and SID (Speed Indicator Device)

Ms Head reported on her attendance at a SAVID meeting, at which insurance for a collectively owned SID had been discussed; it was agreed to ask the Council's insurers for an opinion. No response had yet been received from SCC regarding the location of poles for the SID in Playford Road and Martlesham Road.

WHITE LINES

It was agreed to ask SCC to renew these at the junction of Holly Lane and The Street, along to the entrance to the Church and where they had not been replaced across drive entrances in Playford Road following resurfacing work.

POLICE AND SCHOOL PARKING

The Tier 1 meeting due to be held on 27 April had been cancelled. Mrs Cornish expected to attend the next one on 24 May.

FOOTPATH CUTTING

This would be undertaken by the Council's contractor, Mr Fear, with a cut in May/June and another in July/August, funded by SCC.

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

The fete had been more than a success: it had gone down in the history books as one of the best ever. It had been a thoroughly enjoyable and special day.

The Committee would like to put on record their thanks to Adrian and Fiona Melrose for allowing the use of their grounds and to all the stallholders, helpers, lifters and shifters for their unstinting hard work. On the day, it all came very nicely together. An invitation to

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Co Cllr Robin Vickery was unable to attend the meeting.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Dist Cllr Robert Whiting reported that the new East Suffolk House at Melton was officially opened by the Lord Lieutenant of Suffolk on 15th June this year and that an artwork for the outside of the building is to be commissioned - closing date for this is 25th August 2017.

Nick Khan has been appointed as new Strategic Director for SC & Waveney Dist. Council in place of Arthur Chavonia who

has gone to Babergh & Mid Suffolk Council as CEO.

ACTION POINT REVIEW

The Clerk is still trying to progress repairs to the tarmac at the junction of Brook Lane and Butts Road but it appears this is not a high priority with SCC Highways and it will be reassessed at their next inspection.

Build-up of silt on C324: responsibility for this still remains unclear, SCC Highways manager David Chenery to approach landowner with a view to achieving a solution.

FP1 – this is being reverted to its original route following the erection of wooden bridges over the sections prone to flooding, it is hoped that resurfacing will take place soon.

Nettles along FP8 towards the school at Little Bealings, have finally been cleared after a 2-month delay - there are no funds available at present for resurfacing this path but Saxmundham Footpaths Officer Debbie Adams has promised to push to have it trimmed back more regularly and will investigate having it levelled.

FP20 is being redirected and major drainage works are in progress - the exact position of the new path is unclear. we are awaiting confirmation of this from the Footpaths Officer and for new signage.

See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details.

FINANCE

Grant money has been received from Robert Whiting's Enabling Communities Budget to fund two new dog litter bins.

Payments have been authorised for salary, tax to HMRC expenses, also to ICO for annual data protection charge.

A bank reconciliation was agreed and sianed.

The Budget for 2017-2018 was discussed and found to be on track.

HIGHWAYS

Following a change of MP for Ipswich, the proposed Northern By-pass is now in favour again and this could adversely affect Playford, depending on the route chosen, however because of huge costs involved it is not thought to be imminent.

Excessive run-off water in Church Lane is problematical and the issue of planning conditions not being enforced regarding placement of drains built into brick driveways, needs to be followed up.

The culverts under the road on either side of the Village Hall are blocked, causing the ditch to overflow in times of heavy rainfall. SC Norse Ltd to be asked to clear this.

EAOW CABLE ROUTE

We have not been advised of any DATE OF NEXT MEETING significant finds following the recent Weds 6th Sept 2017 at 7.00pm archaeological investigations along the cable route. At the recent Information Day held by EAOW1 in Grundisburgh Village Hall, it was learned that drivers of HGV's travelling at excessive speeds in the area had been apprehended. Noise pollution has been experienced in the vicinity of the new depot to the north of Playford as generators are working 24/7, also diesel fumes from the depot are noticeable depending on the wind direction.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Keith Carson has agreed to be Chairman of the Neighbourhood Plan Committee, There are reasonable grants available to Nevertheless, dreams never die, and

OTHER MATTERS

Progress with the Speedwatch project is slow and there is no news of the SIDS equipment which should have been bought with the spare 12PT funds - the clerk will investigate.

The Safeguarding policy has been updated.

Sites for the two new dog litter bins have been agreed, a larger one to replace the current one outside the village hall and a smaller one at the entrance/exit to the footpath in Hill Farm Road.

A plague in memory of Charles Lofts is to be placed on the bench on the Green.

It was agreed that a Recycling bin for clothes and shoes should be sited behind the bottle bank at the village hall - clerk to ascertain whether this is a suitable location for access by vehicles used to empty the bin.


Our second service of readings, prayers
