Especially in our aging demographic, the elderly have been hit the hardest. The young who can't afford to live in rural communities, find themselves alone and isolated.

So, what's happened? Well, it's been down to local dedicated special individuals to take the issues on board personally! Thanks to them we have crops of local groups popping up to meet the needs. It is not enough, but at least there is something. There are small pots of local government money to support new initiatives.

The core need for all this brilliant work is the VOLUNTEER!! without them nothing would happen. I run various groups in this area, and nothing would get done without them. They are essential.

Why should you become a volunteer? - well, you are needed and your skills can be used. Depending on what you want to do, your skill sets and how much time you wish to dedicate to volunteering. I have one young lady who retired from the Met Police, moved to the area and said she wanted to do something, wasn't sure what and bumped into me! she decided to volunteer with a Memory Lane group and loves it. She is passionate about her role now and hadn't got a clue group like it were needed. She is the treasurer now.

I have volunteers fundraising. That can be holding a quiz, filling out forms, doing talks to local groups who will donate some money to your cause.

HISTORY CORNER

- AN OUTLINE HISTORY OF CHARITY AND CHARITIES

Our leading article has led your editor into researching something of the history of charity both broadly and locally. By way of cheering you up, is it not good to know that we have, in this country 170,000 registered charities? That compares with just over 100,000 individuals signed up for the army. That seems to make us collectively more caring than we are belligerent. Our late Queen Elizabeth was, almost incredibly, Patron of some 600 of those charities, so that puts caring for others at the heart of royal priorities. Both nationally and locally, caring for in broader wider others our or communities seems to be part of what is to be human.

The word "Charity" finds its roots in the English language, derived from the Old English word caritas, meaning benevolence or love. Its inherent meaning of giving and kindness makes it a highly cherished and significant title. Charity has been a virtue recognised and fostered by religion throughout human history. In

It was not always thus. The Poor Relief Act of 1601 made parishes responsible for caring for the poor, sick, and elderly. A parish is defined as a small administrative district typically having its own church and parish priest and rather each than overseen by a group of people called Woodbridge and the county of Suffolk. Guardians. Inmates were expected to attend church regularly as a mark of gratitude for their support. Inmates who were able and healthy were expected to attend church in the morning and afternoon on Sundays. By 1930, local councils were responsible for running workhouses. - DAFFODILS
- AND A CHARITY BRIDGE EVENT

It just so happens that the Marie Curie emblem is a daffodil, so what better motivation for devoting this month's Nature Notes to the beautiful daffodil? Daffodils also happen to be the "birth" everyone knows, Wordsworth as good as immortalised the daffodil with his 1807 (revised 1815) poem, inspired by a walk he took with his sister Dorothy in 1802 along the shore of Ullswater in the Lake District (First 2 of 4 verses only):

wandered Ionelv cloud Continuous as the stars that shine

That floats on high o'er vales and hills, And twinkle on the milky way.

When all at once I saw a crowd. They stretched in never-ending line

host. aolden daffodils: Along the margin of a bay:

Beside the lake, beneath the trees, Ten thousand saw I at a glance.

Fluttering and dancing in the breeze. Tossing their heads in sprightly dance.



What more can we say about daffodils? The most famous account of daffodils in They adorn Suffolk lanes and gardens as Greek mythology is the tragic story of prolifically as they adorned Wordsworth's Echo and Narcissus as told in Ovid's Lake District. Daffodils symbolize rebirth, Metamorphoses: new beginnings, hope, joy, and good luck. Much of this symbolism arises from the fact that daffodils emerge each spring to light up barren landscapes with their cheerful vellow. orange. and flowers. Daffodils can also be symbols of creativity, energy, resilience, forgiveness and vitality.

daffodils:

It is bad luck to give a single daffodil: Some say that giving someone a single daffodil is bad luck.

Daffodil sap: Daffodils contain sap that can be poisonous to other plants.

Squirrels don't eat daffodils: Squirrels don't eat daffodils because of their poisonous crystals.

Daffodils and dogs: Be careful to keep dogs away from daffodils.

Daffodils and Chinese New Year: Some believe that forcing a daffodil to bloom for Chinese New Year will bring good luck to the household.

Wedding anniversaries: They're the official 10th wedding anniversary flower.

One day Echo sees Narcissus and falls desperately in love with him. however, makes it clear that her love will never be reciprocated. Constantly pining for him. Echo wastes away until all that remains of her is her voice. Beautiful Narcissus, so loved and yet unloving, sees no one worthy of his love until he There are also some odd facts about catches sight of an exquisite being in a pool of water as he bends down to take a drink. Filled with longing for the figure. he tries in vain to reach the person in the water. Eventually he recognises it is himself and just as Echo suffered, so does he: he too wastes away, and his body is transformed into a delicate flower leaning over the edge of a pool.

> story of Echo and Narcissus provides us with an explanation for the way sound can echo and at the same time suggests the origins of the narcissus flower. But it also acts as a warning about the dangers of becoming obsessed with someone else – or with oneself!

This month, I had the pleasure of speaking with students at Debenham High School, and my visit to the University of Suffolk was a particular highlight, especially as I explored the cutting-edge facilities at the UoS Dental CIC. In Westminster, we welcomed young agricultural professionals from across the Eastern region, I hosted the first of what I hope will be many Meet Your MP sessions in Debenham, and I stood alongside councillors at the **Stop The Quarry** campaign in Westerfield, listening to the concerns of local residents.

I also want to take this opportunity to consider transport, roads, and infrastructure across Central Suffolk & North Ipswich. Whether we drive or rely on public transport, we all depend on the accessibility, efficiency, and upkeep of our transport networks. Below standard road conditions, unreliable bus services, and inadequate investment in key infrastructure affect everyone, impacting commutes, business logistics, and overall connectivity.

In North Ipswich, growing housing developments require a transport network that can support increased demand, ensuring residents have access to safe and reliable routes to work, school, and essential services.

In rural areas such as Otley and Swilland, where public transport is sparse, well-maintained roads are critical for residents and businesses alike. The challenge is ensuring that our transport networks remain fit for purpose, balancing investment in public transport with the need for urgent road repairs and long-term infrastructure planning.

To better understand local concerns, I have launched a **Transport Survey** to gather residents' views on the state of our roads, infrastructure, and housebuilding across the constituency. The condition of local roads is a recurring issue raised with me, with concerns over potholes, road safety, and the lack of investment in rural routes.

Many also feel that new housing developments are not being accompanied by the necessary improvements to roads, schools, and healthcare provision. Others have expressed frustration with the reliability of bus services, which are often a lifeline for elderly residents and those without access to a car.

Whether you feel housebuilding is too low or too high in your area, or if you believe more needs to be done to improve road surfaces and transport links, I want to hear from you. Your feedback will help shape my approach to these pressing issues, ensuring I can advocate effectively for the investment and policies our communities need. SUMMARISED NOTES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 3RD MARCH 2025

GOV.UK EMAIL ADDRESSES

Cllrs all confirmed that their new email addresses were working satisfactorily

Public Participation Session

The agent for the planning application for Bealings House gave a brief presentation of the details of this scheme and questions were answered by both him and the applicants

REPORTS

County Councillor Elaine Bryce (EB) -

EB's report was received after the Applications meeting and is attached to the minutes on the website. She gave a verbal summary in which she brought Cllrs up to date regarding SCC's budget of £803.7m which has been approved. She said that 77p in every £1 has to be spent on statutory services to protect vulnerable, leaving 23p for all other services. Additional Govt. money has been requested for flood prevention. She confirmed that Suffolk Libraries are to be taken back 'in-house,' and all 45 libraries will remain open and mobile libraries will be upgraded. Funding for the libraries will come from the Public Health budget. She also mentioned that funding has been made available for a safer, healthy and accessible traffic plan. She talked about Devolution and SCC's preference for a

effective way to reduce costs and bring public services together.

District Councillors Colin Hedgley (CH) and Dan Clery

Reports have been circulated to Cllrs and full copies are attached to the minutes on the website. CH spoke about the Air Quality Management Areas in East Suffolk which have now all been removed following significant improvements in air quality. He mentioned that the recent byelections in ESC did not change the electoral set-up.

PLANNING

DC/25/0547/FUL and DC/25/0548/LBC Bealings House, Lodge Road - Partial remodelling of an existing barn into a twobedroom residential annexe

Following discussions with the applicants and their agent. the PC resolved unanimously to support these applications, which they considered to be a sympathetic conversion which will enhance the existing structure.

Other Planning Matters

Quarry - Sue Prentice (SP) reported that a "STOP THE QUARRY" banner has been put up at the junction Grundisburgh Road and Boot Street. One Suffolk unitary authority as the most Concerns were expressed about the



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impact the HGV traffic will have on the clean air status, especially at the Westerfield railway crossing. The developers have answered in great detail all the points raised during the scoping study objecting to this scheme, but have given no assurances that there will not be a subsequent application to extend the quarry. They state that at the end of the scheme, there will eventually be a net biodiversity gain.

Other–Regan Scott (RS) reported that he had attended a recent ESC Planning Forum at which was explained a new Planning Charter for developers.

VILLAGE FETE 2025

The date has been confirmed as the 31st August and an appeal for volunteers to assist has been made.

HIGHWAYS AND FOOTPATHS

Scottish Power works access opposite Waveney Cottage — John Carter-Jonas reported that the entrance to the field has been re-opened, and the PC needs to request that it be made permanent. He said that Scottish Power should be asked to provide two new village gates on Lodge Road as they damaged one, and also some reflector bollards

Other matters – Reflector posts have been purchased and installed around the triangle by Rosery Lane

ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

RS has contacted Anglian Water about the clean water, which is processed by the sewage station, and has asked about the treatment of the high levels of Phosphorus in the River Lark. He has expressed concern that there is no storm overflow facility at the site.





COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Co Cllr Elaine Bryce's full report is appended to the full minutes on the website.

Elaine attended in person and listed her action on the following: Footpath problems, pothole issues, water leak in Church Lane, drainage on C324 – she has asked for the costing of works to improve the traffic priorities on C324 to be revealed and offered to help fund this from her next years' budget if possible.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

Dist. Cllr Colin Hedgley's full report is appended to the full minutes on the website.

Colin said that council tax has been fixed for the next financial year and Band D would be increasing by 47p/month. Southwold's main car park is currently being used by contractors storing their equipment whilst repairing part of the esplanade which has collapsed. As always, Colin is happy to help constituents with any problems concerning council business.

ACTION POINT REVIEW

- •Still no decision on the appeal against reinstating FP26 between Butts Road and Church Road.
- •Improvement work on drainage problems on C324 postponed indefinitely by Highways, but there is now hope of some progress with the traffic priorities on C324 if Co Cllr EB can fund some of the work from her budget.
- Progress on repairs to the many large potholes in Butts Road and Church Lane is at a standstill but Cllr EB is striving for a better solution.
- •ESSL unlikely to be able to carry out clearing the drainage ditch beside Butts Road in front of the village hall and other options are being explored. Hedge trimming around the playing field has at last been completed and ESSL have quoted for next year's grass and hedge trimming contract.
- •Clearance work on FP1 should have been completed by now. Flooded parts of FP20 to the south of the water meadow are being investigated and PROW officers are liaising with the landowners for a more permanent solution.
- •Loose netting on all four bridges in the Alder Carr (FP20) still awaiting attention and the loose rail on one of the bridges has not been fixed yet.
 - •Replacement of smashed grit bin at

practically agreed using funds from Co tion in Butts Road and Church Lane but Cllr EB's budget and we hope to move Co Cllr EB is pushing for a better deal forward with this soon.

•A blocked drain in Spring Meadow was reported but found not to meet Highway's intervention criteria - clerk will investigate this as it is still an issue.

A further invoice of £370.00 will be paid to Suffolk Cloud soon - grateful thanks to Dist Cllr CH who has provided £250.00 from his Enabling Communities Budget towards this work. Credits received since last meeting include quarterly interest of £38.59 on the Reserve account. The budget for 2024-25 is on track and the bank reconciliation was agreed by Cllr SH. The invoice of £1020.00+VAT for grass and hedge trimming in 2024 has not vet been received but has been agreed in principle and should be paid before the end of the tax year. A quote of £1082.05+VAT from ESSL has been accepted for next year's grass and hedge trimming work.

Review of all regulations and policies took place in readiness for the Annual Parish Council Meeting in May, with the exception of the Complaints procedure which will be updated at the next meeting.

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
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
