THE FUTURE OF OUR VILLAGE CHURCHES

The recent passing of Pope Francis and the reaction to it has shown that there is no shortage of religious sentiment across our planet. The commitment to religions other than Christianity in this country, has only served to underline the contrast with the steep decline, at least until very recently, in support for our national church, the Church of England. Yet the Church of England is architecturally embodied in some of the finest ancient churches in the world. We all need to generate more positivity about their future in our midst.

The local history that these churches represent, and the wonderful buildings that they are, combine to make them worth preserving in themselves, even if the numbers of actual worshippers shrink. It is all too easy to retreat into nostalgic inactivity, and allow them to fade away. These are wonderful old buildings, most of them still in reasonable condition. They should be regarded as assets not liabilities. For them to be utilised to

the full extent of their potential, we need vision as to what that potential could be, and plan for the buildings' future accordingly.

That is the challenge facing local communities across the country. Locally, our own churches are facing that problem in different ways. All, in their own ways, are embracing the idea that this is THEIR problem, not somebody else's. If we value what it is that makes a village, then the church is part of it, and we all need to actively investigate the alternative uses of our church buildings, get involved, and help to be part of that necessary change.

Congregations in most village churches continue to decline, in line with the ever-increasing secularisation of our society, and the weakening of conventional Christian faith. The older members of the population, often more grounded in routine religious practices, continue to provide the ever-weakening back-bone of our congregations. Young people may attend church for a few years if they grow up in a church-going family, but they otherwise have reduced exposure to what is still, for better or for worse, the established religion of our country. Some worshipping styles fare better than others.

For many village churches we are now at a point where keeping the buildings open in the present format simply as a place of worship has become unrealistic. It is arguable whether the shrinking of congregations stems solely from the apparent national decline in the belief in God. Many non-Churchgoers believe in some concept of God and adhere to Christian beliefs. Their pursuit of these beliefs may not be strong enough to get them to Church on a Sunday, or they may feel that Christian worship practices are old-fashioned and out of touch with this modern age. Because they meet in ancient buildings, this can encourage the view that God and religion are themselves ancient and dated, concepts which belong to the past. This is one good reason for adapting our Churches to accommodate people in a more user-friendly environment and to make them available for wider community uses. Our Churches need not be museums. They can be made more accommodating to those attending, without losing their inherent beauty, architectural value, or the sense of history behind them.

It seems that a majority of people still recognise and love the history of our old buildings. There are rightly laws to protect them. But, even while acting within those laws, we can both upgrade the facilities and improve the ambience in a way which will increase the users' experience. Whether the church is fully operational, shared with the non-practising community or just managed as a beautiful building, it is still a community asset, integral to the history and character of the village.

More people need to get involved. Not just those who go to church. Churches are landmarks. They often stand in the centre of villages. Their towers can be seen from miles around. While not abandoning the original purpose of these fine buildings, let's rethink their significance and usefulness in a more secular world. The alternative is closure and inevitable structural decline.

Parishes themselves have traditionally been the grassroots nurturing the wider church. That seems no longer to be the case. That said, all villages have their elected representatives, their Church officials, those who attend church, helpers, volunteers, families with memories and loved ones buried in the churchyards, residents who still value the church as part of village life. Then there are those who couldn't care less. The fate of grand buildings, as of much else, is all too often decided by majority momentum. We need majority momentum to value the future of our churches. The weight of apathy is not easily counter-acted.

HISTORY CORNER

- USAF AIRFIELDS IN WW2

This item seems to be very relevant to the times we live in. For two reasons. Firstly, the celebration of the 80th anniversary of VE Day reminds us of the indispensable role of the United States in winning that war, and of the huge contribution made by that country to ensuring that the evil of Nazism was defeated. Secondly, we cannot fail to notice the contrast that this WW2 involvement, with the sacrifice of so many men, offers to the economic and geopolitical chaos that this same nation is now causing across the planet. Nor can we fail to be reminded of the fickleness of history, as of nations - and of the instability of so much that we can so easily take for granted.

Britain in the mid-1940s has been compared to a giant aircraft carrier. More locally, before the start of WW2 there were 5 airfields in Suffolk. By the end of the war there were 32, as compared with 37 in the much larger county of Norfolk all taking advantage of the relatively flat East Anglian terrain, and its strategic position facing the nazi-occupied continent of Europe. All these new airfields had to be constructed. Some response to start with to Little & Great 60,000 men were involved, many of them black engineer regiments arriving from a States. Each organising airfield is said to have cost around

£90,000 at contemporary values. 6 trains a day are said to have been coming from London, carrying rubble from our bombed -out capital city, all recyclable into hard-surfaced runways. There were very significant airfields close to our now peaceful villages, offering local inhabitants sights and sounds which would now seem to be from another world.

The nearest local airfields were: Martlesham, initially used, during the Battle of Britain, by the fighter planes of 356 squadron, and then US bombers. Debach was specially constructed to take yet more US heavy bombers, as was Framlingham. In fact, that airfield is at Parham, but it was deemed that the word "Framlingham", the nearby town, would sound more distinct across the airwaves. The rumble of departing and returning bombers - if they had survived the raids into the heart of Germany – filled the East Anglian air, particularly in the latter months of the war, as the RAF and USAF tried to bomb Nazi Germany into submission.



There were social impacts. Gum and candy were readily on offer to local children. Nylon stockings could impress the local girls. Fraternisation with the local population, war-weary allies, was inevitable. Racial segregation was carried out into the local communities, but, overall the United Sates servicemen did their best to engage with the local population, already battered by having been at war for three long years.

Debach airfield was on our doorstep. It FYNN VALLEY WALKS GROUP was built over a two-year period and not fully used until the D-Day landings in 1944. There was accommodation for almost 3000 men, mostly in Nissen huts. 493rd The Bomber aroup commanded by Colonel Elbert Helton and came to be known as Helton's Hellcats. The early days were not without incident – the runways were shorter than the pilots B-24 accustomed to. Initially were Liberators flew from the base. Then B-17 Flving Fortresses. 157 missions were flown. 41 aircraft went missina action, 234 personnel lost their lives. The last mission was on 20th April 1945. When the Americans left, very soon after peace had been proclaimed. Debach was used as a POW camp and then as a facility for displaced persons.

Responsible for policing all this, was local Constable. PC Moody, depicted in a wonderful display at the former base, alongside a host of other exhibits, including vehicles, weaponry, medical facilities, mock-ups of an ops room etc. For those who remember the war: a mustvisit - remind yourselves how things once were. For those born subsequently - a visit is an education in itself. The Museum is open on the last Sunday of the month from April through to September. Private visits can be arranged.

DAWN CHORUS WALK - SATURDAY 10TH MAY

Many of you have said how much you enjoyed this walk previously, so it is back for the fourth year running! Join us for our early morning 'Dawn Chorus' walk around Bealings, to enjoy the sights and sounds of the countryside at daybreak.

The dawn chorus begins at least half an hour before sunrise, which is at 5.08 a.m. in Bealings that morning, so we will set off at 4.30 a.m. from the village hall car park. The walk is approximately 4 miles long and will take us along riverside meadows beautiful country churchvard resplendent with wildflowers, down quiet country lanes and through the densely wooded area known locally generations as 'Birds Hill', where there is always an abundance of bird life to be seen and heard.



The return part of the walk takes in sweeping views across the Fynn Valley, and we then pass through grassland and fields alongside our two Bealings rivers -The Fynn and the Lark - before returning to our starting point.

Depending on what we see, hear and how long we linger to look at the wildlife on the way round, the walk should finish at approximately 6.30 a.m.

Parking is available at the village hall by kind permission of the trustees - please park at the far end of the car park, away from the village hall. We ask you to please park and gather as quietly as disturbance to local residents.

There will be sausage or bacon baps, tea and coffee available for walkers in All Saints Church at the end of the walk. priced at £5, with all proceeds going towards All Saints Church, Little Bealings - many thanks to two of our volunteers, Liz and Peter, for helping to make this possible.

We hope you can join us to share the delights of a spring dawn once again in our lovely Suffolk countryside.

NATURE NOTES

- Gorse

At this time of year our heathlands are ablaze with the bright yellow flowers of gorse. Gorse, also known as furze, is a spiny, evergreen shrub with bright yellow, pea-like flowers. Because it is prickly, sometimes unsightly when not in bloom, and seems to grow where it likes, it can often find itself uprooted, cleared away, or burnt as if it were an invasive weed. At this time of year though, we glory in its splendour, its irregular banks of bright vellowness in harmony with sprinatime vellows of primroses. dandelions, daffodils, wallflowers. It is in bloom from early in the year until June.



The plant is high in protein, nectar/pollen. and provides habitat, shelter and food for various wildlife. Exmoor ponies - sheep too - birds and insects, bees, butterflies, moths and caterpillars. Hardy small birds

possible at this early hour, to minimise such as the Dartford warbler and the stonechat love to perch atop the bushes and proclaim their ownership of the territory.

> Gorse can be used as a windbreak for cattle. Gardeners may even plant it deliberately, as it is a hardy coastal plant, tolerating exposure, drought, and sea winds

> Historically, we are told that gorse has been used as fuel. Surprisingly, the flower's distinct vanilla-coconut aroma and an almond-like taste seem to make them edible too -in small quantities. It seems that they can be eaten raw on salads or pickled like capers – best check this further before you try it!

FIRST SIGHTINGS (Do contribute to and for hire of equipment that companies this item, as seems appropriate - first need to build houses and other structures in the area. > Ben and I were particularly interested in the work that is being done to enhance biodiversity, some of which is included in government regulations recent businesses like Tru7 Group, such as making all cement production and every litre of diesel bought fully carbon offset, but other elements are just good things to help keep our earth in better shape which company has voluntarily implemented.

- Churchwarden's Notes

Easter is the season of new life, in so many ways. The role of Easter in the church calendar reflects everything that is going on in the natural world – in the Northern hemisphere, at least! Certainly, in this tiny little patch of the planet here in Bealings. Once again, we find ourselves on the threshold of spring, summer, warmth, new growth, and new opportunities.

LOOKING BACK

Easter itself was celebrated in a special "Light into darkness" service in the church. As dusk gathered outside, the service began, in a darkened church, with readings taken from the biblical descriptions of the world's beginning. When night had finally fallen. congregation processed outside. witness the lighting of the fire set up between the main entrance and the new gates. The Easter fire was confined incongruously incinerating within an dustbin.

Amidst increasingly roaring flames and unpredictable smoke the symbolism of light was carried forth from the fire and passed on to candles borne by those present. Proceeding back into the church, the lights then blazed forth, amidst a flurry of bells and clanging instruments. Other elements of the service reflected new life, completing the symbolism, and duly

enacting and celebrating the central message of Easter.



Difficult though that central Christian message may be for mortal minds to comprehend, the service had a wider resonance. We all need to find hope reawakened in a world which has been looking increasingly dark. With the Woodbridge choir present, fine music to uplift spirits, and a cheerful social mingling at the end, there was indeed much evidence of new beginnings. Long may that continue.

completely felled, three others pollarded.

There appear to be plans for the rest to be dealt with at a later date. The major consequence is that visitors will be much less at risk from falling branches, or, indeed, entire trees. We are grateful to the Grundisburgh estate for making this happen. The spoils of the operation are a large pile of logs, offered to the church, so we can exchange them for appropriate donations to church funds, and a pile of wood chippings which could well be of interest to gardeners on the same basis.



Sadly, one of our picnic tables has collapsed, and has similarly been converted into firewood.





Notes of matters considered at the Parish Council meeting held on 7 April 2025

APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Cllr K Price, County Councillor Eliane and District Councillor Colin Hedgley were absent from the meeting.

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no Declarations of Interest Cllr H Saagi and Cllr M Wilson: Other Registrable Interest as Trustee Bealings Village Hall in Agenda item 9.1 request from Village Hall trusties for CIL money for new blinds.

A resident spoke during the Public Participation Session about planning application DC/25/0972/ARM Family Dwelling, Grove Cottage, The **DEBEN CLIMATE CENTRE** Street, Little Bealings.

SINKS PIT COMMUNITY LIAISON GROUP

Cllr I Ransome attended the meeting and Fast Suffolk Council reported that Environment Protection were evaluating the original noise abatement notice and whether а second investigation is required due complaints arising from the west of the

The Work of the Sinks Pit Community Liaison Group is coming to an end and ESC EP would like complaints to be handled as 'business as usual.' However, not all complaints are received directly to TRU for immediate investigation. Cllr I Ransome suggested that a separate entry into the Fynn Lark News would remind all local residents on how to report complaints and that this would possibly be a joint LBPC/TRU entry. It would also be useful if ESC EP contributed to this entry.

SIZEWELL C TRANSPORT FORUM

Cllr I Ransome raised questions about the level crossing in Little Bealings that is due to be closed during November, December 25 and January 26 and how this will impact the Village. Included in the Sizewell rail project there is an option to build an acoustic barrier along the line behind properties in Martlesham Road and Beacon Lane. The Parish Council were not informed of the original planning application for this and were not invited to comment.

The Sizewell C Project does not include work on the Little Bealings level crossing or track. Network rail has not said what works they intend to do during the closure. Cllr I Ransome will attend the next meeting.

Cllr Ransome spoke with representative at the Deben Climate Centre who test the water quality in the rivers Fynn and Lark and their latest report has been circulated. He asked if the Parish Council were interested in getting involved? Cllr C Cheeseman said that he believes that the water quality varies depending on how much rainfall there had been. The Parish Council did not feel a presentation was required.

DEVOLUTION

There is now lots of information coming through to the Parish Council about Devolution. Cllr I Ransome said that SALC are due to publish some more user -friendly information that could be used on the Parish Council website and that they going to send are questionnaire. Cllr I Ransome and the Clerk would fill out the questionnaire on behalf of the Parish Council.

CLERKS FORUM

The Clerk reported that the Parish Council will be liable to Employers National insurance from the start of the new financial year. She is due to start her CILCA course on 16 April.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

A draft copy of the Neighbourhood Plan had been circulated to Councillors. Cllr H Saagi reported that the Angela Cobbold Hall had been booked for the 10th of May and that the eight-week consultation period will begin. It was **RESOLVED**: To accept the Draft Neighbourhood Plan once the minor corrections had been made.

PLAYFORD HAS ITS OWN SID ... AT LAST

After a couple of years of sharing a SID (Speed Indicator Device) with neighbouring parishes, Playford Parish Council finally took delivery of their own equipment.



The money raised to purchase the SID came from, in the main, the local Community Partnership and SAVID, the Safer Village Driving pressure group. The Kesgrave, Rushmere St Andrew, Martlesham and Carlford and Fynn Valley Partnership was started in 2019 by the previous council and has been instrumental in providing match funding and main funding for hundreds of deserving and important projects across the East Suffolk area, including a number of road safety programmes. SAVID, meanwhile, has ten participating

parishes and continues to campaign on road safety issues throughout the local area, funded by grants from member parish councils and the Community Partnership.

Cllr Hedgley, member for Carlford Ward and Community Partnership representative said, "At the beginning of the Community Partnership scheme, started by the previous administration, I was dubious about the outcome, but after six years it has been a resounding success."

The idea of SAVID was started in a Debach garden room in 2014 by a resident, Cllr Colin Hedgley and Cllr Tony Fryatt (since retired) and it has grown into an effective pressure group for road safety.


