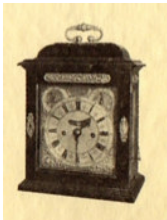

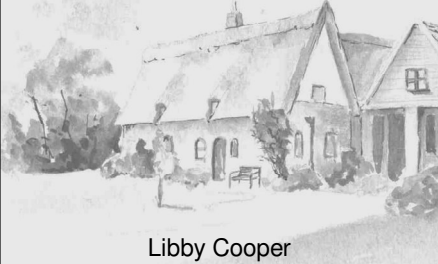

This month I am pleased to include an article from Sam Baker about his trip to Ghana with a Christian organisation, Lasallian Developing World Projects. Sam has recently started university, so I would ask your prayers for both him and the community in rural Kaleo, Ghana.

### **GHANA 2011 – SAM BAKER**

With a mixture of excitement and trepidation I boarded the plane to Ghana at the start of my Lasallian Developing World Project. We were a group of 12 students from across the UK, and had spent a year fundraising to enable us to take part.

My project was based in a rural village Kaleo in the North West region – 14 hours' drive from the capital Accra. Our aim was to assist local builders in the construction of living accommodation for 5 teachers in the local school. Lasallian Developing World Projects have been working in Kaleo for 21 years and has gradually supported the development of 3 schools to enable children from all backgrounds to receive education. The house for teachers is important, as, it is difficult to attract staff to such a remote region. At present teachers have to travel from the nearest local town on bikes or in a tro-tro. Staff are unable to travel in the rain and tro-tro are extremely unreliable as the service does not run to a timetable.

Working on the building site with heat of up to 40 C was tiring. Our tasks included making bricks from water, dirt and cement powder, digging the cess pit, mixing cement and moving building materials for the local skilled labourers. By the end of our trip we had built up to roof level despite delays due to unchar-

acteristic heavy daytime rain.

We lived in the village amongst the locals, in a brick built house as opposed to a mud built one occupied by the Ghanaians. By western standards the living conditions were basic. One toilet and shower between 12, a limited supply of water, 2 gas rings but surprisingly a reliable electric supply. Ghanaian food, although plentiful, again is very basic. Most meals consisted of rice, yam, peppers, onions mixed with tomato puree. Meat is a luxury and we only cooked one meal with meat throughout our stay. We decided to purchase two chickens but unlike our own supermarkets, they were still alive and we had to kill them ourselves.

We were warmly welcomed by the local community and were often invited into their courtyards for an evening drink of pito. Pito is brewed by the villagers as an alternative to contaminated drinking water. Other invitations included attending the local churches, meeting the local tribal chiefs, the district commissioner, the local MP as well as attending the commissioning ceremony for last year's project. I celebrated my 18<sup>th</sup> birthday whilst away and therefore was delighted to be invited to a Ghanaian friend's 18<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration. In accordance with tradition, his day started with the capture and slaying of a goat to provide the birthday meal. I helped with the capture but gave the slaying a miss!

Locally young people are moving into careers such as nursing or going on to study at university, because of the education provided by the supported schools. Education is highly valued in Ghana. We met Lukeman, a 26 year old, who has just finished his secondary school education. His previous schooling was interrupted by family problems but he returned in his early twenties to learn alongside younger students in

order to improve his prospects.

I thoroughly enjoyed my Ghanaian experience this summer. None of this would have been possible without the support of all those in the UK who have helped me fundraise, so thank you. It

gave me an opportunity of a lifetime but also allows young Ghanaians to receive an excellent education. In addition to my own thanks, I would like to pass on theirs as well we truly appreciate your help.

### ANTI-SLAVERY/ANTI TRAFICKING DAY. TUESDAY 18<sup>TH</sup> OCTOBER

The EU's 5th Anti-Trafficking day will be held in Warsaw. At the event participants will discuss strengthening co-operation between EU Agencies and other stakeholders in addressing trafficking in human beings (THB).

This year saw the publication of the EU Directive on prevention and combating THB and protecting its victims, which aims to create a coherent pan-European approach to the problem. As well as the establishment of the position of EU Anti-Trafficking Co-ordinator and the European Asylum Office. Trafficking in human beings is modern slavery and traps more people today than in the entire 400 years of the transatlantic slave trade. The exact extent of human trafficking globally is unknown and estimates vary widely, a conservative UN estimate is around 2.5 million. According to the International Labour Organisation, about 12.3 million people world wide are in forced labour, bonded labour, forced child labour or sexual servitude. Other estimates range between 4 - 27 million. According to US government-sponsored research, about 800,000 people are trafficked across national boundaries each year, about 80% of whom are women and girls and "up to 50%" are children." Please pray leading up to and on the 18<sup>th</sup> October for all involved in the debates, the agencies that are working to help end this heinous crime and for all those trapped in Slavery. ## **PARISH COUNCIL**

**Notes from the Great Bealings Parish Council Meeting held on 13<sup>th</sup> September 2011**

### **MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES** **Wind Turbines**

The Chairman reported that a meeting had been held last month with Mr Robin Sadler and Little Bealings Parish Council on his feasibility study of wind turbines.

### **Boot Street Project**

Mrs Sally Johnson reported that this was coming along nicely though they needed more volunteers to help with the work.

### **Telephone Box**

The windows need replacing. The rules of the book exchange are still being negotiated.

### **Notice Board – Boot Street**

Mr Paul Norris reported that the doors have been removed and will be re-installed once they have been repaired.

### **Report by Peter Bellfield**

Councillor Bellfield reported that it has been agreed that the new Chief Executive will not get an annual salary above £160,000 and there will be no bonuses. Mobile libraries are costing SCC £590,000 per year. This equates to £7.70 per visit. Mr Peter Bellfield reported that they may reduce the vehicle fleet from six to three and that they visit every 4 weeks instead of every two. Finally Mr Bellfield reported that an extra bus has been put on from the Bealings to Woodbridge in the morning at 9.30 am (approx.)

### **Report by Tony Fryatt**

The LDF has met with resistance regarding the proposed development at Adastral Park/Martlesham though there is nothing in the document that is going to cause a problem in Great Bealings. There will be an increase in traffic although Highways have said it won't really have too great an impact in this locality. There is a great deal of urgency to get the LDF cleared. Mr Tony Fryatt reported that the government is

condensing 1,000 pages of National Planning Policy Guidelines down to 52 pages which could be a developers charter! The only thing is to go back to the Localism Bill where Town and Parish Councils are urged to produce Neighbourhood Plans which will carry "clout". They could cost in the region of £20,000 to do. Mr Fryatt said that it was vitally important that as many people as possible go to the briefing meeting being held on the 28<sup>th</sup> September 2011 to consider the Draft National Planning Policy Framework.

### **Report by Police**

There have been five recorded crimes in the parish of Great Bealings in July and August of this year. Residents should be vigilant and lock sheds, garages, outbuildings and cars as opportunistic crime across the parishes continues.

### **Traffic Calming in Boot Street**

Mr Paul Norris reported that a detailed plan has been received from the Highways Department. It was agreed to adopt these plans to allow the Scheme to move forward. The positioning of the solar powered sign was debated as it was noted that the Highways preferred location for the sign (on the corner of Boot Street and Grundisburgh Road) was not the preferred location of parishioners. Mr Paul Norris has asked if the sign can be multi-faceted so that it can be changed around. He is also seeing if it is possible to have a slightly superior sign to the one quoted for. The white lining will be carried out shortly.

### **Consultation on updated sustainability appraisal and appropriate assessment documents**

It was noted that Great Bealings remains in the category "Other Village" and that the traffic generated by development at Adastral Park is a concern.

### **PLANNING APPLICATIONS**

#### **C/11/1691 Regency House.**

**Erection of new dwelling (existing to be demolished)**

The Chairman said that we will recall that the above had been granted planning consent for an extension however this has floundered because the building is deemed "structurally unsafe". Councillors opposed this development and will be writing to SCDC asking on what grounds is it structurally unsafe.

**C/11/0675 Hill House, Orchard Lane, Great Bealings**

**Change of use of former gardeners cottage to separate residential unit including extending into former stables, & change of use of adjoining storage/garage area into an office ancillary to Hill House**

Permission has been granted.

**C/11/1615 Annesley, Boot Street, Great Bealings**

**Erection of two storey side extension**

Permission has been granted by SCDC

**C/11/1557 Kiln Farm Cottage, Kiln Lane, Great Bealings**

**Erection of single and two-storey extensions to dwelling**

Permission has been granted by SCDC

**HIGHWAYS**

The Clerk reported that the central white lines on the junction of Hall Farm Road and Rosery Lane are not going to be reinstated. This is because new legislation says if a road is narrower than 5.5 metres central white lines are no longer acceptable. They can however put a solid white line down the

edge of the carriageway. This is under consideration.

**FINANCE**

Cheques were written for the Clerks salary, insurance, electricity for the telephone box, the external audit and SCDC election charges.

An email has been received asking if we could contribute £87.32 towards the cost of a security light for the Village Hall? Councillors felt the outstanding monies should be better found through a Village Hall fund raising event.

**Correspondence**

An email has been received informing the Council that we really need to register for Data Protection. This was agreed at a cost of £35 for the year.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Tuesday, 15<sup>th</sup> November 2011 at 8 pm in the Committee Room, Bealings Village Hall. During the first 15 minutes of all Council meetings the public are welcome to raise any matters of concern with Councillors. **Notes from the Little Bealings Parish Council Meeting held on 5 September 2011**

### **BUSES**

A new service has been provided to meet demand for a bus to Woodbridge – details are included in a separate article.

### **PLANNING**

#### **Applications**

**C11/1312: The Orchard, Holly Lane (formerly Windy Ridge, Holly Close): Erection of Detached Dwelling, Alteration/extension to existing outbuilding and formation of new vehicular access from Holly Lane (existing dwelling to be demolished) (revised scheme)**

SCDC had approved this application.

**C/11/0525: Horsenden House, Mart-**



**Ilesham Road – Erection of Solar Photo Voltaic ground mounted system generating 3.920kw**

SCDC had approved this application.

**C11/0545: Wychwood, Martlesham Road – Erection of two storey rear extension and garage and (existing garage and lean-to extension to be demolished) and repositioning of vehicular access**

SCDC had approved this application.

**C/11/0662: Blewbury, Playford Road – Erection of building to enclose swimming pool**

The applicant had appealed against SCDC's refusal of this application and the appeal had been refused.

**C10/0554 (withdrawn) Finches Hill, The Street – Enclosure of Swimming Pool**

SCDC was still in discussion with the applicant over whether the enclosure required planning permission (as an extension to the property) or was an outbuilding and therefore considered to be permitted development.

**C11/: Kesgrave Quarry, Kesgrave Road, Kesgrave, Suffolk - A variation of conditions 14 (vehicle movement times) and 15 (hours of operation) of planning permission ref no.: C97/1501 (granted for the extraction of sand and gravel; consolidation and reorganisation of the stockpiles and recycling arrangements; retention of the aggregate processing facilities and formation of bunding) to extend the operating hours for 24 hours Monday to Fridays and Saturdays until 23.59pm**

This application, to which Kesgrave Town Council and SCDC had also objected, had been withdrawn. Local residents were forming a contact group to enable information about the site to be exchanged, details of which will be available on the Parish Council website in due course. The applicant had offered to arrange a visit to the site for up to 15 residents at a time. Please contact the Clerk if you would be interested in visiting.

**C/11/1780 – Firecrest Nursery, Hall Road – Erection of Packing and Plant Preparation Shed**

It was noted that the development had already taken place. There was no ob-

jection to the shed.

**NOISE FROM MOTOR CYCLING RACING**

There was concern about noise from racing at Sunfield Farm by some residents. SCDC had advised that planning permission existed for up to 14 days racing a year. It recommended keeping a log of events and noise for future consideration.

**POLICY**

**Ipswich and SCDC LDF Core Strategies**

SCDC had written to clarify the impact of the Ipswich Borough and SCDC LDF Core Strategies on the parish. It was noted that land on the northern fringe of Ipswich (i.e. land north of Valley Road/ Colchester Road and between Henley Road in the west and Tuddenham Road in the east) had originally been identified by IBC as part of its 15 year housing land supply and that recent discussion had considered revisions to provide land sooner than this as follows:

**Policy CS10:** 1000 homes to be built by 2021, with an overall total of 1500 in the northern fringe area by 2026. A development brief needed to be adopted by the Council first.

**Policy CS16:** In accordance with this policy the development brief would need to include provision of a country park.

SCDC advised that there was no change to the area of land identified and no change to current proposals for Little Bealings. The change in timing had been considered by SCDC and its Sustainability Appraisal and Appropriate Assessment documents in its Core Strategy in respect of SP20 (Eastern Ipswich Plan Area) updated.

**National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF)**

There was government consultation on a draft National Planning Policy Framework which proposed replacing current Planning Policy Statements and Guidance Notes with one document. A 'presumption in favour of sustainable development' was a major change. District Councillor Tony Fryatt advised that the presumption would permit de-

velopment unless there were specific policies in place which precluded it. It was therefore important that the LDF was finalised and that local communities put together their own community plan, in line with proposals in the Localism Bill. It was agreed to hold a meeting on 12 October to consider a response to the consultation.

#### **COMMUNITY WIND TURBINES**

Great Bealings Parish Council was investigating the provision of two community wind turbines, one in Great Bealings and one in Holly Lane, Little Bealings. The latter was aimed at providing cheaper electricity for Bealings Village Hall. It was unlikely the Village Hall Management Committee would want to proceed with any project unless it was acceptable to local residents and brought them benefits too. While it was considered that the turbine in Great Bealings was not a matter for Little Bealings Parish Council, subject to confirmation that the chosen site had no visual impact on the parish, there was concern at the proposal for a turbine in Little Bealings. It was agreed that if Bealings Village Hall Management Committee did wish to proceed with a community wind turbine in the parish of Little Bealings, Little Bealings Parish Council expected to work with the Committee on the scheme and to advise Great Bealings Parish Council accordingly.

#### **POLICE**

There had been nine reported crimes in the village since the last PC meeting, including some incidents of harassment and damage to a motor vehicle. A supply of 'no cold calling' stickers will be available from the Clerk shortly. The SNT also has a range of crime prevention equipment available (see separate article).

#### **PLAYFORD ROAD**

SCC had advised that it was satisfied with the resurfacing work; the size of stone used was intended to avoid increasing tyre noise for residents.

#### **MARTLESHAM ROAD**

The section of 40mph speed restriction had been replaced with a continuous 30mph. SCC had advised that side growth from adjoining properties was not so bad as to substantiate its ability to give notice to residents to cut hedges back. It had pointed out that the highway boundary was very close to the road edge and this was not the fault of the neighbours of the road. SCC considered that, bearing in mind the narrow width of the road, drivers need to adjust their driving behaviour accordingly. It considered two cars could pass without incident provided both vehicles slowed down. Further comments on flexible bollards and speed cameras were awaited from SCC.

#### **COMMUNICATIONS**

Mrs Shaw, as webmaster presented the Council's new website and was thanked for her work. More information would be added and Mrs Wilson would assist in maintaining the site.

#### **FINANCE**

Cheques were signed for Mr Ball for footpath cutting for the year, PAYE, the Council's insurance premium and the charge by SCDC for running a non-contested election in May.

#### **CORRESPONDENCE**

SCDC was conducting a review of Polling Stations. It was proposed to continue with the new location at the Village Hall.

#### **DATE OF NEXT MEETING:**

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Wednesday 12 October to consider a response to the NPPF. The next regular Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 7 November. Both meetings will start at 7.30pm and be held in the Village Hall Committee Room. During the first 15 minutes of all Council meetings the public are welcome to raise any matters of concern with Councillors. The public may also speak for a maximum of 3 minutes on any item on the Agenda at the beginning of that item.

**REPORT BY COUNTY COUNCILLOR PETER BELLFIELD**

Mr Peter Bellfield reported that they are on track to make the £42 ½ million savings this year. Libraries will not be closing however he confirmed that a consultation has gone out as to the use of "mobile" libraries. These are very expensive costing approximately £590,000 a year to run. **REPORT BY POLICE**

There have been 3 crimes for the month of July and 1 crime for August.

**HIGHWAYS AND FOOTPATHS**

Mrs Sally Herrington asked if we had done any further investigation about the "path" running from Butts Road through to Church Road? The Clerk was asked to investigate this.

An email has been received reporting that a wide loaded farm vehicle was driven down Church Lane and as a consequence of this and an inappropriately parked car damage has been done to the banks down Church Lane. It was agreed to write to Suffolk County Council informing them of the problem with large vehicles using narrow lanes and asking them for ways to limit this type of problem in the future.

**PLAYING FIELD HEDGE**

The gap in the hedge from the playing field onto Butts Road needs to be filled. It was agreed to plant some hedging and surround it with wire netting to protect it from rabbits.
